State student assistance grants through the program 142 (2) (a) 143 may be made only to degree-seeking students who enroll in at 144 least 6 semester hours, or the equivalent per term, or students 145 who enroll in a postsecondary career certificate program of at 146 least 450 clock hours, and who meet the general requirements for 147 student eligibility as provided in s. 1009.40, except as 148 otherwise provided in this section. The grants shall be awarded annually for the amount of demonstrated unmet need for the cost 149 150 of education and may not exceed an amount equal to the average 151 prior academic year cost of tuition fees and other registration fees for 30 credit hours at state universities or such other 152 153 amount as specified in the General Appropriations Act, to any recipient. A demonstrated unmet need of less than \$200 shall 154 155 render the applicant ineligible for a state student assistance 156 grant. Recipients of the grants must have been accepted at a 157 state university, or community college, school district career 158 center, or charter technical career center authorized by Florida law. A student is eligible for the award for 110 percent of the 159 160 number of credit hours required to complete the program in which 161 enrolled, except as otherwise provided in s. 1009.40(3).

228 There is established the School District Career Center (1) Facility Enhancement Challenge Grant Program for the purpose of 229 230 assisting career centers in building high priority instructional capital facilities consistent with s. 1001.44, including common 231 232 areas connecting such facilities. The direct-support 233 organizations that serve the school districts may solicit gifts 234 from private sources which are eligible for state matching funds 235 for capital facilities. For purposes of this section, private sources of funds shall not include any federal, state, or local 236 237 government funds that a school district may receive.

238 (2) The School District Career Center Facility Enhancement
 239 Challenge Grant Program shall provide funds to match private
 240 contributions for the development of high priority instructional

243 (3) Within the direct-support organization of each school 244 district, a separate career center capital facilities matching 245 account must be established for the purpose of providing 246 matching funds from the direct-support organization's 247 unrestricted donations or other private contributions for the development of high priority instructional capital facilities, 248 249 including common areas connecting such facilities. The Legislature may appropriate funds for distribution to a school 250 251 district after matching funds are certified by the direct-

256 A project may not be initiated unless all private (4) 257 funds for planning, construction, and equipping the facility 258 have been received and deposited in the direct-support 259 organization's matching account and the state's share for the 260 minimum amount of funds needed to begin the project has been 261 appropriated by the Legislature. The Legislature may appropriate 262 the state's matching funds in one or more fiscal years for the 263 planning, construction, and equipping of an eligible facility. 264 However, these requirements shall not preclude the school 265 district or direct-support organization from expending available 266 funds from private sources to develop a prospectus, including 267 preliminary architectural schematics or models, for use in its efforts to raise private funds for a facility. Additionally, any 268 269 private sources of funds expended for this purpose are eligible 270 for state matching funds if the project is awarded grant funds 271 under this section.

272 To be eligible to participate in the School District (5) 273 Career Center Facility Enhancement Challenge Grant Program, a 274 school district, through its direct-support organization, shall 275 raise contributions from private sources equal to one-third of the total cost of a facility construction project. After raising 276 such contributions, the school district shall be eligible for a 277 match by a state appropriation equal to the amount raised for a 278 279 facility construction project up to one-third of the cost of the
