A resolution recognizing January 2006 as "Cervical Cancer Awareness Month" in Florida.

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WHEREAS, cervical cancer is the second most common cancer

WHEREAS, Florida ranks fourth in the United States for

American Cancer Society estimates that 730 new incidences of the

disease will be diagnosed in the state during the year 2005, and WHEREAS, the primary cause of cervical cancer is infection with human papillomavirus (HPV), a virus commonly found in healthy women and only rarely resulting in cancer, and

WHEREAS, invasive cervical cancers are diagnosed at the localized, most treatable and survivable stage in 57 percent of white women and 49 percent of African-American women, and

WHEREAS, early detection is the key to detecting cervical cancer during its precancerous stages, and the incidence of and mortality from cervical cancer has been greatly reduced through the use of annual Pap tests, which can detect precancerous lesions that may be treated before a cancer develops, and

WHEREAS, the observance of January as Cervical Cancer Awareness Month and the promotion cervical cancer screening programs, such as the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention funded Mary Brogan Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program, will aid in early cervical cancer detection through regular screening, NOW, THEREFORE,
