1 House Resolution

A resolution recognizing April 2005 as "National Autism Awareness Month" in Florida.

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WHEREAS, autism is a complex and puzzling neurobiological disorder that severely impairs the ability of individuals to process and integrate ordinary information from their environment, and

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WHEREAS, autism severely affects the way individuals with autism relate to others socially and in their ability to communicate and learn, and

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WHEREAS, autism strikes 1 in every 150 children and is now considered the most common developmental disability, and

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WHEREAS, autism affects the functioning of all five senses, with symptoms ranging from very acute to sometimes nonexistent, without consistency or integration, and

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WHEREAS, autism is unidentifiable until 12-24 months of age and often does not manifest itself until well into the second or third year of life, and

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WHEREAS, with proper treatment and intensive therapy it is possible for many children with autism to progress to a point at which they are indistinguishable from their peers, and

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WHEREAS, neither a cause nor a cure has been discovered and increased research is vital in the quest for a broader understanding of this debilitating and complex affliction, and

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WHEREAS, organizations such as the Autism Society of Florida and the Centers for Autism and Related Disabilities

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have dedicated years of service in their ongoing efforts to advocate for persons with autism and their families, and

WHEREAS, the Legislature and the Governor of the State of Florida encourage us all to educate ourselves with respect to the effects of autism and available therapeutic and educational interventions for those individuals with autism, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Florida:

That the House of Representatives recognizes April 2005 as "National Autism Awareness Month" in Florida, urges the residents of the state to better acquaint themselves with the nature and symptoms of this heartbreaking disability, and commends the dedicated groups and individuals who are working on behalf of persons with autism to provide information, increase awareness, and adequately fund services.
