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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Section 1003.495, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

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1003.495 Advanced Placement courses and teacher training.--

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(1) The purpose of this section is to ensure that each Florida student receives a sufficient education for success after high school and that all students have equal access to a substantive and rigorous curriculum that is designed to

challenge their minds, enhance their knowledge and skills, and prepare them for success in college and work.

(2) For purposes of this section:

- (a) "Advanced Placement course" means a course sponsored by the College Board that is offered for college credit at the high school level and taught by an Advanced Placement teacher.
- (b) "Advanced Placement Vertical Team" means a group of teachers and educators from different grade levels in a given discipline who work cooperatively to develop and implement a vertically aligned program aimed at helping students from diverse backgrounds acquire the academic skills necessary for success in Advanced Placement courses and other challenging courses.
- (c) "Pre-Advanced Placement teacher training" means a set of professional development resources and services designed to equip middle and high school teachers with the strategies and tools they need to engage their students in active, high-level learning, thereby ensuring that middle and high school students develop the skills, habits of mind, and concepts they need to succeed in Advanced Placement courses.
- (3) By the 2007-2008 school year, each high school in the state must offer at least four Advanced Placement courses, one each in English, mathematics, science, and a foreign language taught by an Advanced Placement teacher.
- (4) The State Board of Education shall establish clear, specific, and challenging training guidelines that require each teacher of an Advanced Placement course to have obtained

recognized Advanced Placement teacher training endorsed by the College Board.

- (5) Funds to provide Advanced Placement and Pre-Advanced Placement teacher training to Florida teachers shall be provided annually in the General Appropriations Act. This training shall:
- (a) Provide Advanced Placement teachers and Pre-Advanced
  Placement teachers with the necessary content knowledge and
  instructional skills to prepare students for success in Advanced
  Placement courses and examinations and other advanced course
  examinations and mastery of postsecondary course content.
- (b) Provide school administrators and counselors with professional development that will enable them to create strong and effective Advanced Placement programs in their schools.
- (c) Provide teachers in the middle grades and high school with Advanced Placement Vertical Team training and other Pre-Advanced Placement professional development to prepare students for success in Advanced Placement courses.
- (d) Support the implementation of an instructional program for students in grades 6-12 that provides an integrated set of instructional materials, diagnostic assessments, and teacher professional development in reading, writing, and mathematics that prepares all students for enrollment and success in Advanced Placement courses and in college.
- (6) In order to ensure that each student receives a sufficient education for success in college or work after high school and that all students have equal access to a substantive and rigorous curriculum that is designed to challenge their minds and enhance their knowledge and skills, school districts

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must offer rigorous courses in grades 6-11 that prepare students for the demands of Advanced Placement coursework.

(7) The State Board of Education shall:

- (a) Seek federal funding through the Advanced Placement
  Incentive Program and the Math and Science Partnership Program
  to support Advanced Placement and Pre-Advanced Placement teacher
  training and the implementation of an integrated instructional
  program for students in grades 6-12 in reading, writing, and
  mathematics that prepares all students for enrollment and
  success in Advanced Placement courses and in college.
- (b) Focus state and federal funding to carry out activities that target school districts serving high concentrations of low-income and underrepresented students.
- (c) Provide a plan of communication which includes, but need not be limited to, disseminating to parents materials that emphasize the importance of Advanced Placement courses or other advanced courses to a student's ability to gain access to and to succeed in postsecondary education and materials that emphasize the importance of the PSAT/NMSQT, which provide diagnostic feedback on skills and relate student scores to the probability of success in Advanced Placement courses and examinations. Such information shall also be disseminated to students, teachers, counselors, administrators, school districts, community colleges, and state universities.
- (d) Annually evaluate the impact of the implementation of this section on the rates of student enrollment and success in Advanced Placement courses, on high school graduation rates, and on college enrollment rates.
