1 A bill to be entitled 2 An act relating to the Florida School for the Deaf and the 3 Blind; amending s. 1002.36, F.S.; authorizing the 4 provision of education services to district school boards 5 upon request; revising powers and duties of the Board of Trustees for the Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind 6 7 relating to requirements for expenditure of certain funds 8 and submission of capital outlay budget requests; 9 authorizing campus police officers to enforce traffic laws; deleting provisions authorizing bonding of campus 10 police officers; amending s. 1013.31, F.S.; including 11 reference to the Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind 12 in provisions relating to educational plant surveys; 13 providing an effective date. 14 15 16 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: 17 18 Section 1. Subsections (1) and (2), paragraphs (e) and (f) 19 of subsection (4), and paragraphs (b) and (d) of subsection (8) of section 1002.36, Florida Statutes, are amended to read: 20 21 1002.36 Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind .--RESPONSIBILITIES. -- The Florida School for the Deaf and 22 (1)23 the Blind, located in St. Johns County, is a state-supported 24 residential public school for hearing-impaired and visually 25 impaired students in preschool through 12th grade. The school is 26 a component of the delivery of public education within Florida's 27 K-20 education system and shall be funded through the Department of Education. The school shall provide educational programs and 28 Page 1 of 11

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29 support services appropriate to meet the education and related 30 evaluation and counseling needs of hearing-impaired and visually 31 impaired students in the state who meet enrollment criteria. 32 Unless otherwise provided by law, the school shall comply with all laws and rules applicable to state agencies. Education 33 34 services may be provided on an outreach basis for sensory-35 impaired children ages 0 through 5 years and to district school 36 boards upon request their parents. Graduates of the Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind shall be eligible for the 37 38 William L. Boyd, IV, Florida Resident Access Grant Program as provided in s. 1009.89. 39

MISSION.--The mission of the Florida School for the 40 (2)Deaf and the Blind is to utilize all available talent, energy, 41 42 and resources to provide free appropriate public education for 43 eligible sensory-impaired students of Florida. As a school of 44 academic excellence, the school shall strive to provide students 45 an opportunity to access education services maximize their 46 individual potential in a caring, safe, unique learning 47 environment to prepare them to be literate, employable, and 48 independent lifelong learners. The school shall provide outreach 49 services that include collaboration with district school boards and shall encourage input from students, staff, parents, and the 50 51 community. As a diverse organization, the school shall foster respect and understanding for each individual. 52

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(4) BOARD OF TRUSTEES.--

54 (e) The board of trustees is invested with full power and55 authority to:

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Appoint a president, faculty, teachers, and other

employees and remove the same as in its judgment may be best and

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fix their compensation.

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59 Procure professional services, such as medical, mental 2. health, architectural, and engineering. 60 Procure legal services without the prior written 3. 62 approval of the Attorney General. 63 Determine eligibility of students and procedure for 4. 64 admission. 5. Provide for the students of the school necessary 65 bedding, clothing, food, and medical attendance and such other 66 things as may be proper for the health and comfort of the 67 students without cost to their parents, except that the board of 68 69 trustees may set tuition and other fees for nonresidents. б. or policy that is not specifically authorized by law. If the bill of sale, will, trust indenture, deed, or other legal conveyance specifies terms and conditions concerning the use of such money or property, the board of trustees shall observe such terms and conditions.

Deposit outside the State Treasury such moneys as are 89 12. 90 received as gifts, donations, or bequests and may disburse and 91 expend such moneys, upon its own warrant, for the use and 92 benefit of the Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind and its 93 students, as the board of trustees deems to be in the best interest of the school and its students. Such money or property 94 95 shall not constitute or be considered a part of any legislative 96 appropriation, and such money shall not be used to compensate 97 any person for engaging in lobbying activities before the House 98 of Representatives or Senate or any committee thereof.

99 13. Sell or convey by bill of sale, deed, or other legal 100 instrument any property, real or personal, received as a gift, 101 donation, or bequest, upon such terms and conditions as the 102 board of trustees deems to be in the best interest of the school 103 and its students.

104 14. Invest such moneys in securities enumerated under s. 105 215.47(1), (2)(d), (3), (4), and (9), and in The Common Fund, an 106 Investment Management Fund exclusively for nonprofit educational 107 institutions.

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(f) The board of trustees shall:

109 1. Prepare and submit legislative budget requests for 110 operations and fixed capital outlay, in accordance with chapter 111 216 and ss. 1011.56 and 1013.60, to the Department of Education Page 4 of 11

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for review and approval. The department must analyze the amount requested for fixed capital outlay to determine if the request is consistent with the school's campus master plan, educational plant survey, and facilities master plan. <u>Projections of</u> <u>facility space needs may exceed the norm space and occupant</u> <u>design criteria established in the State Requirements for</u> Educational Facilities.

119 2. Approve and administer an annual operating budget in120 accordance with ss. 1011.56 and 1011.57.

3. Require all funds received other than gifts, donations, bequests, funds raised by or belonging to student clubs or student organizations, and funds held for specific students or in accounts for individual students to be deposited in the State Treasury and expended as authorized in the General Appropriations Act.

4. Require all purchases to be in accordance with the
provisions of chapter 287 <u>except for purchases made with funds</u>
<u>received as gifts, donations, or bequests, funds raised by or</u>
<u>belonging to student clubs or student organizations, or funds</u>
<u>held for specific students or in accounts for individual</u>
<u>students.</u>

Administer and maintain personnel programs for all 133 5. employees of the board of trustees and the Florida School for 134 135 the Deaf and the Blind who shall be state employees, including 136 the personnel classification and pay plan established in accordance with ss. 110.205(2)(d) and 216.251(2)(a)2. for 137 138 academic and academic administrative personnel, the provisions of chapter 110, and the provisions of law that grant authority 139 Page 5 of 11

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140 to the Department of Management Services over such programs for 141 state employees.

142 6. Give preference in appointment and retention in143 positions of employment as provided within s. 295.07(1).

144 7. Ensure that the Florida School for the Deaf and the 145 Blind complies with s. 1013.351 concerning the coordination of 146 planning between the Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind 147 and local governing bodies.

148 8. Ensure that the Florida School for the Deaf and the 149 Blind complies with s. 112.061 concerning per diem and travel 150 expenses of public officers, employees, and authorized persons 151 with respect to all funds other than funds received as gifts, 152 donations, or bequests, funds raised by or belonging to student 153 clubs or student organizations, or funds held for specific 154 students or in accounts for individual students.

155 9. Adopt a master plan which specifies the mission and objectives of the Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind. The 156 157 plan shall include, but not be limited to, procedures for 158 systematically measuring the school's progress toward meeting its objectives, analyzing changes in the student population, and 159 160 modifying school programs and services to respond to such 161 changes. The plan shall be for a period of 5 years and shall be reviewed for needed modifications every 2 years. The board of 162 163 trustees shall submit the initial plan and subsequent modifications to the Speaker of the House of Representatives and 164 the President of the Senate. 165

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166 10. Designate a portion of the school as "The Verle Allyn
167 Pope Complex for the Deaf," in tribute to the late Senator Verle
168 Allyn Pope.

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(8) CAMPUS POLICE.--

170 Each Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind campus (b) police officer is a law enforcement officer of the state and a 171 172 conservator of the peace who has the authority to arrest, in 173 accordance with the laws of this state, any person for a 174 violation of state law or applicable county or municipal 175 ordinance if that violation occurs on or in any property or facilities of the school. A campus police officer may also 176 arrest a person off campus for a violation committed on campus 177 after a hot pursuit of that person which began on campus. A 178 179 campus police officer shall have full authority to bear arms in 180 the performance of the officer's duties and carry out a search 181 pursuant to a search warrant on the campus. Florida School for 182 the Deaf and the Blind campus police, upon request of the sheriff or local police authority, may serve subpoenas or other 183 184 legal process and may make arrests of persons against whom 185 arrest warrants have been issued or against whom charges have 186 been made for violations of federal or state laws or county or municipal ordinances. Campus police officers shall have 187 authority to enforce traffic laws within the boundaries of the 188 189 campus in accordance with s. 316.640.

(d) The campus police must meet the minimum standards
established by the Criminal Justice Standards and Training
Commission of the Department of Law Enforcement and chapter 943
for law enforcement officers. Each campus police officer must, Page 7 of 11

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194 before entering into the performance of the officer's duties, 195 take the oath of office established by the board of trustees. 196 The board of trustees may obtain and approve a bond on each 197 campus police officer, conditioned upon the officer's faithful 198 performance of the officer's duties, which bond must be payable 199 to the Governor. The board of trustees may determine the amount 200 of the bond. In determining the amount of the bond, the board 201 may consider the amount of money or property likely to be in the 202 custody of the officer at any one time. The board of trustees 203 must provide a uniform set of identifying credentials to each campus police officer it employs. 204

205 Section 2. Paragraph (b) of subsection (1) of section 206 1013.31, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

2071013.31Educational plant survey; localized need208assessment; PECO project funding.--

209 (1) At least every 5 years, each board shall arrange for 210 an educational plant survey, to aid in formulating plans for 211 housing the educational program and student population, faculty, 212 administrators, staff, and auxiliary and ancillary services of 213 the district or campus, including consideration of the local 214 comprehensive plan. The Office of Workforce and Economic 215 Development shall document the need for additional career and adult education programs and the continuation of existing 216 217 programs before facility construction or renovation related to 218 career or adult education may be included in the educational 219 plant survey of a school district or community college that 220 delivers career or adult education programs. Information used by 221 the Office of Workforce and Economic Development to establish Page 8 of 11

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facility needs must include, but need not be limited to, labor market data, needs analysis, and information submitted by the school district or community college.

(b) Required need assessment criteria for district,
community college, college and state university, and Florida
School for the Deaf and the Blind plant surveys.--Educational
plant surveys must use uniform data sources and criteria
specified in this paragraph. Each revised educational plant
survey and each new educational plant survey supersedes previous
surveys.

The school district's survey must be submitted as a 232 1. 233 part of the district educational facilities plan defined in s. 1013.35. To ensure that the data reported to the Department of 234 235 Education as required by this section is correct, the department 236 shall annually conduct an onsite review of 5 percent of the 237 facilities reported for each school district completing a new 238 survey that year. If the department's review finds the data reported by a district is less than 95 percent accurate, within 239 240 1 year from the time of notification by the department the district must submit revised reports correcting its data. If a 241 242 district fails to correct its reports, the commissioner may direct that future fixed capital outlay funds be withheld until 243 such time as the district has corrected its reports so that they 244 are not less than 95 percent accurate. 245

246 2. Each survey of a special facility, joint-use facility, 247 or cooperative career education facility must be based on 248 capital outlay full-time equivalent student enrollment data 249 prepared by the department for school districts, community Page 9 of 11

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colleges, colleges, and universities. A survey of space needs of a joint-use facility shall be based upon the respective space needs of the school districts, community colleges, colleges, and universities, as appropriate. Projections of a school district's facility space needs may not exceed the norm space and occupant design criteria established by the State Requirements for Educational Facilities.

257 Each community college's survey must reflect the 3. 258 capacity of existing facilities as specified in the inventory 259 maintained by the Department of Education. Projections of facility space needs must comply with standards for determining 260 space needs as specified by rule of the State Board of 261 Education. The 5-year projection of capital outlay student 262 263 enrollment must be consistent with the annual report of capital 264 outlay full-time student enrollment prepared by the Department 265 of Education.

266 Each college and state university's survey must reflect 4. the capacity of existing facilities as specified in the 267 268 inventory maintained and validated by the Division of Colleges and Universities. Projections of facility space needs must be 269 270 consistent with standards for determining space needs approved by the Division of Colleges and Universities. The projected 271 capital outlay full-time equivalent student enrollment must be 272 273 consistent with the 5-year planned enrollment cycle for the 274 State University System approved by the Division of Colleges and 275 Universities.

5. The district educational facilities plan of a school district and the educational plant survey of a community Page 10 of 11

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278 college, or college or state university, or the Florida School 279 <u>for the Deaf and the Blind</u> may include space needs that deviate 280 from approved standards for determining space needs if the 281 deviation is justified by the district or institution and 282 approved by the department, as necessary for the delivery of an 283 approved educational program.

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Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2006.

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
