I. Summary:

This bill adds an exemption to the Florida Veterinary Practice Act. The act would not apply to a part-time worker or an independent contractor who is hired by the owner to assist with herd-management and animal husbandry tasks. These tasks could include castration, dehorning, parasite control, and debeaking. It also exempts a person hired on a part-time basis or temporary basis or as an independent contractor by the owner to provide manual hand floating of teeth¹or farriery of equines.²

The bill provides that it shall take effect upon becoming law, and that it applies retroactively to July 1, 2006.

This bill amends section 474.203 of the Florida Statutes.

II. Present Situation:

Complimentary and alternative medicines and therapies are those health care practices that are not currently an integral part of conventional medicine. These include a wide range of factors that influence health and wellness such as nutrition advice, homeopathy, health risk assessment, communication, aromatherapy, therapeutic touch, acupuncture, and massage therapy. In addition, Florida farriers trim, shoe, and make decisions regarding horses' hoof care, trained and experienced equine dentists provide equine dentistry services that many veterinarians do not provide, and experienced herd management professionals dehorn cattle.

¹ Manual hand floating of teeth is horse dentistry procedure that involves the filing down with non-motorized tools of areas of the teeth that have grown sharp or have uneven wear.

² The application of shoes to horse's hooves.

The Florida Veterinary Practice Act (chapter 424, F.S.), "finds that the practice of veterinary medicine is potentially dangerous to the public health and safety if conducted by incompetent and unlicensed practitioners." This law is unclear as to whether or not the health care services listed above would be considered veterinary medicine by a court of law. At this time, Floridians who perform these health care practices could be charged with a felony if a complaint is filed against them and, after an investigation, the Department of Business and Professional Regulation (DBPR) finds them to be practicing veterinary medicine without a license, even though all of these services are being provided with the consent of the animals' owners.

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

Section 1. Amends s. 474.203, F.S., to add an exemption to the Florida Veterinary Practice Act. The act would not apply to a part-time worker or an independent contractor who is hired by the owner to assist with herd-management and animal husbandry tasks. These tasks could include castration, dehorning, parasite control, and debeaking. It also exempts a person hired on a part-time basis or temporary basis or as an independent contractor by the owner to provide manual hand floating of teeth or farriery of equines.

Section 2. The bill provides that it shall take effect upon becoming law, and that it applies retroactively to July 1, 2006.
