House Joint Resolution

A joint resolution proposing an amendment to Section 1 of Article IX of the State Constitution relating to public education.

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Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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That the following amendment to Section 1 of Article IX of the State Constitution is agreed to and shall be submitted to the electors of this state for approval or rejection at the next general election or at an earlier special election specifically authorized by law for that purpose:

ARTICLE IX

## **EDUCATION**

## SECTION 1. Public education. --

(a) The education of children is a fundamental value of the people of the State of Florida. It is, therefore, a paramount duty of the state to make adequate provision for the education of all children residing within its borders. Adequate provision shall be made by law for a uniform, efficient, safe, secure, and high quality system of free public schools that allows students to obtain a high quality education and for the establishment, maintenance, and operation of institutions of higher learning and other public education programs that the needs of the people may require. To assure that children attending public schools obtain a high quality education, the legislature shall make adequate provision to ensure that, by the beginning of the 2009-2010 2010 school year and for each school

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year thereafter, there are a sufficient number of classrooms so
that:

- (1) The school district average maximum number of students who are assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public school classrooms for prekindergarten through grade 3 does not exceed 18 students and the maximum number of students in any prekindergarten through grade 3 class does not exceed 23 students;
- (2) The <u>school district average maximum</u> number of students who are assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public school classrooms for grades 4 through 8 does not exceed 22 students and the maximum number of students in any grade 4 through 8 class does not exceed 27 students; and
- (3) The <u>school district average</u> maximum number of students who are assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public school classrooms for grades 9 through 12 does not exceed 25 students and the maximum number of students in any grade 9 through 12 class does not exceed 30 students.

The class size requirements of this subsection do not apply to extracurricular classes. Payment of the costs associated with reducing class size to meet these requirements is the responsibility of the state and not of local school schools districts. Beginning with the 2003-2004 fiscal year, the legislature shall provide sufficient funds to reduce the school district average class size number of students in each classroom by at least two students per year until the school district average class size for each of the grade groupings maximum

number of students per classroom does not exceed the requirements of this subsection.

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- (b) In addition to the amounts appropriated to meet the class size requirements of subsection (a), the legislature shall annually cause to be appropriated a separate amount from state funds equal to the difference between the estimated cost of implementing a class size reduction program according to the provisions of subsection (a) as initially adopted in November 2002 and the cost of implementing the provisions of subsection (a) as amended in November 2006. Such separate amount shall be appropriated by the legislature first for increasing the salary of public school teachers to the extent necessary to cause the average annual teacher salary in Florida public schools to equal at least the average annual salary of all public school teachers in the United States in prekindergarten through grade 12 and for increasing salaries for other public education employees, and thereafter for funding such public education purposes as deemed appropriate by the legislature.
- (c) (1) (b) Every four-year old child in Florida shall be provided by the state a high quality prekindergarten pre-kindergarten learning opportunity in the form of an early childhood development and education program which shall be voluntary, high quality, free, and delivered according to professionally accepted standards. An early childhood development and education program means an organized program designed to address and enhance each child's ability to make age appropriate progress in an appropriate range of settings in the development of language and cognitive capabilities and

emotional, social, regulatory, and moral capacities through education in basic skills and such other skills as the Legislature may determine to be appropriate.

(2)(c) The early childhood education and development programs provided by reason of this subsection subparagraph (b) shall be implemented no later than the beginning of the 2005 school year through funds generated in addition to those used for existing education, health, and development programs. Existing education, health, and development programs are those funded by the state as of January 1, 2002, that provided for child or adult education, health care, or development.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the following statement be placed on the ballot:

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

## ARTICLE IX, SECTION 1

PUBLIC EDUCATION; REVISING CLASS SIZE REQUIREMENTS TO INCREASE SALARIES AND FUND OTHER PURPOSES.--Proposing an amendment to the State Constitution to revise class size requirements and their date of implementation to provide that they shall be based on the school district average number of students who are assigned to a teacher in specified grades; to specify the maximum number of students in any one class; to provide that, in addition to the amounts appropriated to meet the revised class size requirements, the Legislature shall appropriate a separate amount equal to the difference between the estimated cost of implementing a class size reduction program according to the constitutional provisions adopted in November 2002 and the cost of implementing these revised class

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size requirements; and to provide that such separate 113 appropriation shall first be used to increase the salary of public school teachers and other public school employees and thereafter to fund other public education purposes.

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
