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25	Section 1. Paragraph (a) of subsection (6) of section
26	1002.20, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:
27	1002.20 K-12 student and parent rightsParents of
28	public school students must receive accurate and timely
29	information regarding their child's academic progress and must
30	be informed of ways they can help their child to succeed in
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1 school. K-12 students and their parents are afforded numerous 2 statutory rights including, but not limited to, the following: (6) EDUCATIONAL CHOICE. --3 4 (a) Public school choices.--Parents of public school students may seek whatever public school choice options that 5 б are applicable to their students and are available to students 7 in their school districts. These options may include 8 controlled open enrollment, lab schools, charter schools, 9 charter technical career centers, magnet schools, alternative schools, special programs, advanced placement, dual 10 enrollment, International Baccalaureate, International General 11 12 Certificate of Secondary Education (pre-AICE), Advanced 13 International Certificate of Education, early admissions, credit by examination or demonstration of competency, the New 14 World School of the Arts, the Florida School for the Deaf and 15 the Blind, and the Florida Virtual School. These options may 16 17 also include the public school choice options of the 18 Opportunity Scholarship Program and the McKay Scholarships for Students with Disabilities Program. 19 Section 2. Subsection (2) of section 1002.23, Florida 20 21 Statutes, is amended to read: 22 1002.23 Family and School Partnership for Student 23 Achievement Act. --(2) To facilitate meaningful parent and family 2.4 involvement, the Department of Education shall develop 25 26 guidelines for a parent guide to successful student 27 achievement which describes what parents need to know about 2.8 their child's educational progress and how they can help their child to succeed in school. The guidelines shall include, but 29 need not be limited to: 30 (a) Parental information regarding: 31

1 1. Requirements for their child to be promoted to the 2 next grade, as provided for in s. 1008.25; 2. Progress of their child toward achieving state and 3 district expectations for academic proficiency; 4 5 3. Assessment results, including report cards and б progress reports; and 7 4. Qualifications of their child's teachers; 8 (b) Services available for parents and their children, 9 such as family literacy services; mentoring, tutorial, and 10 other academic reinforcement programs; college planning, academic advisement, and student counseling services; and 11 12 after-school programs; 13 (c) Opportunities for parental participation, such as parenting classes, adult education, school advisory councils, 14 and school volunteer programs; 15 (d) Opportunities for parents to learn about rigorous 16 17 academic programs that may be available for their child, such as honors programs, dual enrollment, advanced placement, 18 International Baccalaureate, International General Certificate 19 of Secondary Education (pre-AICE), Advanced International 20 21 Certificate of Education, Florida Virtual High School courses, 22 and accelerated access to postsecondary education; 23 (e) Educational choices, as provided for in s. 1002.20(6), and corporate income tax credit scholarships, as 2.4 provided for in s. 220.187; 25 (f) Classroom and test accommodations available for 26 27 students with disabilities; and 28 (g) School board rules, policies, and procedures for student promotion and retention, academic standards, student 29 assessment, courses of study, instructional materials, and 30 contact information for school and district offices. 31

1 Section 3. Subsection (2) of section 1007.22, Florida 2 Statutes, is amended to read: 3 1007.22 Articulation; postsecondary institution 4 coordination and collaboration.--5 (2) The levels of postsecondary education shall 6 collaborate in further developing and providing articulated 7 programs in which students can proceed toward their 8 educational objectives as rapidly as their circumstances 9 permit. Time-shortened educational programs, as well as the use of acceleration mechanisms, shall include, but not be 10 limited to, the International Baccalaureate, Advanced 11 12 International Certificate of Education, credit by examination 13 or demonstration of competency, advanced placement, early admissions, and dual enrollment. 14 Section 4. Subsection (10) of section 1007.261, 15 Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 16 17 1007.261 State universities; admissions of students.--Each university board of trustees is authorized to 18 adopt rules governing the admission of students, subject to 19 this section and rules of the State Board of Education. 20 21 (10) A Florida resident who is denied admission as an 22 undergraduate to a state university for failure to meet the 23 high school grade point average requirement may appeal the decision to the university and request a recalculation of the 2.4 grade point average including in the revised calculation the 25 26 grades earned in up to three credits of advanced fine arts 27 courses. The university shall provide the student with a 2.8 description of the appeals process at the same time as notification of the admissions decision. The university shall 29 recalculate the student's grade point average using the 30 additional courses and advise the student of any changes in 31

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1 the student's admission status. For purposes of this section, 2 fine arts courses include courses in music, drama, painting, 3 sculpture, speech, debate, or a course in any art form that requires manual dexterity. Advanced level fine arts courses 4 include fine arts courses identified in the course code 5 б directory as Advanced Placement, pre-International 7 Baccalaureate, or International Baccalaureate, International 8 General Certificate of Secondary Education (pre-AICE), Advanced International Certificate of Education, or fine arts 9 courses taken in the third or fourth year of a fine arts 10 11 curriculum. 12 Section 5. Subsection (9) of section 1007.27, Florida 13 Statutes, is amended to read: 1007.27 Articulated acceleration mechanisms.--14 (9) The Advanced International Certificate of 15 Education Program and the International General Certificate of 16 17 Secondary Education (pre-AICE) Program shall be the curricula 18 curriculum in which eligible secondary students are enrolled in programs of study a program of studies offered through the 19 Advanced International Certificate of Education Program or the 20 21 International General Certificate of Secondary Education 22 (pre-AICE) Program administered by the University of Cambridge 23 Local Examinations Syndicate. The State Board of Education shall establish rules which specify the cutoff scores and 2.4 Advanced International Certificate of Education examinations 25 26 which will be used to grant postsecondary credit at community 27 colleges and universities. Any such rules, which have the 2.8 effect of raising the required cutoff score or of changing the Advanced International Certification of Education examinations 29 which will be used to grant postsecondary credit, shall apply 30 to students taking Advanced International Certificate of 31

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1 Education Examinations after such rules are adopted by the 2 State Board of Education. Students shall be awarded a maximum of 30 semester credit hours pursuant to this subsection. 3 The specific course for which a student receives such credit shall 4 5 be determined by the community college or university that б accepts the student for admission. Students enrolled in 7 either program of study pursuant to this subsection shall be 8 exempt from the payment of any fees for administration of the 9 examinations regardless of whether or not the student achieves a passing score on the examination. 10 Section 6. Subsections (1), (2), (4), (5), (6), (11), 11 12 and (13) of section 1007.271, Florida Statutes, are amended to 13 read: 1007.271 Dual enrollment programs.--14 (1) The dual enrollment program is the enrollment of 15 an eligible secondary student or home education student in a 16 17 postsecondary course creditable toward high school graduation 18 and a career certificate or an associate or baccalaureate degree. 19 20 (2) For the purpose of this section, an eligible 21 secondary student is a student who is enrolled in a Florida 22 public secondary school or in a Florida private secondary 23 school which is in compliance with s. 1002.42(2) and conducts a secondary curriculum pursuant to s. 1003.43. Students 2.4 enrolled in postsecondary instruction that is not creditable 25 toward the high school diploma shall not be classified as dual 26 27 enrollments. Students who are eligible for dual enrollment 2.8 pursuant to this section shall be permitted to enroll in dual 29 enrollment courses conducted during school hours, after school hours, and during the summer term. Instructional time for such 30 enrollment may vary from exceed 900 hours; however, the school 31

district may only report the student for a maximum of 1.0 FTE, 1 as provided in s. 1011.61(4). Each semester of instruction 2 that generates high school and postsecondary credit shall be 3 4 reported by each school district as 75 membership hours for purposes of FTE calculation. Any student so enrolled is exempt 5 6 from the payment of registration, tuition, and laboratory 7 fees. Vocational-preparatory instruction, college-preparatory 8 instruction and other forms of precollegiate instruction, as well as physical education courses that focus on the physical 9 execution of a skill rather than the intellectual attributes 10 of the activity, are ineligible for inclusion in the dual 11 12 enrollment program. Recreation and leisure studies courses 13 shall be evaluated individually in the same manner as physical education courses for potential inclusion in the program. 14 (4) Career dual enrollment shall be provided as a 15 curricular option for secondary students to pursue in order to 16 17 earn a series of elective credits toward the high school 18 diploma. However, career dual enrollment shall not supplant student acquisition of the diploma. Career dual enrollment 19 shall be available for secondary students seeking a degree or 20 21 certificate from a complete career-preparatory program, and 22 may not be used to enroll students but shall not sustain 23 student enrollment in isolated career courses. It is the 2.4 intent of the Legislature that career dual enrollment provide reflect the interests and aptitudes of the student. The 25 26 provision of a comprehensive academic and career dual 27 enrollment program within the career center or community 2.8 college is supportive of legislative intent; however, such 29 provision is not mandatory. 30 (5) Each district school board shall inform all secondary students of dual enrollment as an educational option 31 8

1 and mechanism for acceleration. Students shall be informed of 2 eligibility criteria, the option for taking dual enrollment courses beyond the regular school year, and the 24 minimum 3 academic credits required for graduation. District school 4 boards shall annually assess the demand for dual enrollment 5 6 and other advanced courses, and the district school board 7 shall consider strategies and programs to meet that demand. (6) The Commissioner of Education shall appoint 8 faculty committees representing public school, community 9 college, and university faculties to identify postsecondary 10 courses that meet the high school graduation requirements of 11 12 s. 1003.43, and to establish the number of postsecondary 13 semester credit hours of instruction and equivalent high school credits earned through dual enrollment pursuant to this 14 section that are necessary to meet high school graduation 15 requirements. Such equivalencies shall be determined solely on 16 17 comparable course content and not on seat time traditionally allocated to such courses in high school. The Commissioner of 18 Education shall recommend to the State Board of Education 19 those post secondary courses identified to meet high school 20 21 graduation requirements, based on mastery of course outcomes, 22 by their statewide course number, and all high schools shall 23 accept these postsecondary education courses toward meeting the requirements of s. 1003.43. 2.4 (11) The Department of Education shall approve any 25 course for inclusion in the dual enrollment program that is 26 27 contained within the statewide course numbering system. 2.8 However, college-preparatory and other forms of precollegiate instruction, and physical education and other courses that 29 focus on the physical execution of a skill rather than the 30 intellectual attributes of the activity, may not be so 31

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approved, but must be evaluated individually for potential 1 2 inclusion in the dual enrollment program. This subsection does not mean that an independent postsecondary institution 3 eligible for inclusion in a dual enrollment or early admission 4 program pursuant to s. 1011.62 must participate in the 5 6 statewide course numbering system developed pursuant to s. 7 1007.24 to participate in a dual enrollment program. 8 (13) It is the intent of the Legislature that Students 9 who meet the eligibility requirements of this section subsection and who choose to participate in dual enrollment 10 programs are be exempt from the payment of registration, 11 12 tuition, and laboratory fees. 13 Section 7. Subsection (3) of section 1009.531, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 14 1009.531 Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program; 15 student eligibility requirements for initial awards.--16 17 (3) For purposes of calculating the grade point average to be used in determining initial eligibility for a 18 Florida Bright Futures Scholarship, the department shall 19 assign additional weights to grades earned in the following 20 21 courses: 22 (a) Courses identified in the course code directory as 23 Advanced Placement, pre-International Baccalaureate, or International Baccalaureate, International General Certificate 2.4 of Secondary Education (pre-AICE), or Advanced International 25 26 Certificate of Education. 27 (b) Courses designated as academic dual enrollment 2.8 courses in the statewide course numbering system. 29 The department may assign additional weights to courses, other 30 than those described in paragraphs (a) and (b), that are 31 10

1 identified by the Department of Education as containing 2 rigorous academic curriculum and performance standards. The additional weight assigned to a course pursuant to this 3 subsection shall not exceed 0.5 per course. The weighted 4 system shall be developed and distributed to all high schools 5 6 in the state prior to January 1, 1998. The department may 7 determine a student's eligibility status during the senior 8 year before graduation and may inform the student of the award 9 at that time. 10 Section 8. Subsection (1) of section 1009.534, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 11 12 1009.534 Florida Academic Scholars award.--13 (1) A student is eligible for a Florida Academic Scholars award if the student meets the general eligibility 14 requirements for the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship 15 16 Program and the student: 17 (a) Has achieved a 3.5 weighted grade point average as calculated pursuant to s. 1009.531, or its equivalent, in high 18 school courses that are designated by the State Board of 19 Education as college-preparatory academic courses; and has 20 21 attained at least the score identified by rules of the State 22 Board of Education on the combined verbal and quantitative 23 parts of the Scholastic Aptitude Test, the Scholastic Assessment Test, or the recentered Scholastic Assessment Test 2.4 of the College Entrance Examination, or an equivalent score on 25 the ACT Assessment Program; or 26 27 (b) Has attended a home education program according to 2.8 s. 1002.41 during grades 11 and 12 or has completed the 29 International Baccalaureate curriculum but failed to earn the International Baccalaureate Diploma or has completed the 30 Advanced International Certificate of Education curriculum but 31 11

1 failed to earn the Advanced International Certificate of 2 Education Diploma, and has attained at least the score identified by rules of the State Board of Education on the 3 combined verbal and quantitative parts of the Scholastic 4 Aptitude Test, the Scholastic Assessment Test, or the 5 6 recentered Scholastic Assessment Test of the College Entrance 7 Examination, or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment 8 Program; or (c) Has been awarded an International Baccalaureate 9 Diploma from the International Baccalaureate Office or an 10 Advanced International Certificate of Education Diploma from 11 12 the University of Cambridge International Examinations Office; 13 or (d) Has been recognized by the merit or achievement 14 programs of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation as a 15 scholar or finalist; or 16 17 (e) Has been recognized by the National Hispanic 18 Recognition Program as a scholar recipient. 19 A student must complete a program of community service work, 20 21 as approved by the district school board or the administrators 22 of a nonpublic school, which shall include a minimum of 75 23 hours of service work and require the student to identify a social problem that interests him or her, develop a plan for 2.4 his or her personal involvement in addressing the problem, 25 and, through papers or other presentations, evaluate and 26 27 reflect upon his or her experience. 2.8 Section 9. 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1 (1) A student is eligible for a Florida Medallion 2 Scholars award if the student meets the general eligibility requirements for the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship 3 4 Program and the student: 5 (a) Has achieved a weighted grade point average of 3.0 6 as calculated pursuant to s. 1009.531, or the equivalent, in 7 high school courses that are designated by the State Board of 8 Education as college-preparatory academic courses; and has attained at least the score identified by rules of the State 9 Board of Education on the combined verbal and quantitative 10 parts of the Scholastic Aptitude Test, the Scholastic 11 12 Assessment Test, or the recentered Scholastic Assessment Test 13 of the College Entrance Examination, or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program; or 14 (b) Has attended a home education program according to 15 s. 1002.41 during grades 11 and 12 or has completed the 16 17 International Baccalaureate curriculum but failed to earn the 18 International Baccalaureate Diploma or has completed the Advanced International Certificate of Education curriculum but 19 failed to earn the Advanced International Certificate of 20 21 Education Diploma, and has attained at least the score 22 identified by rules of the State Board of Education on the 23 combined verbal and quantitative parts of the Scholastic Aptitude Test, the Scholastic Assessment Test, or the 2.4 recentered Scholastic Assessment Test of the College Entrance 25 26 Examination, or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment 27 Program; or 2.8 (c) Has been recognized by the merit or achievement program of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation as a 29 scholar or finalist but has not completed a program of 30 community service as provided in s. 1009.534; or 31 13

No student 20 enrolled in college credit mathematics or English dual 21 22 enrollment instruction shall be funded as a dual enrollment 23 unless the student has successfully completed the relevant 2.4 section of the entry-level examination required pursuant to s. 1008.30. 25 (m) Calculation of additional full-time equivalent 26 27 membership based on Advanced International Certificate of 2.8 Education examination scores of students. -- A value of 0.24 29 full-time equivalent student membership shall be calculated for each student enrolled in a full-credit Advanced 30 International Certificate of Education course who receives a 31 15

1	score of \underline{E} $\frac{2}{2}$ or higher on a subject examination. A value of
2	0.12 full-time equivalent student membership shall be
3	calculated for each student enrolled in a half-credit Advanced
4	International Certificate of Education course who receives a

6	0.3 full-time equivalent student membership shall be

A value of 0.15 full-time 25 equivalent student membership shall be calculated for each 26 student who receives an International Certificate of Education 27 2.8 diploma. Such value shall be added to the total full-time equivalent student membership in basic programs for grades 9 29 30 through 12 in the subsequent fiscal year. 31

For the purpose of incorporating the 2 amendment to section 1011.62, Florida Statutes, in a reference thereto, subsection (2) of section 1011.69, Florida Statutes, 3 is reenacted to read: 4 1011.69 Equity in School-Level Funding Act.--5 б (2) Beginning in the 2003-2004 fiscal year, district 7 school boards shall allocate to schools within the district an 8 average of 90 percent of the funds generated by all schools and guarantee that each school receives at least 80 percent of 9 the funds generated by that school based upon the Florida 10 Education Finance Program as provided in s. 1011.62 and the 11 12 General Appropriations Act, including gross state and local 13 funds, discretionary lottery funds, and funds from the school district's current operating discretionary millage levy.
