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2 An act relating to public school accountability; providing 3 a popular name; amending s. 1008.34, F.S.; revising school 4 performance grade categories; revising requirements for 5 obtaining increased budget authority by schools; revising 6 the method for determining school performance grades; 7 providing for public hearings relating to the adoption of 8 school performance grade requirements; amending s. 9 1008.36, F.S.; renaming the Florida School Recognition 10 Program as the Students First Program and revising provisions thereof; providing program components; 11 providing for the use of Students First Program funds; 12 13 providing duties of the Department of Education; providing 14 an effective date. 15 16 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: 17 18 Section 1. This act may be cited as the "Students First 19 Act." Subsections (2), (3), and (4) of section 20 Section 2. 21 1008.34, Florida Statutes, are amended to read: 22 1008.34 School grading system; district performance 23 grade.--24 SCHOOL PERFORMANCE GRADE CATEGORIES. -- The annual (2)25 report shall identify schools as being in one of the following 26 grade categories defined according to rules of the State Board 27 of Education:

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28 "Passing with Distinction." "A," schools making (a) 29 excellent progress. 30 "Passing." "B," schools making above average progress. (b) 31 (C) "Failing." "C," schools making satisfactory progress. "D," schools making less than satisfactory progress. 32 (d)(e) "F," schools failing to make adequate progress. 33 34 35 Each school designated in performance grade category "Passing with Distinction, " "A, " making excellent progress, or having 36 37 improved at least one two performance grade category categories, shall have greater authority over the allocation of the school's 38 39 total budget generated from the FEFP, state categoricals, lottery funds, grants, and local funds, as specified in state 40 41 board rule. The rule must provide that the increased budget 42 authority shall remain in effect until the school's performance 43 grade declines. Beginning in the 2005-2006 school year, a school 44 that has been designated as performance grade category "F" in a 45 prior school year shall not be designated as performance grade 46 category "Failing" using the current year's data if that school 47 has shown at least a 50-percent increase toward the baseline 48 score in each subject area. 49 DESIGNATION OF SCHOOL PERFORMANCE GRADE (3) 50 CATEGORIES. -- For purposes of determining school performance, student performance should be based on a student's annual 51 52 learning gains when the gain can be measured with an accurate 53 and consistent assessment system. School performance grade category designations itemized in subsection (2) shall be based 54 55 on the following:

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2005 56 (a) Timeframes.--57 1. School performance grade category designations shall be 58 based on the school's current year performance and the school's 59 annual learning gains. 60 2. Beginning in school year 2005-2006, a school's 61 performance grade category designation shall be determined based upon the following weighted factors for the following grade 62 63 levels, according to rules adopted by the State Board of 64 Education: a. For kindergarten through grade 2, 60 percent of the 65 66 performance grade shall be based on the percentage of classes for which there is a ratio of 1 teacher to 20 students, 20 67 percent shall be based on attendance, 10 percent shall be based 68 69 on parental involvement, and 10 percent shall be based on school 70 safety. 71 b. For grades 3 through 5, 60 percent of the performance 72 grade shall be based on FCAT scores, 20 percent shall be based 73 on attendance, 10 percent shall be based on parental 74 involvement, and 10 percent shall be based on school safety. 75 c. For grades 6 through 10, 60 percent of the performance 76 grade shall be based on FCAT scores, 10 percent shall be based 77 on attendance, 10 percent shall be based on the dropout rate, 10 78 percent shall be based on parental involvement, and 10 percent 79 shall be based on school safety. d. For grades 11 and 12, 35 percent of the performance 80 81 grade shall be based on the dropout rate; 35 percent shall be 82 based on the number of acceleration mechanisms available to 83 students, including, but not limited to, Advanced Placement

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84 courses and dual enrollment courses; 10 percent shall be based 85 on attendance; 10 percent shall be based on parental involvement; and 10 percent shall be based on school safety. 86 87 88 During the 2007-2008 school year, the Legislature shall conduct 89 public hearings on the school performance grade requirements of 90 this paragraph to receive recommendations for revisions to improve such requirements. The recommendations shall be 91 92 considered prior to adopting school performance grade requirements for the 2008-2009 school year and thereafter. 93 2. A school's performance grade category designation shall 94 be based on a combination of student achievement scores, student 95 learning gains as measured by annual FCAT assessments in grades 96 97 3 through 10, and improvement of the lowest 25th percentile of 98 students in the school in reading, math, or writing on the FCAT, unless these students are performing above satisfactory 99 100 performance. 101 Student assessment data.--Student assessment data used (b) 102 in determining school performance grade categories shall 103 include: 104 1. The aggregate scores of all eligible students enrolled 105 in the school who have been assessed on the FCAT. The aggregate scores of all eligible students enrolled 106 2. in the school who have been assessed on the FCAT, including 107 Florida Writes, and who have scored at or in the lowest 25th 108 109 percentile of students in the school in reading, math, or writing, unless these students are performing above satisfactory 110 111 performance.

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113 The Department of Education shall study the effects of mobility 114 on the performance of highly mobile students and recommend 115 programs to improve the performance of such students. The State 116 Board of Education shall adopt appropriate criteria for each 117 school performance grade category. The criteria must also give 118 added weight to student achievement in reading. Schools 119 designated as performance grade category "Passing" "C," making 120 satisfactory progress, shall be required to demonstrate that 121 adequate progress has been made by students in the school who are in the lowest 25th percentile in reading, math, or writing 122 on the FCAT, including Florida Writes, unless these students are 123 performing above satisfactory performance. 124 125 (4) SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT RATINGS. -- The annual report shall 126 identify each school's performance as having improved, remained 127 the same, or declined. This school improvement rating shall be 128 based on a comparison of the current year's and previous year's student and school performance data. Schools that improve at 129 130 least one performance grade category are eligible for school recognition awards pursuant to s. 1008.36. 131 132 Section 3. Section 1008.36, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 133 134 1008.36 Students First Florida School Recognition 135 Program.--136 (1)The Legislature finds that in order to provide every 137 student enrolled in K-12 public schools with the opportunity to achieve a successful public education, academic problems must be

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identified early and remediation and intervention services must

be provided. It is the intent of this section that no child

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shall be left behind there is a need for a performance incentive program for outstanding faculty and staff in highly productive schools. The Legislature further finds that performance-based incentives are commonplace in the private sector and should be infused into the public sector as a reward for productivity. The Students First Florida School Recognition Program (2)is created to provide financial awards to public schools that: (a) A curriculum-based, year-round measurement of learning gains for all kindergarten students enrolled in public schools. Sustain high performance by receiving a school grade of "A," making excellent progress; or Remediation and intervention services to all (b) kindergarten through grade 12 students enrolled in public schools who are not meeting grade-appropriate performance expectations, including FCAT scores Demonstrate exemplary improvement due to innovation and effort by improving a letter grade.

All public schools, including charter schools, that
 receive a school grade pursuant to s. 1008.34 are eligible to
 participate in the program.

(4) All selected schools shall receive financial
assistance awards depending on the availability of funds
appropriated and the number and size of schools selected to
receive an award. Funds must be distributed to the school's
fiscal agent and placed in the school's account and must be used
for purposes listed in subsection (5) as determined jointly by
the school's staff and school advisory council. If school staff

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168 and the school advisory council cannot reach agreement by 169 November 1, the awards must be equally distributed to all classroom teachers currently teaching in the school. 170 171 (5) Students First Program funds School recognition awards 172 must be used for the following: 173 Administration of the Dynamic Indicators of Basic (a) 174 Early Literacy Skills (DIBELS) to all kindergarten students 175 enrolled in public schools Nonrecurring bonuses to the faculty and staff; 176 177 (b) Nonrecurring expenditures for remediation of lowperforming students, including remediation programs and 178 179 intervention services adopted and administered by the Department 180 of Education; 181 (c) (b) Nonrecurring expenditures for educational equipment 182 or materials to assist in the remediation of low-performing 183 students maintaining and improving student performance; or 184 (d) (d) (c) Temporary personnel for the school to assist in the 185 remediation of low-performing students; or maintaining and 186 improving student performance. 187 (e) Contracts with private sector participants to provide 188 remediation services, provided that 90 percent of the personnel 189 providing services reside in Florida. 190 191 Notwithstanding statutory provisions to the contrary, incentive 192 awards are not subject to collective bargaining. 193 Section 4. (1) The Department of Education shall provide 194 training and informational resources for educators to administer 195 the Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills (DIBELS)

197	provisions for the collection and analysis of the testing data.
198	(2) The Department of Education shall establish policies
199	and procedures for the development of individual education plans
200	for low-performing students who need remediation and
