House Joint Resolution
A joint resolution proposing an amendment to section 1 of Article IX of the State Constitution, relating to public education, to limit class size reductions and provide funds for increased teacher compensation and other public education purposes.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

That the amendment to Section 1 of Article IX of the State Constitution set forth below is agreed to and shall be submitted to the electors of Florida for approval or rejection at the general election to be held in November 2006:

## ARTICLE IX

EDUCATION
SECTION 1. Public education.--
(a) The education of children is a fundamental value of the people of the State of Florida. It is, therefore, a paramount duty of the state to make adequate provision for the education of all children residing within its borders. Adequate provision shall be made by law for a uniform, efficient, safe, secure, and high quality system of free public schools that allows students to obtain a high quality education and for the establishment, maintenance, and operation of institutions of higher learning and other public education programs that the needs of the people may require. To assure that children attending public schools obtain a high quality education, the legislature shall make adequate provision to ensure that, by the beginning of the 2010 school year, there are a sufficient number of classrooms so that on the average in each school district:

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(1) The maximum number of students who are assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public school classrooms for prekindergarten through grade 3 does not exceed 18 students; and
(2) The maximum number of students who are assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public school classrooms for grades 4 and 5 throug 8 does not exceed 22 students.; and
(3) The maximum number of students who are assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public school classfooms for grades 9 through 12 does not exceed 25 students.

The class size requirements of this subsection do not apply to extracurricular classes. Payment of the costs associated with reducing class size to meet these requirements is the responsibility of the state and not of local schools districts. Beginning with the 2003-2004 fiscal year, the legislature shall provide sufficient funds to reduce the average number of students in each classroom by at least two students per year until the maximum number of students per classroom does not exceed the requirements of this subsection.
(b) In addition to the amounts appropriated to meet the class size requirements of subsection (a), the legislature shall annually cause to be appropriated a separate amount equal to the difference between the estimated cost of implementing a class size reduction program according to the provisions of subsection (a) as initially adopted in November 2002 and the cost of implementing the provisions of subsection (a) as amended in November 2006. Such separate amount shall be appropriated by the legislature first for increasing the compensation of public school teachers to the extent necessary to cause the average annual teacher compensation in Florida public schools to equal

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at least the average annual compensation of all public school teachers in the United States in prekindergarten through grade 12, and thereafter for funding such public education purposes as deemed appropriate by the legislature. The legislature shall by general law take such action as is necessary and proper to implement the intent of this subsection, including determining and defining the compensation levels required to be paid pursuant to this subsection.
(c)(b) Every four-year old child in Florida shall be provided by the State a high quality pre-kindergarten learning opportunity in the form of an early childhood development and education program which shall be voluntary, high quality, free, and delivered according to professionally accepted standards. An early childhood development and education program means an organized program designed to address and enhance each child's ability to make age appropriate progress in an appropriate range of settings in the development of language and cognitive capabilities and emotional, social, regulatory and moral capacities through education in basic skills and such other skills as the Legislature may determine to be appropriate.
(d)(c) The early childhood education and development programs provided by reason of subsection (c) suraraph (b) shall be implemented no later than the beginning of the 2005 school year through funds generated in addition to those used for existing education, health, and development programs. Existing education, health, and development programs are those funded by the State as of January 1, 2002, that provided for child or adult education, health care, or development.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the title and substance of the amendment proposed herein shall appear on the ballot as follows:

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LIMITING CLASS SIZE REDUCTIONS TO SUPPLEMENT TEACHER COMPENSATION AND PUBLIC EDUCATION

Proposes an amendment to Section 1 of Article IX of the State Constitution to limit class size reduction requirements to prekindergarten through grade 3 and to grades 4 and 5 on a school district average basis; to provide that, in addition to the amounts appropriated to meet the revised class size requirements, the Legislature shall appropriate a separate amount equal to the difference between the estimated cost of implementing a class size reduction program according to the constitutional provisions adopted in November 2002 and the cost of implementing these limited class size reduction requirements; and to provide that such separate appropriation shall first be used to increase the compensation of public school teachers and thereafter to fund other public education purposes.
