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A bill to be entitled

An act relating to forensic services; providing a short title; amending s. 943.04, F.S.; requiring the Criminal Justice Investigations and Forensic Science Program within the Department of Law Enforcement, in consultation with a partner, to provide training and technical assistance to state, local, and other law enforcement agencies in matters of forensic science, assist crime laboratories in becoming accredited, aid in the design or redesign of forensic computer systems, and maintain equipment and supplies sufficient for the department to operate in another location on a temporary basis if a local crime laboratory is damaged or destroyed; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

- Section 1. This act may be cited as the "Florida Forensic Service and Technical Training Act."
- Section 2. Subsection (6) is added to section 943.04, Florida Statutes, to read:
- 943.04 Criminal Justice Investigations and Forensic Science Program; creation; investigative, forensic, and related authority.--
- (6) (a) It is the intent of the Legislature that the department assist in improving the quality and timeliness of forensic services within the criminal justice community of this state. The goal of the Legislature is that each state and local

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criminal justice entity improve the quality and timeliness of its forensic-science analyses and enhance the law enforcement entities' forensic services in order to better ensure the safety of the residents of this state.

- (b) In order to achieve these goals, the Criminal Justice Investigations and Forensic Science Program within the department shall, in consultation with a partner such as the National Forensic Science Technology Center, provide training and technical assistance to state, local, and other law enforcement agencies in matters of forensic science. The Criminal Justice Investigations and Forensic Science Program shall:
- 1. Develop courses and training materials in topics of forensic science that may be used to train appropriate staff who are directly and substantially involved in providing forensic-science analyses in crime laboratories and field investigations and to court personnel and members of law enforcement agencies. The program may also assist an appropriate individual to become certified in a specific forensic discipline area if certification is directly related to the individual's job position and duties. All education, training, and certification activities of the forensic program must be designed to improve the quality and timeliness of forensic services.
- 2. Assist crime laboratories and law enforcement agencies in becoming accredited by nationally recognized laboratory accreditation organizations, including, but not limited to, those organizations recognized by the Justice for All Act, Pub.

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of Crime Laboratory Directors-Laboratory Accreditation Board, the National Association of Medical Examiners, and Forensic Quality Services-International (FQS-I), as well as other appropriate accrediting bodies.

- 3. Cooperate with state and local law enforcement agencies when those agencies design or redesign their computer systems for crime laboratories and recommend the purchase of computer hardware and software specifically developed for forensic analyses and data management.
- 4. Maintain equipment and supplies at its Tallahassee office or a regional laboratory sufficient for the department to operate in another location on a temporary basis when a local crime laboratory is damaged or destroyed by a natural disaster or other catastrophic event.
 - Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2007.
