Section 1012.985, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 18 Statewide system for inservice professional 19 1012.985 development. --20 The intent of this section is to establish a statewide 21 (1)system of professional development that provides a wide range of 22 23 targeted inservice training to teachers, managers, and Page 1 of 4

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24 administrative personnel designed to upgrade skills and 25 knowledge needed to reach world class standards in education. 26 The system shall consist of a network of professional 27 development academies in each region of the state which that are operated in partnership with area business partners to develop 28 29 and deliver high-quality training programs purchased by school districts. The academies shall be established to meet the human 30 resource development needs of professional educators, schools, 31 and school districts. Funds appropriated for the initiation of 32 professional development academies shall be allocated by the 33 Commissioner of Education, unless otherwise provided in an 34 35 appropriations act. To be eligible for startup funds, the 36 academy must:

37 <u>(a) (1)</u> Be established by the collaborative efforts of one 38 or more district school boards, members of the business 39 community, and the postsecondary educational institutions which 40 may award college credits for courses taught at the academy.

41 (b)(2) Demonstrate the capacity to provide effective 42 training to improve teaching skills in the areas of elementary 43 reading and mathematics, the use of instructional technology, 44 high school algebra, and classroom management, and to deliver 45 such training using face-to-face, distance learning, and 46 individualized computer-based delivery systems.

47 <u>(c)(3)</u> Propose a plan for responding in an effective and 48 timely manner to the professional development needs of teachers, 49 managers, administrative personnel, schools, and school 50 districts relating to improving student achievement and meeting 51 state and local education goals.

52 <u>(d)</u> (4) Demonstrate the ability to provide high-quality 53 trainers and training, appropriate followup and coaching for all 54 participants, and support school personnel in positively 55 impacting student performance.

(e) (5) Be operated under contract with its public partners 56 57 and governed by an independent board of directors, which should include at least one district school superintendent and one 58 59 district school board chair from the participating school districts, the president of the collective bargaining unit that 60 represents the majority of the region's teachers, and at least 61 three individuals who are not employees or elected or appointed 62 officials of the participating school districts. Regional 63 64 educational consortia as defined in s. 1001.451 satisfy the 65 requirements of this paragraph subsection.

(f) Be financed during the first year of operation by 66 67 an equal or greater match from private funding sources and demonstrate the ability to be self-supporting within 1 year 68 after opening through fees for services, grants, or private 69 70 contributions. Regional educational consortia as defined in s. 1001.451 which serve rural areas of critical economic concern 71 72 are exempt from the funding match required by this paragraph 73 subsection.

74 <u>(g)</u>(7) Own or lease a facility that can be used to deliver 75 training onsite and through distance learning and other 76 technology-based delivery systems. The participating district 77 school boards may lease a site or facility to the academy for a 78 nominal fee and may pay all or part of the costs of renovating a

CS 79 facility to accommodate the academy. The academy is responsible for all operational, maintenance, and repair costs. 80 (h) (8) Provide professional development services for the 81 82 participating school districts as specified in the contract and may provide professional development services to other school 83 84 districts, private schools, and individuals on a fee-forservices basis. 85 (2) Upon compliance with the requirements for the first 86 87 year of operation in paragraph (1)(f), a regional professional 88 development academy: 89 May receive funds from the Department of Education or (a) 90 as provided in the General Appropriations Act for the purpose of 91 developing programs, expanding services, assessing inservice training and professional development, or other programs that 92 are consistent with the mission of the academy and the needs of 93 the state and region; and 94 Is not, by virtue of providing services to one or more 95 (b) 96 school districts, a component of any school district or any 97 governmental unit to which the regional professional development academy provides services. 98 Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2006, if 99 100 House Joint Resolution 447 or similar legislation is adopted in the same legislative session. 101
