32	Section 1. Section 1003.453, Florida Statutes, is created

36	(1) By September 1, 2006, each school district shall							
37	submit to the Department of Education a copy of its school							
38	wellness policy as required by the Child Nutrition and WIC							
39	Reauthorization Act of 2004 and a copy of its physical education

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CS 52 (3) By December 1, 2006, the department must provide on its website links to resources that include information 53 54 reqarding: 55 (a) Classroom instruction on the benefits of exercise and healthful eating. 56 Classroom instruction on the health hazards of using 57 (b) tobacco and being exposed to tobacco smoke. 58 59 The eight components of a coordinated school health (C) program, including health education, physical education, health 60 services, and nutrition services. 61 62 The core measures for school health and wellness, such (d) 63 as the School Health Index. 64 (e) Access for each student to the nutritional content of 65 foods and beverages and to healthful food choices in accordance with the dietary guidelines of the United States Department of 66 67 Agriculture. Multiple examples of school wellness policies for 68 (f) 69 school districts. 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79 Section 2. Section 1003.455, Florida Statutes, is amended80 to read:

1003.455 Physical education; assessment.--

82 (1)It is the responsibility of each district school board to develop a physical education program that stresses physical 83 84 fitness and encourages healthful healthy, active lifestyles and to encourage all students in prekindergarten through grade 12 to 85 participate in physical education. Physical education shall 86 consist of physical activities of at least a moderate intensity 87 level and for a duration sufficient to provide a significant 88 89 health benefit to students, subject to the differing capabilities of students. All physical education programs and 90 91 curricula must be reviewed by a certified physical education 92 instructor.

93 (2) Each district school board shall, no later than 94 December 1, 2004, adopt a written physical education policy that 95 details the school district's physical education program and 96 expected program outcomes. Each district school board shall 97 provide a copy of its written policy to the Department of 98 Education by December 15, 2004.

Each district school board is encouraged to provide 99 (3) 100 150 minutes of physical education each week for students in 101 kindergarten through grade 5 and 225 minutes each week for 102 students in grades 6 through 8. Any district that does not adopt 103 a physical education policy by December 1, 2004, shall, at a minimum, implement a mandatory physical education program for 104 105 kindergarten through grade 5 which provides students with 30 minutes of physical education each day, 3 days a week. 106 Page 4 of 7

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Section 3. Subsections (2) and (5) of section 381.0056,Florida Statutes, are amended to read:

381.0056 School health services program. --

The Legislature finds that health services conducted 110 (2)as a part of the total school health program should be carried 111 112 out to appraise, protect, and promote the health of students. School health services supplement, rather than replace, parental 113 responsibility and are designed to encourage parents to devote 114 115 attention to child health, to discover health problems, and to encourage use of the services of their physicians, dentists, and 116 117 community health agencies. Each school shall annually provide 118 all parents and guardians with information on ways that they can 119 help their children to be physically active and to eat healthful 120 foods.

(5) (a) Each county health department shall develop,
jointly with the district school board and the local school
health advisory committee, a school health services plan; and
the plan must shall include, at a minimum, provisions for:

(p) Maintenance of records on incidents of health problems, corrective measures taken, and such other information 148 149 as may be needed to plan and evaluate health programs; except, however, that provisions in the plan for maintenance of health 150 records of individual students must be in accordance with s. 151 152 1002.22;

153 17.(q) Health information which will be provided by the school health nurses, when necessary, regarding the placement of 154 students in exceptional student programs and the reevaluation at 155 156 periodic intervals of students placed in such programs; and

18.(r) Notification to the local nonpublic schools of the 157 school health services program and the opportunity for 158 159 representatives of the local nonpublic schools to participate in the development of the cooperative health services plan. 160
