I. **Summary:**

This bill would require that conflict resolution management, including peer mediation, be included within each school district's required character development program.

This bill amends section 1003.42 of the Florida Statutes.

II. **Present Situation:**

Section 1003.42, F.S. includes elements of curriculum instruction in multiple content areas that must be taught in public schools. Those elements include, among others, civics and government, historical facts related to the Holocaust, African Americans, Native Americans, the principals of agriculture, the study of women's contributions and those of the Hispanic community to the United States, and character development.

In particular, each school district is required to adopt a character development curriculum to include such topics as honesty, charity, self-control, racial, ethnic, and religious tolerance, and cooperation, and must submit the program to the Florida Department of Education (DOE) for approval. Also, the DOE Office of Safe and Drug Free Schools provides best practices from district developed school safety plans, many of which include district required training in conflict resolution as a part of their master inservice plan.²

The DOE Office of Safe and Drug Free Schools posts numerous links on its website to provide resources and support for students and teachers in several areas relevant to conflict resolution.³ Included on this site are materials developed by the University of Florida under a federally funded grant.⁴ These materials can be purchased by local school districts using state Safe and Drug Free Schools funding⁵ or other appropriate funding sources.⁶

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

This bill requires that conflict resolution management, including peer mediation, be included within existing district-adopted character development programs. Because the topics of self-control, racial, ethnic, and religious tolerance, and cooperation are integral to conflict resolution and peer mediation, districts would have to make only minor, if any, adjustments to their adopted curriculum.
