1 The Choice & Innovation Committee recommends the following: 2 Council/Committee Substitute 3 Remove the entire bill and insert: 4 5 House Joint Resolution 6 A joint resolution proposing an amendment to Section 1 of 7 Article IX of the State Constitution relating to public 8 education. 9 10 Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Florida: 11 12 That the following amendment to Section 1 of Article IX of the State Constitution is agreed to and shall be submitted to 13 the electors of this state for approval or rejection at the next 14 15 general election or at an earlier special election specifically authorized by law for that purpose: 16 17 ARTICLE IX EDUCATION 18 19 SECTION 1. Public education .--The education of children is a fundamental value of 20 (a) 21 the people of the State of Florida. It is, therefore, a 22 paramount duty of the state to make adequate provision for the education of all children residing within its borders. Adequate 23 Page 1 of 5

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provision shall be made by law for a uniform, efficient, safe, secure, and high quality system of free public schools that allows students to obtain a high quality education and for the establishment, maintenance, and operation of institutions of higher learning and other public education programs that the needs of the people may require.

30 (b) To assure that children attending public schools 31 obtain a high quality education, the legislature shall make 32 adequate provision to ensure that, by the beginning of the 2009-33 <u>2010</u> 2010 school year <u>and for each school year thereafter</u>, there 34 are a sufficient number of classrooms so that:

(1) The <u>school district average</u> maximum number of students who are assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public school classrooms for prekindergarten through grade 3 does not exceed 18 students <u>and the number of students who are assigned</u> to one teacher in an individual class does not exceed 23 students;

The school district average maximum number of students 41 (2)who are assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public 42 43 school classrooms for grades 4 through 8 does not exceed 22 students and the number of students who are assigned to one 44 45 teacher in an individual class does not exceed 27 students; and The school district average maximum number of students 46 (3) 47 who are assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public 48 school classrooms for grades 9 through 12 does not exceed 25 students and the number of students who are assigned to one 49 50 teacher in an individual class does not exceed 30 students.

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The class size requirements of this subsection do not apply to 52 extracurricular or virtual classes. Payment of the costs 53 54 associated with reducing class size to meet these requirements 55 is the responsibility of the state and not of local school schools districts. Beginning with the 2003-2004 fiscal year, the 56 57 legislature shall provide sufficient funds to reduce the school district average class size number of students in each classroom 58 59 by at least two students per year until the school district 60 average class size for each of the grade groupings maximum number of students per classroom does not exceed the 61 62 requirements of this subsection.

(c) By the beginning of the 2009-2010 school year and for
each school year thereafter, at least sixty-five percent of
total funds, as defined by law, received by school districts for
operational expenditures shall be expended for purposes directly
related to classroom instruction, as defined by law.

68 (d) In exceptional circumstances a school district may 69 request from the governor a temporary waiver of the class size 70 requirements of subsection (b) or the classroom instruction 71 expenditure requirement of subsection (c), which the governor 72 may grant, partially grant, or deny.

73 <u>(e)(1)(b)</u> Every four-year old child in Florida shall be 74 provided by the state a high quality <u>prekindergarten</u> pre- 75 <u>kindergarten</u> learning opportunity in the form of an early 76 childhood development and education program which shall be 77 voluntary, high quality, free, and delivered according to 78 professionally accepted standards. An early childhood 79 development and education program means an organized program Page 3 of 5

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80 designed to address and enhance each child's ability to make age 81 appropriate progress in an appropriate range of settings in the 82 development of language and cognitive capabilities and 83 emotional, social, regulatory, and moral capacities through 84 education in basic skills and such other skills as the 85 legislature may determine to be appropriate.

(2) (2) (c) The early childhood education and development 86 87 programs provided by reason of this subsection subparagraph (b) 88 shall be implemented no later than the beginning of the 2005 89 school year through funds generated in addition to those used for existing education, health, and development programs. 90 Existing education, health, and development programs are those 91 92 funded by the state as of January 1, 2002, that provided for 93 child or adult education, health care, or development.

94 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the following statement be 95 placed on the ballot:

ARTICLE IX, SECTION 1

REQUIRING 65 PERCENT OF EDUCATION FUNDS FOR CLASSROOM 98 99 RELATED INSTRUCTION; FLEXIBLE CLASS SIZE REDUCTION 100 IMPLEMENTATION. -- Proposing an amendment to the State 101 Constitution to require school districts to expend at least 65 102 percent of their operational funds for classroom related instruction as defined by law; to provide flexibility for school 103 104 districts in meeting class size reduction requirements by 105 calculating compliance at a school district average number of 106 students who are assigned to a teacher in specified grades; to specify the maximum number of students who may be assigned to 107 Page 4 of 5

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108 one teacher in an individual class; to require implementation of 109 the class size reduction requirements and the classroom 110 instruction expenditure requirement by the beginning of the 111 2009-2010 school year and for each school year thereafter; to 112 exempt virtual classes from the class size requirements; and to 113 authorize, in exceptional circumstances, a school district to 114 request from the Governor a temporary waiver of the class size 115 reduction requirements or the 65-percent classroom instruction 116 expenditure requirement.

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
