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9	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
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11	Section 1. Paragraph (e) of subsection (4) of section
12	458.347, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

14	(4) PERFORMANCE OF PHYSICIAN ASSISTANTS
15	(e) A supervisory physician may delegate to a fully
16	licensed physician assistant the authority to prescribe <u>or</u>
17	dispense any medication used in the supervisory physician's
18	practice unless such medication is listed on the formulary
19	created pursuant to paragraph (f). A fully licensed physician
20	assistant may only prescribe or dispense such medication under
21	the following circumstances:
22	1. A physician assistant must clearly identify to the
23	patient that he or she is a physician assistant. Furthermore,
24	the physician assistant must inform the patient that the patient
25	has the right to see the physician prior to any prescription
26	being prescribed or dispensed by the physician assistant.
27	2. The supervisory physician must notify the department of
28	his or her intent to delegate, on a department-approved form,
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29 before delegating such authority and notify the department of 30 any change in prescriptive privileges of the physician 31 assistant. <u>Authority to dispense may be delegated only by a</u> 32 <u>supervising physician who is registered as a dispensing</u> 33 practitioner in compliance with s. 465.0276.

The physician assistant must file with the department, 34 3. 35 before commencing to prescribe or dispense, evidence that he or she has completed a continuing medical education course of at 36 37 least 3 classroom hours in prescriptive practice, conducted by an accredited program approved by the boards, which course 38 covers the limitations, responsibilities, and privileges 39 involved in prescribing medicinal drugs, or evidence that he or 40 she has received education comparable to the continuing 41 education course as part of an accredited physician assistant 42 43 training program.

44 4. The physician assistant must file with the department,
45 before commencing to prescribe <u>or dispense</u>, evidence that the
46 physician assistant has a minimum of 3 months of clinical
47 experience in the specialty area of the supervising physician.

5. The physician assistant must file with the department a signed affidavit that he or she has completed a minimum of 10 continuing medical education hours in the specialty practice in which the physician assistant has prescriptive privileges with each licensure renewal application.

53 6. The department shall issue a license and a prescriber
54 number to the physician assistant granting authority for the
55 prescribing of medicinal drugs authorized within this paragraph
56 upon completion of the foregoing requirements. <u>The physician</u>

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57 <u>assistant shall not be required to independently register</u>

The prescription must be written in a form that 59 7. 60 complies with chapter 499 and must contain, in addition to the supervisory physician's name, address, and telephone number, the 61 physician assistant's prescriber number. Unless it is a drug or 62 63 drug sample dispensed by the physician assistant, the prescription must be filled in a pharmacy permitted under 64 65 chapter 465 and must be dispensed in that pharmacy by a pharmacist licensed under chapter 465. The appearance of the 66 67 prescriber number creates a presumption that the physician assistant is authorized to prescribe the medicinal drug and the 68 prescription is valid. 69

8. The physician assistant must note the prescription or dispensing of medication in the appropriate medical record, and the supervisory physician must review and sign each notation. For dispensing purposes only, the failure of the supervisory physician to comply with these requirements does not affect the validity of the prescription.

9. This paragraph does not prohibit a supervisory
physician from delegating to a physician assistant the authority
to order medication for a hospitalized patient of the
supervisory physician.

(4)PERFORMANCE OF PHYSICIAN ASSISTANTS. --

A supervisory physician may delegate to a fully 87 (e) licensed physician assistant the authority to prescribe or 88 89 dispense any medication used in the supervisory physician's practice unless such medication is listed on the formulary 90 91 created pursuant to s. 458.347. A fully licensed physician 92 assistant may only prescribe or dispense such medication under 93 the following circumstances:

A physician assistant must clearly identify to the 94 1. patient that she or he is a physician assistant. Furthermore, 95 the physician assistant must inform the patient that the patient 96 has the right to see the physician prior to any prescription 97 98 being prescribed or dispensed by the physician assistant.

The supervisory physician must notify the department of 99 2. 100 her or his intent to delegate, on a department-approved form, before delegating such authority and notify the department of 101 any change in prescriptive privileges of the physician 102 103 assistant. Authority to dispense may be delegated only by a supervisory physician who is registered as a dispensing 104 105 practitioner in compliance with s. 465.0276.

106 3. The physician assistant must file with the department, 107 before commencing to prescribe or dispense, evidence that she or he has completed a continuing medical education course of at 108 least 3 classroom hours in prescriptive practice, conducted by 109 an accredited program approved by the boards, which course 110 covers the limitations, responsibilities, and privileges 111 involved in prescribing medicinal drugs, or evidence that she or 112 Page 4 of 6

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113 he has received education comparable to the continuing education 114 course as part of an accredited physician assistant training 115 program.

4. The physician assistant must file with the department,
before commencing to prescribe <u>or dispense</u>, evidence that the
physician assistant has a minimum of 3 months of clinical
experience in the specialty area of the supervising physician.

5. The physician assistant must file with the department a signed affidavit that she or he has completed a minimum of 10 continuing medical education hours in the specialty practice in which the physician assistant has prescriptive privileges with each licensure renewal application.

6. The department shall issue a license and a prescriber number to the physician assistant granting authority for the prescribing of medicinal drugs authorized within this paragraph upon completion of the foregoing requirements. <u>The physician</u> <u>assistant shall not be required to independently register</u> pursuant to s. 465.0276.
