House Joint Resolution
A joint resolution proposing an amendment to Section 1 of Article IX of the State Constitution relating to public school classroom instruction expenditures.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

That the following amendment to Section 1 of Article IX of the State Constitution is agreed to and shall be submitted to the electors of this state for approval or rejection at the next general election or at an earlier special election specifically authorized by law for that purpose:

ARTICLE IX
EDUCATION
SECTION 1. Public education.--
(a) The education of children is a fundamental value of the people of the State of Florida. It is, therefore, a paramount duty of the state to make adequate provision for the education of all children residing within its borders. Adequate provision shall include compliance with the requirements of subsection (b) relating to the total operational expenditures that must be spent on classroom instruction. Adequate provision shall be made by law for a uniform, efficient, safe, secure, and high quality system of free public schools that allows students to obtain a high quality education and for the establishment, maintenance, and operation of institutions of higher learning and other public education programs that the needs of the people may require. To assure that children attending public schools

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obtain a high quality education, the legislature shall make adequate provision to ensure that, by the beginning of the 2010 school year, there are a sufficient number of classrooms so that:
(1) The maximum number of students who are assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public school classrooms for prekindergarten through grade 3 does not exceed 18 students;
(2) The maximum number of students who are assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public school classrooms for grades 4 through 8 does not exceed 22 students; and
(3) The maximum number of students who are assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public school classrooms for grades 9 through 12 does not exceed 25 students.

The class size requirements of this subsection do not apply to extracurricular classes. Payment of the costs associated with reducing class size to meet these requirements is the responsibility of the state and not of local school schools districts. Beginning with the $2003-2004$ fiscal year, the legislature shall provide sufficient funds to reduce the average number of students in each classroom by at least two students per year until the maximum number of students per classroom does not exceed the requirements of this subsection.
(b) Beginning with the 2007-2008 school year and for each school year thereafter, each school district shall spend at least sixty-five percent of its total federal, state, and local funds received for operational expenditures on expenses directly related to classroom instruction, as defined by law, provided
that a school district spending sixty-three percent or less of such operational expenditures on classroom instruction in the 2006-2007 school year shall increase the amount it spends on its classroom instruction by two percent of such operational expenditures per year until the amount it spends on its classroom instruction reaches at least sixty-five percent of such operational expenditures. In exceptional circumstances a school district may request from the governor a temporary waiver of the requirements of this subsection, which the governor may grant, partially grant, or deny.
(c)(1)(b) Every four-year old child in Florida shall be provided by the state a high quality prekindergarten prekindergarten learning opportunity in the form of an early childhood development and education program which shall be voluntary, high quality, free, and delivered according to professionally accepted standards. An early childhood development and education program means an organized program designed to address and enhance each child's ability to make age appropriate progress in an appropriate range of settings in the development of language and cognitive capabilities and emotional, social, regulatory, and moral capacities through education in basic skills and such other skills as the legislature may determine to be appropriate.
(2) The early childhood education and development programs provided by reason of this subsection subaraph (b) shall be implemented no later than the beginning of the 2005 school year through funds generated in addition to those used for existing education, health, and development programs.

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Existing education, health, and development programs are those funded by the state as of January 1, 2002, that provided for child or adult education, health care, or development.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the following statement be placed on the ballot:

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
ARTICLE IX, SECTION 1
CLASSROOM INSTRUCTION EXPENDITURES.--Proposing an amendment to the State Constitution to provide that adequate provision for the education of all children residing within the state's borders includes compliance with requirements for expenditures on classroom instruction; to require each school district, beginning in the 2007-2008 school year and for each school year thereafter, to spend at least 65 percent of its total federal, state, and local funds received for operational expenditures on expenses directly related to classroom instruction, as defined by law; to provide for a 2 -percent phase-in to meet the 65percent classroom instruction expenditure requirement; and to authorize, in exceptional circumstances, a school district to request from the Governor a temporary waiver of the classroom instruction expenditure requirements.
