20	(1) As used in this section, the term "economic
21	development agency" means:
22	(a) The Office of Tourism, Trade, and Economic
23	Development <u>;</u>
24	(b) Any industrial development authority created in

26	(c) The Florida Space Authority created in part II of

40 (2) Upon written request from a private corporation, 41 partnership, or person, records of an economic development agency which contain or would provide information held by an 42 43 economic development agency concerning plans, intentions, or interests of such private corporation, partnership, or person to 44 locate, relocate, or expand any of its business activities in 45 46 this state is are confidential and exempt from s. 119.07(1) and s. 24(a), Art. I of the State Constitution for 12 24 months 47 48 after the date an economic development agency receives a request for confidentiality or until the disclosed by an economic 49 50 development agency pursuant to subsection (4) or by the party 51 requesting confidentiality under this section. Confidentiality 52 must be maintained until the expiration of the 24-month period 53 or until documents or information is are otherwise disclosed, whichever occurs first. Any confidentiality provided under this 54

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55 section does not apply when any party petitions a court of 56 competent jurisdiction and, in the opinion of the court, proves 57 need for access to such documents. This exemption expires 58 October 2, 2006, and is subject to review by the Legislature 59 under the Open Government Sunset Review Act of 1995 in 60 accordance with s. 119.15.

61 (3) This section does not waive any provision of chapter
62 120 or any other provision of law requiring a public hearing.

(4) A public officer or employee may not enter into a 63 64 binding agreement with any corporation, partnership, or person who has requested confidentiality of information pursuant to 65 66 this section, until 90 days after such information is made 67 public, unless such public officer or employee is acting in an 68 official capacity, the agreement does not accrue to the personal benefit of such public officer or employee, and, in the 69 70 professional judgment of such officer or employee, the agreement is necessary to effectuate an economic development project. 71

72 (3) (5) An economic development agency may extend the 73 period of confidentiality specified in subsection (2) for up to 74 an additional 12 months upon written request from the private corporation, partnership, or person who originally requested 75 confidentiality under this section and upon a finding by the 76 77 economic development agency that such private corporation, 78 partnership, or person is still actively considering locating, 79 relocating, or expanding its business activities in this state. 80 Such a request for an extension in the period of confidentiality

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81 must be received prior to the expiration of any confidentiality 82 originally provided under this section.

83 (4) (6) Notwithstanding the period of confidentiality specified in subsection (2), Trade secrets, as defined by s. 84 812.081, contained in the records of an economic development 85 86 agency relating to the plans, intentions, or interests of a corporation, partnership, or person who has requested 87 confidentiality pursuant to this section are confidential and 88 89 exempt from s. 119.07(1) and s. 24(a), Art. I of the State Constitution for 10 years after the date an economic development 90 agency receives a request for confidentiality or until otherwise 91 92 disclosed, whichever occurs first. The 10-year period of 93 confidentiality provided by this subsection does not apply to 94 any portion of the records other than trade secrets as defined 95 by s. 812.081.

96 (5) A public officer or employee may not enter into a 97 binding agreement with any corporation, partnership, or person 98 who has requested confidentiality of information pursuant to 99 this section until 90 days after the information is made public 100 unless:

101 (a) The public officer or employee is acting in an 102 official capacity; 103 The agreement does not accrue to the personal benefit (b) of such public officer or employee; and 104 (C) In the professional judgment of the officer or 105 106 employee, the agreement is necessary to effectuate an economic 107 development project.

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108 <u>(6)</u> (7) Any person who is an employee of an economic 109 development agency who violates the provisions of this section 110 commits a misdemeanor of the second degree, punishable as 111 provided in s. 775.082 or s. 775.083.
