22	Campaign Council to be administratively housed in Workforce

25	state with the goal of providing economic benefits services			
26	and related information to Florida citizens.			
27	(2) The council shall consist of the following			
28	members, each appointed by the Governor except as otherwise			
29	provided:			
30	(a) One member of the Senate appointed by the			
31	President of the Senate, who shall serve as an ex officio,			
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1	nonvoting member.				
2	(b) One member of the House of Representatives				
3	appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, who				
4	shall serve as an ex officio, nonvoting member.				
5	(c) The Chief Financial Officer or his or her				
6	<u>designee, who shall serve as an ex officio, nonvoting member.</u>				
7	(d) The Commissioner of Education or his or her				
8	designee, who shall serve as an ex officio, nonvoting member.				
9	(e) Four persons representing different Prosperity				
10	Campaigns in the state.

13	(g) One representative from the Florida Bankers

2	(3) Council members shall be appointed to serve 2-year			
3	terms beginning July 1, 2006. A vacancy on the council shall			
4	be filled for the balance of the unexpired term in the same

6	(4) The council shall meet quarterly or upon the call			
7	of the chair. Annually, at the meeting in the first quarter,			
8	officers consisting of a chair, vice chair, and secretary			
9	shall be elected to serve until a successor is elected. No

31	council shall provide a detailed report to the Governor, the			
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1 President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives on the council's performance of the 2 responsibilities required by subsection (6). Paragraph (i) of subsection (1) of section 10 11 1003.43, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 1003.43 General requirements for high school 12 13 graduation.--(1) Graduation requires successful completion of 14 15 either a minimum of 24 academic credits in grades 9 through 12 or an International Baccalaureate curriculum. The 24 credits 16 shall be distributed as follows: 17 (i) One-half credit in life management skills to 18 include instruction in financial literacy focused on the 19 20 importance of financial management, savings, investments, credit scores, and other relevant subjects; consumer 21 22 education: positive emotional development: marriage and relationship skill-based education; - nutrition; - parenting 23 24 skills; - prevention of human immunodeficiency virus infection and acquired immune deficiency syndrome and other sexually 25 transmissible diseases: - benefits of sexual abstinence and 26 consequences of teenage pregnancy; information and 27 28 instruction on breast cancer detection and breast 29 self-examination; cardiopulmonary resuscitation; drug education: $\overline{\cdot}$, and the hazards of smoking. 30 31

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1 District school boards may award a maximum of one-half credit in social studies and one-half elective credit for student 2 completion of nonpaid voluntary community or school service 3 4 work. Students choosing this option must complete a minimum of 75 hours of service in order to earn the one-half credit in 5 either category of instruction. Credit may not be earned for 6 7 service provided as a result of court action. District school boards that approve the award of credit for student volunteer 8 service shall develop guidelines regarding the award of the 9 10 credit, and school principals are responsible for approving 11 specific volunteer activities. A course designated in the Course Code Directory as grade 9 through grade 12 that is 12 taken below the 9th grade may be used to satisfy high school 13 graduation requirements or Florida Academic Scholars award 14 15 requirements as specified in a district school board's student progression plan.
