Subsection (1) of section 316.003, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 14 316.003 Definitions.--The following words and phrases, 15 when used in this chapter, shall have the meanings 16 17 respectively ascribed to them in this section, except where 18 the context otherwise requires: (1) AUTHORIZED EMERGENCY VEHICLES.--Vehicles of the 19 fire department (fire patrol), police vehicles, and such 20 21 ambulances and emergency vehicles of municipal departments, 22 public service corporations operated by private corporations, 23 the Department of Environmental Protection, the Department of Health, and the Department of Transportation, and the 2.4 Department of Corrections as are designated or authorized by 25 26 their respective department or the chief of police of an incorporated city or any sheriff of any of the various 27 28 counties. Section 2. Subsection (3) of section 316.2397, Florida 29 30 Statutes, is amended to read: 316.2397 Certain lights prohibited; exceptions.--31 2

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1 (3) Vehicles of the fire department and fire patrol, 2 including vehicles of volunteer firefighters as permitted under s. 316.2398, vehicles of medical staff physicians or 3 technicians of medical facilities licensed by the state as 4 authorized under s. 316.2398, ambulances as authorized under 5 6 this chapter, and buses and taxicabs as authorized under s. 7 316.2399 are permitted to show or display red lights. Vehicles 8 of the fire department, fire patrol, police vehicles, and such ambulances and emergency vehicles of municipal and county 9 10 departments, public service corporations operated by private corporations, the Department of Environmental Protection, the 11 12 Department of Transportation, and the Department of 13 Agriculture and Consumer Services, and the Department of Corrections as are designated or authorized by their 14 respective department or the chief of police of an 15 incorporated city or any sheriff of any county are hereby 16 17 authorized to operate emergency lights and sirens in an 18 emergency. Wreckers, mosquito control fog and spray vehicles, and emergency vehicles of governmental departments or public 19 service corporations may show or display amber lights when in 20 21 actual operation or when a hazard exists provided they are not 22 used going to and from the scene of operation or hazard 23 without specific authorization of a law enforcement officer or law enforcement agency. Wreckers must use amber rotating or 2.4 flashing lights while performing recoveries and loading on the 25 roadside day or night, and may use such lights while towing a 26 vehicle on wheel lifts, slings, or under reach if the operator 27 2.8 of the wrecker deems such lights necessary. A flatbed, car 29 carrier, or rollback may not use amber rotating or flashing lights when hauling a vehicle on the bed unless it creates a 30 hazard to other motorists because of protruding objects. 31

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1 Further, escort vehicles may show or display amber lights when 2 in the actual process of escorting overdimensioned equipment, material, or buildings as authorized by law. Vehicles of 3 private watch, guard, or patrol agencies licensed pursuant to 4 chapter 493 may show or display amber lights while patrolling 5 б condominium, cooperative, and private residential and business 7 communities by which employed and which traverse public 8 streets or highways. Subsection (3) of section 945.215, Florida 9 Statutes, is amended to read: 10 945.215 Inmate welfare and employee benefit trust 11 12 funds.--13 (3) EMPLOYEE BENEFIT TRUST FUND; DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS. --14 (a) The department may establish an Employee Benefit 15 16 Trust Fund. Trust fund sources may be derived from any of the 17 following: 18 1. Proceeds of vending machines, staff canteens, or other such services not intended for use by inmates. 19 2. Net proceeds of the recycling program. 20 3.2. Donations, except for donations made by, or on 21 22 behalf of, an individual inmate, and except for donations made 23 by a person who provides, or seeks to provide, goods or services to the department under a contract or an agreement, 2.4 individually or through a corporation or organization. 25 4.3. Additional trust funds and grants which may 26 27 become available. 2.8 (b) Funds from the Employee Benefit Trust Fund may be used for employee appreciation programs and activities and to 29 construct, operate, and maintain training and recreation 30 facilities at correctional facilities for the exclusive use of 31 4

1 department employees. Such facilities are the property of the 2 department and must provide the maximum benefit to all interested employees, regardless of gender. 3 (c) The Employee Benefit Trust Fund shall be 4 5 established as a separate and distinct set of accounts, which б shall be maintained centrally by the department, overseen by 7 the secretary, and subject to an annual audit by the 8 department's inspector general. 9 (d) The department shall maintain sufficient data to 10 provide an annual report, upon request, to the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and 11 12 the Executive Office of the Governor on December 1 which lists 13 the types of services provided using moneys in the trust fund and the allocations of funds spent. 14 (e) The department shall adopt rules under ss. 15 120.536(1) and 120.54 to administer this subsection. 16 17 Section 4. Section 945.21501, Florida Statutes, is 18 amended to read: 945.21501 Employee Benefit Trust Fund .--19 (1) There is hereby created in the Department of 20 21 Corrections the Employee Benefit Trust Fund. The purpose of 22 the trust fund shall be to: 23 (a) Construct, operate, and maintain training and recreation facilities at correctional facilities for the 2.4 exclusive use of department employees. Any facility 25 constructed using funds from the Employee Benefit Trust Fund 26 27 is the property of the department and must provide the maximum 2.8 benefit to all interested employees, regardless of gender. (b) Provide funding for employee appreciation programs 29 30 and activities designed to enhance the morale of employees. 31

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1 Moneys shall be deposited in the trust fund as provided in s. 2 945.215. 3 (2) Notwithstanding the provisions of s. 216.301 and pursuant to s. 216.351, any balance in the trust fund at the 4 end of any fiscal year shall remain in the trust fund at the 5 6 end of the year and shall be available for carrying out the 7 purposes of the trust fund. Subsection (1) of section 948.06, Florida Statutes, is amended and paragraph (h) is added to subsection 11 12 (2) of that section, to read: 13 948.06 Violation of probation or community control; revocation; modification; continuance; failure to pay 14 restitution or cost of supervision .--15 (1)(a) Whenever within the period of probation or 16 17 community control there are reasonable grounds to believe that 18 a probationer or offender in community control has violated his or her probation or community control in a material 19 respect, any law enforcement officer who is aware of the 20 21 probationary or community control status of the probationer or 22 offender in community control or any parole or probation 23 supervisor may arrest or request any county or municipal law enforcement officer to arrest such probationer or offender 2.4 without warrant wherever found and forthwith return him or her 25 to the court granting such probation or community control. 26 27 (b) Any committing trial court judge may issue a 2.8 warrant, upon the facts being made known to him or her by 29 affidavit of one having knowledge of such facts, for the arrest of the probationer or offender, returnable forthwith 30 before the court granting such probation or community control. 31 6

1 In lieu of issuing a warrant for arrest, the committing trial 2 court judge may issue a notice to appear if the probationer or offender in community control has never been convicted of 3 4 committing, and is not currently alleged to have committed, a qualifying offense as defined in this section. 5 б (c) Any parole or probation supervisor, any officer 7 authorized to serve criminal process, or any peace officer of 8 this state is authorized to serve and execute such warrant. Any parole or probation supervisor is authorized to serve such 9 10 notice to appear. (d) Upon the filing of an affidavit alleging a 11 12 violation of probation or community control and following 13 issuance of a warrant under s. 901.02, <u>a warrantless arrest</u> under this section, or a notice to appear under this section, 14 the probationary period is tolled until the court enters a 15 ruling on the violation. Notwithstanding the tolling of 16 17 probation as provided in this subsection, the court shall 18 retain jurisdiction over the offender for any violation of the conditions of probation or community control that is alleged 19 to have occurred during the tolling period. The probation 20 21 officer is permitted to continue to supervise any offender who 2.2 remains available to the officer for supervision until the 23 supervision expires pursuant to the order of probation or community control or until the court revokes or terminates the 2.4 25 probation or community control, whichever comes first. (e) The chief judge of each judicial circuit shall 26 27 direct the department to use a notification letter of a 2.8 technical violation in appropriate cases in lieu of a violation report, affidavit, and warrant when the alleged 29 violation is not a new felony or misdemeanor offense. Such 30 direction must be in writing and must specify the types of 31

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1 specific violations which are to be reported by a notification 2 letter of a technical violation, any exceptions to those violations, and the required process for submission. At the 3 4 direction of the chief judge, the department shall send the notification letter of a technical violation to the court. 5 б (f) The court may allow the department to file an 7 affidavit, notification letter, violation report, or other 8 report under this section by facsimile or electronic 9 submission. 10 (2) (h)1. For each case in which the offender admits to 11 12 committing a violation or is found to have committed a 13 violation, the department shall provide the court with a recommendation as to disposition by the court. The department 14 shall provide the reasons for its recommendation and include 15 16 an evaluation of: 17 a. The appropriateness or inappropriateness of 18 community facilities, programs, or services for treating or 19 supervising the offender; b. The ability or inability of the department to 20 21 provide an adequate level of supervision of the offender in 2.2 the community and a statement of what constitutes an adequate 23 level of supervision; and c. The existence of treatment modalities that the 2.4 offender could use but that do not currently exist in the 25 community. 26 27 2. The report must also include a summary of the 2.8 offender's prior supervision history, including the offender's prior participation in treatment, educational, and vocational 29 programs, and any other actions by or circumstances concerning 30 the offender which are relevant. 31

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6 7	Provides for service of the notice by a probation officer, and tolls the probationary period when a notice to appear is issued or a warrantless arrest is made.
8 9 10 11	Requires the chief judge of each judicial circuit to direct the Department of Corrections to use a notification letter to the court when reporting a violation of probation that does not involve a new criminal offense. The judge has discretion to determine when it is appropriate to use a notification letter.
12 13	Requires the department to provide the court with a recommendation for disposition of a case in which an offender admits to or is found to have violated probation or community control.
14 15 16	Permits the department to deliver affidavits, violation reports, notification letters of technical violation, and other documents to the courts by e-mail or facsimile, if authorized by the court.
17 18	Directs the department to study the effect of removing the caseload restrictions and managing probation officer caseloads based upon an assessment of risk, and report the results to the Legislature and the Governor.
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
