SUMMARY ANALYSIS

Section 334.071, F.S., provides for legislative designations of transportation facilities for honorary or memorial purposes, or to distinguish a particular facility. The legislative designations do not “officially” change the current names of the facilities, nor does the statute require local governments and private entities to change street signs, mailing addresses, or 911 emergency telephone-number system listings.

HB 1055 designates the following honorary road:

- That portion of State Road 821, the Florida Turnpike Homestead Extension, between exit 16 at S.W. 152nd Street and exit 11 at S.W. 216th Street in Miami-Dade County is designated as the “John F. Cosgrove Highway.”

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is directed to erect suitable markers designating the honorary road. The markers will cost an estimated \$400 each. Assuming that two markers will be erected for the designation, the estimated fiscal impact to FDOT will be \$800. This includes maintenance and installation costs.

HB 1055 does not create any constitutional or other legal issues. It takes effect July 1, 2007.

On March 19, 2007, the Committee on Tourism and Trade adopted an amendment by the bill sponsor that does the following:

- Designates a portion of Biscayne Boulevard in Miami-Dade County as the “Athalie Range Boulevard” and directs the FDOT to erect suitable markers.

FULL ANALYSIS

I. SUBSTANTIVE ANALYSIS

A. HOUSE PRINCIPLES ANALYSIS:

HB 1055 does not implicate any House principles.

B. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

Current Situation

Section 334.071, F.S., provides for legislative designations of transportation facilities for honorary or memorial purposes, or to distinguish a particular facility. The legislative designations do not “officially” change the current names of the facilities, nor does the statute require local governments and private entities to change street signs, mailing addresses, or 911 emergency telephone-number system listings.

The statute requires Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) to place a marker at each terminus or intersection of an identified road or bridge, and to erect other markers it deems appropriate for the transportation facility. The statute also provides that a city or county must pass a resolution in support of a particular designation before road markers are erected. Additionally, if the designated road segment extends through multiple cities or counties, a resolution must be passed by each affected local government.

Based on FDOT records, some 1,134 honorary road and bridge designations have been approved since 1922, most of them by the Legislature. Some public roads and bridges have multiple or overlapping designations.

Effect of HB 1055

HB 1055 designates the following honorary road:

- That portion of State Road 821, the Florida Turnpike Homestead Extension, between exit 16 at S.W. 152nd Street and exit 11 at S.W. 216th Street in Miami-Dade County is designated as the “John F. Cosgrove Highway.”

John Cosgrove served in the Florida House of Representatives from 1981 to 1984. In 1986, Mr. Cosgrove was reelected serving until he left in 2000 due to term limits. Following Hurricane Andrew, as Chairman of the Insurance Committee, Mr. Cosgrove was instrumental in passing legislation to keep private insurance companies from leaving South Florida. Mr. Cosgrove received numerous awards for civic, community, and religious service, including serving as chairman of the Miami YMCA. Mr. Cosgrove last served as elected mayor of Cutler Bay, FL, the town he helped incorporate.

C. SECTION DIRECTORY:

Section 1: Designates John F. Cosgrove Highway in Miami-Dade County

Section 2: Specifies an effective date of July 1, 2007.

FDOT estimates that the cost to erect two suitable road designating markers is approximately \$800, this assumes the placement of a marker at each end of the designated road segment. The expenditure is from the State Transportation Trust Fund and includes installation and maintenance costs.
