26-874-07 See HB 419 1 A bill to be entitled 2 An act relating to lodging and food service establishments; amending s. 509.291, F.S.; 3 4 revising membership provisions of the 5 Department of Business and Professional б Regulation's Division of Hotels and 7 Restaurants' advisory council; amending s. 509.302, F.S.; revising the Hospitality 8 9 Education Program; replacing the director of 10 education with the division as administrator of the program; revising provisions relating to 11 12 the administration of the program; revising the 13 training and training-related activities funded by the program; specifying how funds collected 14 under the program shall be expended; deleting 15 provisions relating to duties and 16 17 responsibilities of the director of education; providing criteria by which grants may be 18 awarded under the program; amending s. 509.072, 19 F.S.; conforming cross-references; providing an 20 21 effective date. 22 23 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: 24 Section 1. Paragraphs (a) and (b) of subsection (1) of 25 section 509.291, Florida Statutes, are amended to read: 26 27 509.291 Advisory council.--2.8 (1) There is created a 10-member advisory council. (a) The Secretary of Business and Professional 29 Regulation shall appoint six five voting members to the 30 advisory council. Each member appointed by the secretary must 31

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1 be an operator of an establishment licensed under this chapter 2 and shall represent the industries regulated by the division, except that one member appointed by the secretary must be a 3 layperson representing and shall represent the general public 4 and one member must be a hospitality education administrator 5 6 from an institution of higher education of this state. Such 7 members of the council shall serve staggered terms of 4 years. 8 (b) The Florida Hotel and Motel Association, the Florida Restaurant and Lodging Association shall designate one 9 10 representative from the lodging industry and one representative from the food service industry to serve as 11 12 voting members of the council., The Florida Apartment 13 Association, and the Florida Association of Realtors shall each designate one representative to serve as a voting member 14 of the council. In addition, one hospitality administration 15 educator from an institution of higher education affiliated 16 17 with the Hospitality Education Program pursuant to s. 18 509.302(2) shall serve for a term of 2 years as a voting member of the council. This single representative shall be 19 designated on a rotating basis by the institution or 2.0 21 institutions of higher education affiliated with this program 2.2 pursuant to s. 509.302(2). 23 Section 2. Section 509.302, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 2.4 509.302 Hospitality Education Program Director of 25 26 education; personnel; employment duties; compensation. --27 (1) The division director shall, with the advice of 2.8 the advisory council, employ a director of education for the 29 lodging and food service industry. 30 (2) The director of education shall <u>administer</u> develop and implement an educational program, designated the 31

"Hospitality Education Program," offered for the benefit of 1 2 the food service and lodging industries of this state entire industry. This program may affiliate with Florida State 3 4 University, Florida International University, and the 5 University of Central Florida. The program may also affiliate 6 with any other member of the State University System or 7 Florida Community College System, or with any privately funded 8 college or university, which offers a program of hospitality 9 administration and management. The primary goal of this 10 program shall be administered with the advice of the advisory council and shall fund the following types of training and 11 12 training-related activities is to instruct and train all 13 individuals and businesses licensed under this chapter, in cooperation with recognized associations that represent the 14 licensees, in the application of state and federal laws and 15 16 rules. Such programs shall also include: 17 (a) Training provided by the division to licensees 18 under this chapter and the licensees' managers and employees in the application of state and federal laws and rules to the 19 20 operations of the licensees and the licensees' managers and 21 employees. 22 (b) Enhancement of school-to-career training and 23 transition programs for students interested in pursuing careers in the food service or lodging industry. Training and 2.4 transition programs shall be provided through the public 25 school system utilizing a nationally recognized curriculum 26 27 approved by the division, with the enhancements funded under 2.8 this section provided by nonprofit statewide organizations in the hospitality services field. Enhancement activities under 29 this section shall be funded by grants and the application 30 process for the grants shall be administered by the division. 31

1 Such activities may include providing job experience 2 opportunities for students; day-to-day support for program instructors; student scholarships; special events recognizing 3 4 outstanding students, instructors, industry mentors, or 5 program sponsors; program-related competitive events for 6 students; and continuous inservice training for instructors. 7 (a) Career training. 8 (b) Management training. 9 (c) Inservice continuing education programs. (d) Awareness of food recovery programs, as promoted 10 570.0725. 11 in 12 (e) Such other programs as may be deemed appropriate 13 the director of the division, the advisory council, and the director of education. 14 (2) (3) All public lodging establishments and all 15 public food service establishments licensed under this chapter 16 17 shall pay an annual fee of no more than \$10, which shall be 18 included in the annual license fee and which shall be used for the sole purpose of funding the Hospitality Education Program. 19 The division may expend up to 35 percent of the funds 20 21 collected under this subsection for the sole purpose of 2.2 providing the services described in paragraph (1)(a) and of 23 recouping the division's direct expenses incurred in administering the Hospitality Education Program. The division 2.4 shall annually expend all remaining funds collected under this 25 subsection to fund grants for the services described in 26 27 paragraph (1)(b). All funds left unexpended in any state 2.8 fiscal year shall be made available in the following state fiscal year to fund grants for the services described in 29 30 paragraph (1)(b). 31

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1 (3) Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, grant funding under this section for the services 2 described in paragraph (1)(b) shall include all expenses 3 4 incident to providing those services, including the cost of staff support; student scholarships; compensation to program 5 6 instructors for time spent in relevant training; special 7 events or competitive events; and a reasonable stipend for 8 travel, lodging, and meals for instructors and students participating in training or in related special events. All 9 10 such expenses shall be in accordance with the budget submitted by the applicant in the grant application and approved by the 11 12 division. The expenditure of all funds distributed under this section shall be subject to audit by the division. 13 (4) The director of education shall formulate an 14 annual budget, programs, and activities to accomplish the 15 16 purposes of this section, in accordance with and subject to 17 the advice and recommendations of the advisory council. 18 (a) The annual budget of the Hospitality Education Program must show that the total fees or charges estimated to 19 be collected during the next fiscal year under this section 2.0 21 will be dedicated solely to the estimated cost of funding the 22 Hospitality Education Program, less any trust fund service 23 charge imposed by s. 215.20. If the estimated cost of funding the Hospitality Education Program in any fiscal year is less 2.4 than the total fees or charges estimated to be collected 25 26 during that year, the director of education shall submit a 27 report to the advisory council division director demonstrating 2.8 why the amount of such fee or charge should not be immediately 29 reduced to eliminate the projected surplus. The division 30 director shall <u>also submit</u> forward this report to the 31

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1 Secretary of Business and Professional Regulation as part of 2 the division's annual budget request. 3 (b) Both the secretary's legislative budget requests 4 submitted pursuant to ss. 216.023 and 216.031 and the Governor's recommended budget submitted pursuant to s. 216.163 5 6 must also show that the total fees or charges estimated to be 7 collected during the next fiscal year under this section will 8 be dedicated solely to funding the Hospitality Education Program, less any trust fund service charge imposed by s. 9 10 215.20. If the estimated cost of funding the Hospitality Education Program in any fiscal year is less than the total 11 12 fees or charges estimated to be collected during that year, 13 the secretary shall submit a report demonstrating why the amount of such fee or charge should not be immediately reduced 14 to eliminate the projected surplus. 15 16 (5) The director of education, with the approval of 17 the director and with the advice of the advisory council, may 18 employ such personnel as necessary to carry out the purposes of this section. 19 20 (6) The director of education and any staff shall 21 receive such compensation as may be approved by the director 22 acting with the advice of the advisory council. 23 (7) The director of education, with the approval of 2.4 the director and with the consent of the advisory council, may designate funds, not to exceed \$150,000 annually, to support 25 26 school to career transition programs available through 27 statewide organizations in the hospitality services field. 2.8 Such programs shall be designed to prepare students for 29 progressive careers in the hospitality industry. The director education, with the approval of the director and with the 30 31 consent of the advisory council, may also designate funds, not

1 to exceed \$50,000 annually, to support food safety training 2 programs available through statewide organizations in the hospitality services field, and not to exceed \$50,000 3 4 annually, to support nontransient public lodging training 5 programs available through statewide organizations in the 6 public lodging services field. 7 (5)(a) The director of education shall have 8 supervision over the administration of the programs set forth in this subsection and shall report the status of the programs 9 at all meetings of the advisory council and at such other 10 times as are prescribed by the advisory council. 11 12 (6) (b) The division shall adopt rules providing the 13 criteria for grant program approval and the procedures for processing grant program applications. The criteria and 14 procedures shall be approved by the advisory council. The 15 criteria shall give primary consideration to the experience 16 and history of the applicant in representing the food service 17 or lodging industry, the applicant's prior commitment to 18 school-to-career transition programs in the food service or 19 lodging industry, and the applicant's demonstrated ability to 20 21 provide services statewide with industry support and participation. Grants awarded under this section shall be for 2.2 23 a term of 4 years, with funding provided on an annual basis. Section 3. Subsection (2) of section 509.072, Florida 2.4 Statutes, is amended to read: 25 509.072 Hotel and Restaurant Trust Fund; collection 26 27 and disposition of moneys received .--28 (2) Fees collected under s. 509.302(2)(3) and deposited into the trust fund must be used solely for the 29 purpose of funding the Hospitality Education Program, except 30 for any trust fund service charge imposed by s. 215.20, and 31

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1	may not be used to pay for any expense of the division not
2	directly attributable to the Hospitality Education Program.
3	These funds may not be deposited or transferred into any other
4	trust fund administered by the Department of Business and
5	Professional Regulation or any of its divisions. For audit
6	purposes, fees collected under s. $509.302(2)(3)$ and all
7	charges against those fees must be maintained by the
8	department as a separate ledger.
9	Section 4. This act shall take effect July 1, 2007.
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
