For purposes if this section, the term 18 "deepwater seaport" means each of the ports of Jacksonville, Port Canaveral, Palm Beach, Port Everglades, Miami, Port 19 Manatee, St. Petersburg, Tampa, Panama City, Pensacola, Key 2.0 21 West, and Fernandina. 22 Section 2. The sum of \$1.5 million is appropriated 23 from the General Revenue Fund to the Department of Law Enforcement to administer this act. 2.4 Section 3.
