WHEREAS, Jackie Robinson was born to Jerry and Mallie Robinson in Cairo, Georgia, on January 31, 1919, and was raised in poverty by his mother during times of segregation, and

WHEREAS, he attended Muir Technical High School and Pasadena Junior College in Pasadena, California, and then went on to the University of California, Los Angeles, where his education continued until, just a few credits shy of his bachelor's degree, he was forced to leave due to financial issues, and

WHEREAS, he began playing semi-professional sports in 1941 when he joined the Honolulu Bears, a racially integrated football team, but his sports career was interrupted when, later that same year, he was drafted into the United States Army, and

WHEREAS, after existing policy was challenged and changed to allow black men to attend Officer Training School, Jackie Robinson was commissioned to Lieutenant in 1943, and

WHEREAS, he was honorably discharged from service in 1944 and began his baseball career with the Kansas City Monarchs in 1945 upon joining the American Negro League, and

WHEREAS, on October 23, 1945, Jackie Robinson began playing for the Montreal Royals, thereby distinguishing himself as the first black man to play for an all-white baseball team, NOW, THEREFORE,
