An act relating to administration of medication to public school students; creating s. 1006.0625, F.S.; defining the term "psychotropic medication"; prohibiting recipients of state funds used for educational purposes from requiring a student to be prescribed or administered psychotropic medication as a condition of receipt of educational services; providing requirements for administration; providing a restriction relating to the diagnosis or treatment of mental disorders; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 1006.0625, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

1006.0625 Administration of psychotropic medication; prohibition; conditions.--

(1) As used in this section, the term "psychotropic medication" means a prescription medication that is used for the treatment of mental disorders and includes, without limitation, hypnotics, antipsychotics, antidepressants, anxiety agents, sedatives, psychomotor stimulants, and mood stabilizers.

(2) A recipient of state funds shall not require a student to be prescribed or administered any psychotropic medication as a condition of such student receiving educational or school-based services, including, but not limited to, school enrollment, class attendance, extracurricular activity

- (3) A psychotropic medication shall not be administered to a student on school premises except under the following conditions:
- (a) The medication must be dispensed to a student by a health care professional licensed under chapter 458, chapter 459, chapter 461, chapter 464, or chapter 465.
- (b) The dispensing of the medication to a student must fully comply with all privacy protections afforded to a patient under the federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act.
- (4) A school or school district personnel shall not initiate, or make a referral for, diagnosis or treatment of a student for any disorder listed in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders or in ICD-10.
- Section 2. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law.
