WHEREAS, for more than 25 years, the Florida court system has dedicated itself to the practice of a method of alternative dispute resolution that offers litigants court-connected opportunities to resolve their disputes without judicial intervention and which has become one of the most comprehensive court-connected mediation programs in the nation, and

WHEREAS, in 1988, legislation took effect that allowed civil trial judges to refer any or all of their civil cases to mediation or arbitration in the areas of county, family, circuit, and dependency disputes, thus providing a more suitable, cost-effective alternative to litigation, and

WHEREAS, for the most part volunteers, Supreme Court certified mediators must attend continuing education training, must be of good moral character and adhere to high ethical standards, and must renew their certification every two years; in 2004, 12,650 individuals had completed the training programs; and there are currently 4,872 individuals certified in one or a combination of the areas of dispute, and

WHEREAS, mediators are neutral, do not give legal advice, and do not dictate the outcome; instead, by acting as facilitators and working with all parties involved, mediators attempt to get the parties to devise their own mutually acceptable agreement, and

WHEREAS, mediators, who usually volunteer to serve four days a month, devoting about four or five hours and completing an average of two to four cases each day, are indeed an integral part of conflict resolution not only within the court system but also in governmental and private sectors as well, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Florida:

That Florida's mediators, who perform their invaluable services on an entirely volunteer basis, are enthusiastically commended for their commitment to their communities and for their dedication to a program that, through their untiring efforts, has become a highly successful method of conflict resolution.
