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24	Section 1. Section 445.057, Florida Statutes, is created

27	(1) There is established the Florida Prosperity Campaign
28	Council to be administratively housed in Workforce Florida, Inc.
29	The council shall develop, enhance, and assist in the
30	coordination of Prosperity Campaigns throughout the state with
31	the goal of providing economic benefits services and related
32	information to Florida citizens.
33	(2) The council shall consist of the following members,
34	each appointed by the Governor except as otherwise provided:
35	(a) One member of the Senate appointed by the President of
36	the Senate, who shall serve as an ex officio, nonvoting member.
37	(b) One member of the House of Representatives appointed
38	by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, who shall serve
39	as an ex officio, nonvoting member.
40	(c) The Chief Financial Officer or his or her designee,
41	who shall serve as an ex officio, nonvoting member.

Work with the Department of Education in developing 86 (C) 87 financial literacy instruction to be part of the life management 88 skills course pursuant to s. 1003.43. 89 Take other action as necessary to meet its statutory (d) 90 mission as described in subsection (1). (7) By June 30, 2007, and annually thereafter, the council 91 92 shall provide a detailed report to the Governor, the President 93 of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives on the council's performance of the responsibilities required by 94 95 subsection (6). The report shall include an assessment of the effectiveness of Prosperity Campaigns and an evaluation of 96 97 obstacles to that effectiveness and shall make recommendations 98 for legislative action. The provisions of this section shall stand repealed on 99 (8) July 1, 2010, unless saved from repeal through reenactment by 100 101 the Legislature. Section 2. Paragraph (i) of subsection (1) of section 102 103 1003.43, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 104 1003.43 General requirements for high school graduation .--Graduation requires successful completion of either a 105 (1) 106 minimum of 24 academic credits in grades 9 through 12 or an

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107 International Baccalaureate curriculum. The 24 credits shall be 108 distributed as follows:

(i) One-half credit in life management skills to include 109 110 instruction in financial literacy focused on the importance of financial management, savings, investments, credit scores, and 111 112 other relevant subjects; consumer education; - positive emotional development; τ marriage and relationship skill-based education; τ 113 nutrition; τ parenting skills; τ prevention of human 114 115 immunodeficiency virus infection and acquired immune deficiency 116 syndrome and other sexually transmissible diseases; τ benefits of 117 sexual abstinence and consequences of teenage pregnancy; τ information and instruction on breast cancer detection and 118 breast self-examination; τ cardiopulmonary resuscitation; τ drug 119 education; τ and the hazards of smoking. 120

District school boards may award a maximum of one-half credit in 122 social studies and one-half elective credit for student 123 completion of nonpaid voluntary community or school service 124 125 work. Students choosing this option must complete a minimum of 75 hours of service in order to earn the one-half credit in 126 either category of instruction. Credit may not be earned for 127 128 service provided as a result of court action. District school boards that approve the award of credit for student volunteer 129 service shall develop quidelines regarding the award of the 130 credit, and school principals are responsible for approving 131 specific volunteer activities. A course designated in the Course 132 Code Directory as grade 9 through grade 12 that is taken below 133 the 9th grade may be used to satisfy high school graduation 134 Page 5 of 6

137	A student shall be granted credit toward meeting the
138	requirements of this subsection for equivalent courses, as
139	identified pursuant to s. 1007.271(6), taken through dual
140	enrollment.
141	Section 3. The sum of \$162,000 is appropriated from the
142	General Revenue Fund in fiscal year 2006-2007 to Workforce
143	Florida, Inc., to fund the Florida Prosperity Campaign Council
144	as created by this act.
