14	Prevention to seek and accept grants or funds
15	from any source to support its operation;
16	creating s. 14.20195, F.S.; creating the
17	Suicide Prevention Coordinating Council within
18	the Statewide Office for Suicide Prevention;
19	providing the scope of activities for the
20	coordinating council; creating an interagency
21	workgroup for state agencies within the
22	coordinating council in order to coordinate
23	state agency plans for suicide prevention;
24	authorizing the coordinating council to
25	assemble an ad hoc committee to advise the
26	coordinating council; providing for membership
27	on the coordinating council; authorizing the
28	council to accept grants and other funding;
29	providing an appropriation and authorizing an
30	additional position; providing an effective
31	date.

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   Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
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           Section 1. Section 14.2019, Florida Statutes, is
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   created to read:
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           14.2019 Statewide Office for Suicide Prevention .--
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          (1) The Statewide Office for Suicide Prevention is
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   created within the Executive Office of the Governor.
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          (2) The statewide office shall, within available
   <u>resources:</u>
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          (a) Develop a network of community-based programs to
   improve suicide-prevention initiatives. The network shall
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   identify and work to eliminate barriers that impede providing
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   suicide-prevention services to individuals who are at risk of
   suicide. The network shall consist of stakeholders advocating
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   suicide prevention, including, but not limited to,
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   not-for-profit suicide-prevention organizations, faith-based
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   suicide-prevention organizations, law enforcement agencies,
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   first responders to emergency calls, suicide-prevention
   community coalitions, schools and universities, mental health
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   agencies, substance-abuse treatment agencies, health care
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   providers, and school personnel.
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          (b) Implement the statewide plan prepared by the
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   Suicide Prevention Coordinating Council.
          (c) Increase public awareness concerning topics
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   relating to suicide prevention.
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          (d) Coordinate education and training curricula in
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   suicide-prevention efforts for law enforcement personnel,
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   first responders to emergency calls, health care providers,
   school employees, and other persons who may have contact with
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   persons at risk of suicide.
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1	(3) Contingent upon a specific appropriation, a
2	<u>coordinator shall be employed for the Statewide Office for</u>
3	Suicide Prevention. In selecting the coordinator, it should be
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4	considered whether a candidate has:
5	(a) The following education and employment experience:
6	<u>1. A bachelor's degree in social work, psychology,</u>
7	sociology, counseling, public health, or a closely related
8	field and 5 or more years of work experience in behavioral
9	health care or a closely related field.
10	2. A master's or a doctoral degree in social work,
11	psychology, sociology, counseling, public health, or a closely
12	related field and 2 or more years of work experience in
13	behavioral health or a closely related field.
14	(b) The following skills:
15	1. Significant professional experience in social
16	services, mental health, or a closely related field.
17	2. Knowledge of group behavior and dynamics, methods
18	of facilitation, community development, behavioral health
19	treatment and prevention programs, and community-based
20	behavioral health problems.
21	3. Experience in working with individuals and groups
22	that are representative of the ethnic and racial diversity of
23	the state.
24	4. Experience in writing grant proposals and technical
25	reports.
26	(4) The coordinator shall:
27	(a) Work with the state agencies that are members of
28	the Suicide Prevention Coordinating Council to integrate state
29	agency programs for suicide prevention into a unified
30	statewide plan. The unified statewide plan must include a
31	suicide-prevention communication plan among state agencies.
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1	(b) Review local, state, and national
2	suicide-prevention programs for examples of innovative
3	suicide-prevention models. If innovative models are
4	discovered, the coordinator shall prepare a report to describe
5	the feasibility of implementing some or all of the innovative
б	models in this state. The report must be submitted to the
7	Suicide Prevention Coordinating Council.
8	(c) Develop and maintain an Internet website that has
9	links to appropriate suicide-prevention resource documents,
10	suicide hotlines, state and community mental health agencies,
11	and appropriate national suicide-prevention organizations.
12	(d) Identify and disseminate information regarding
13	crisis services for suicide prevention.
14	(e) Join with stakeholders in suicide prevention in
15	order to:
16	1. Develop public awareness and media campaigns in
17	each county directed towards persons who are at risk of
18	suicide.
19	2. Develop education and training programs for suicide
20	prevention. The education and training programs must be
21	directed first to persons who have face-to-face contact with
22	individuals who may be at risk of suicide. The training must
23	assist persons to recognize when an individual is at risk of
24	suicide and how to properly refer those individuals to
25	treatment or support services.
26	(f) Provide technical assistance to educational
27	activities for residents of this state relating to suicide
28	prevention.
29	(q) Cooperate with school districts to develop
30	training and counseling programs for school-based
31	suicide-prevention activities. The coordinator and school

1 districts must also develop a method by which to evaluate each 2 prevention training and counseling program. (h) Review current research data and findings to 3 4 identify at-risk populations, factors relating to suicide, and 5 suicide-prevention activities and disseminate this research to 6 the Suicide Prevention Coordinating Council to develop 7 strategies for preventing suicide. 8 (i) Develop and submit proposals to agencies of the state and federal governments and to nongovernmental 9 10 organizations for funding suicide-prevention activities. (5) The Statewide Office for Suicide Prevention may 11 12 seek and accept grants or funds from any federal, state, or 13 local source to support its operation and defray the expenses incurred in its operation and implementation. 14 (6) Agencies under the control of the Governor or the 15 Governor and Cabinet are directed, and all others are 16 17 encouraged, to provide information and support to the 18 Statewide Office for Suicide Prevention as requested. Section 2. Section 14.20195, Florida Statutes, is 19 created to read: 20 21 14.20195 Suicide Prevention Coordinating Council; creation; membership; duties.--There is created within the 2.2 23 Statewide Office for Suicide Prevention a Suicide Prevention Coordinating Council. The council shall develop strategies for 2.4 preventing suicide. 25 (1) SCOPE OF ACTIVITY. -- The Suicide Prevention 26 27 Coordinating Council is a council as defined in s. 20.03(9) 2.8 and shall: (a) Advise the Statewide Office for Suicide Prevention 29 30 regarding the development of a statewide plan for suicide 31

1	prevention, with the quiding principle being that suicide is a
2	preventable problem. The statewide plan must:
3	1. Align and provide direction for statewide
4	suicide-prevention initiatives.
5	2. Establish partnerships with state and private
б	agencies to promote public awareness of suicide prevention.
7	3. Address specific populations in this state who are
8	<u>at risk for suicide.</u>
9	4. Improve access to help individuals in acute
10	situations.
11	5. Identify resources to support the implementation of
12	the statewide plan.
13	(b) Assemble an ad hoc advisory committee with
14	membership from outside the council when necessary in order
15	for the council to receive advice and assistance in carrying
16	<u>out its responsibilities.</u>
17	(c) Advise the Statewide Office for Suicide
18	Prevention.
19	(d) Make findings and recommendations regarding
20	suicide-prevention programs and activities. The council shall
21	prepare an annual report and present it to the Governor, the
22	President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of
23	Representatives by January 1, 2007, and each year thereafter.
24	The annual report must describe the status of existing and
25	planned initiatives identified in the statewide plan for
26	suicide prevention and any recommendations arising therefrom.
27	It shall also include information about any innovative models
28	identified in accordance with s. 14.2019(4)(b) for which
29	legislative action may be required for implementation.
30	(2) MEMBERSHIP The Suicide Prevention Coordinating
31	Council shall consist of 26 members.

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1 (a) Twelve members shall be appointed by the director of the Office of Drug Control and shall represent the 2 following organizations: 3 4 1. The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Corporation, 5 described in s. 394.655. Inc. б 2. The Florida Association of School Psychologists. 7 3. The Florida Sheriffs Association. 4. The Florida Council for Community Mental Health. 16 12. 17 (b) The following state officials or their designees 18 shall serve on the coordinating council: 1. The Secretary of Elderly Affairs. 19 2. The Secretary of Health. 2.0 21 3. The Commissioner of Education. 22 The Secretary of Health Care Administration. 23 5. The Secretary of Juvenile Justice. 6. The Secretary of Corrections. 2.4 7. 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1	(c) The Governor shall appoint three additional
2	members to the coordinating council. The appointees must have
3	expertise critical to the prevention of suicide or represent
4	an organization that is not already represented on the
5	coordinating council.
б	(d) For the members appointed by the director of the
7	Office of Drug Control, six members shall be appointed to
8	initial terms of 3 years and six members shall be appointed to
9	initial terms of 4 years. For the members appointed by the
10	Governor, two members shall be appointed to initial terms of 4
11	years and one member shall be appointed to an initial term of
12	<u>3 years. Thereafter, such members shall serve for terms of 4</u>
13	years. Any vacancy on the coordinating council shall be filled
14	in the same manner as the original appointment, and any member
15	appointed to fill a vacancy occurring because of death,
16	resignation, or ineligibility for membership shall serve only
17	for the unexpired term of the member's predecessor. A member
18	is eligible for reappointment.
19	(e) The director of the Office of Drug Control shall
20	be a nonvoting member of the coordinating council and shall
21	<u>act as chair.</u>
22	(f) Members of the coordinating council shall serve
23	without compensation. Any member of the coordinating council
24	who is a public employee is entitled to reimbursement for per
25	diem and travel expenses as provided in s. 112.061.
26	(3) MEETINGSThe coordinating council shall meet at
27	least quarterly or upon the call of the chair. The council
28	meetings may be held via teleconference or other electronic
29	means.
30	(4) FUNDING The coordinating council may seek and
31	accept grants or funds from any federal, state, or local

1	source to support its operation and defray the expenses
2	incurred in its operation and implementation of this section.
3	Section 3. The sum of \$100,000 is appropriated from
4	the General Revenue Fund, and one additional full-time
5	equivalent position is authorized, to the Office of Drug
б	Control for the purpose of implementing this act during the
7	<u>2006-2007 fiscal year.</u>
8	Section 4. This act shall take effect July 1, 2006.
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
