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13	WHEREAS, HIV/AIDS is one of the state's most critical
14	public health challenges, with Florida having the third
15	highest number of AIDS cases in the nation and the second
16	highest number of pediatric AIDS cases, and
17	WHEREAS, minorities, primarily blacks and Hispanics,
18	now constitute 63 percent of the more than 99,000 adult and
19	pediatric AIDS cases reported in Florida since the epidemic
20	began in 1981, and
21	WHEREAS, the HIV/AIDS epidemic has disproportionately
22	affected Florida's minority communities, and
23	WHEREAS, the total medical and related lifetime costs
24	for a patient infected with HIV may reach \$175,000 or more,
25	and
26	WHEREAS, the Legislature finds that sustained,
27	comprehensive prevention efforts can have a substantial impact
28	on slowing the course of the HIV/AIDS epidemic, and
29	WHEREAS, the Legislature intends to decrease the number
30	of deaths of minorities due to HIV/AIDS by increasing public
31	awareness, increasing early detection and treatment of

HIV/AIDS in the state's minority communities, and increasing the coordination of HIV/AIDS prevention and treatment efforts in the state's minority communities, and

WHEREAS, the prevalence of HIV/AIDS in the state's jails exceeds the prevalence of HIV/AIDS in the general population, and

WHEREAS, recent advances in treatment for HIV/AIDS can potentially reduce the number of opportunistic infections and associated medical costs and delay the onset of death due to the disease, and

WHEREAS, referral to appropriate medical and social services upon the release of an inmate can play a crucial role in treatment, care, and secondary prevention efforts, and

WHEREAS, the Legislature authorized the creation of the Minority HIV and AIDS Task Force to provide recommendations on strategies to strengthen HIV/AIDS prevention, early intervention, and treatment efforts in Florida's minority communities, NOW, THEREFORE,

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Section 381.0046, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

381.0046 Statewide HIV and AIDS prevention campaign.--

(1) The Department of Health shall develop and implement a statewide HIV and AIDS prevention campaign that is directed towards minorities who are at risk of HIV infection. The campaign shall include television, radio, and outdoor advertising; public service announcements; and peer-to-peer outreach. Each campaign message and concept shall be evaluated with members of the target group to ensure its effectiveness.

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The campaign shall provide information on the risk of HIV and AIDS infection and strategies to follow for prevention, early detection, and treatment. The campaign shall use culturally sensitive literature and educational materials and promote the development of individual skills for behavior modification.

The campaign shall be expanded to include prevention information specifically targeted to the state's Hispanic and Haitian communities.

- (2) The Department of Health shall establish <u>eight</u> four positions within the department for HIV and AIDS regional minority coordinators and one position for a statewide HIV and AIDS minority coordinator. The coordinators shall facilitate statewide efforts to implement and coordinate HIV and AIDS prevention and treatment programs. The statewide coordinator shall report directly to the chief of the Bureau of HIV and AIDS within the Department of Health.
- outreach programs in the state's minority communities to identify persons infected with HIV/AIDS. These programs shall address real and perceived barriers to HIV testing among the state's minority populations. The Department of Health shall, with assistance from the Minority HIV and AIDS Task Force and the statewide coordinator, plan and conduct a statewide Black Leadership Conference on HIV and AIDS by January 2000. The conference shall provide workshops for minority organizations in building skills and improving an organization's capacity to conduct HIV and AIDS prevention and treatment programs.
- (4) The department shall provide a program to ensure that HIV-positive persons are linked with prevention, care, and support services. This program shall be provided in a culturally sensitive manner to promote prevention among

1	persons who are HIV positive and increase the acceptance and
2	delivery of care and support services in high-risk
3	communities.
4	(5) The department shall expand testing programs for
5	HIV, sexually transmissible diseases, and hepatitis in local
6	county jails. The department shall establish programs for
7	HIV-positive inmates to ensure coordination and linkage to
8	treatment and secondary prevention messages upon their
9	release.
10	(6) To promote HIV testing among minority persons who
11	are at risk of infection, the department shall expand its HIV
12	counseling, testing, and referral services.
13	(7) These minority programs shall be consistent with
14	the findings and recommendations of the Minority HIV and AIDS
15	Task Force, the HIV/AIDS Comprehensive Prevention Plan, and
16	the recommendations of the Centers for Disease Control and
17	Prevention.
18	Section 2. This act shall take effect upon becoming a
19	law.
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22	SENATE SUMMARY
23	Increases from four to eight the number of HIV and AIDS regional minority coordinators within the Department of
24	Health. Requires the department to expand its HIV/AIDS prevention efforts in Florida's minority communities and
25	establish programs for HIV-positive persons, including
26	inmates prior to their release from jail, to link them to treatment, prevention, and support services.
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
