CS 24 474.203 Exemptions.--This chapter shall not apply to: Any person, or the person's regular or temporary 25 (5) employee, or the person's independent contractor administering 26 27 to the ills, or injuries, wellness, or normally accepted animal husbandry practices of her or his own animals, including, but 28 29 not limited to, castration, spaying, farriery, nonmechanical hand floating of teeth, debeaking, parasite control, and 30 dehorning of herd, livestock, or flock animals, unless title has 31 been transferred or employment provided for the purpose of 32 circumventing this law. This exemption shall not apply to out-33 of-state veterinarians practicing temporarily in the state. 34 However, only a veterinarian may immunize or treat an animal for 35 36 diseases which are communicable to humans and which are of 37 public health significance. 38 (9) (a) An independent contractor who, under the supervision of a person who is administering to the wellness, 39 ills, or injuries of her or his own livestock, herd, or flock 40 animals, provides health care services to the animals. For 41 purposes of this subsection, the health care services described 42 in this paragraph are nonmedical, which means nonprescription 43 and nonsurgical, and consist of acupressure, aromatherapy, 44 45 animal communication, farriery, flower essence therapy, homeopathy, light therapy, magnet therapy, massage and other 46 47 touch therapies, hydrotherapy, nutritional counseling, and manual equine teeth floating. 48 49 (b) An independent contractor who provides nonmedical health care services described in this subsection for livestock, 50 51 herd, or flock animals and is not a veterinarian shall: Page 2 of 4
