Subsection (2) of section 1003.42, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 11 12 1003.42 Required instruction.--13 (2) Members of the instructional staff of the public schools, subject to the rules of the State Board of Education 14 and the district school board, shall teach efficiently and 15 faithfully, using the books and materials required that meet 16 17 the highest standards for professionalism and historic accuracy, following the prescribed courses of study, and 18 employing approved methods of instruction, the following: 19 (a) The history and content of the Declaration of 20 21 Independence, including national sovereignty, natural law, 22 self-evident truth, equality of all persons, limited 23 government, popular sovereignty, and inalienable rights of life, liberty, and property, and how they form the 2.4 philosophical foundation of our government. 25 (b) The history, meaning, significance, and effect of 26 27 the provisions of the Constitution of the United States and 2.8 amendments thereto, with emphasis on each of the 10 amendments that make up the Bill of Rights and how the constitution 29 30 provides the structure of our government. 31 1

1 (c) The arguments in support of adopting our 2 republican form of government, as they are embodied in the most important of the Federalist Papers. 3 4 (d) Flag education, including proper flag display and flag salute. 5 б (e) The elements of civil government, including the 7 primary functions of and interrelationships between the 8 Federal Government, the state, and its counties, municipalities, school districts, and special districts. 9 10 (f) The history of the United States, including the period of discovery, early colonies, the War for Independence, 11 12 the Civil War, the expansion of the United States to its 13 present boundaries, the world wars, and the civil rights movement to the present. American history shall be viewed as 14 factual, not as constructed, shall be viewed as knowable, 15 teachable, and testable, and shall be defined as the creation 16 17 of a new nation based largely on the universal principles 18 stated in the Declaration of Independence. (g) The history of the Holocaust (1933-1945), the 19 systematic, planned annihilation of European Jews and other 20 21 groups by Nazi Germany, a watershed event in the history of 22 humanity, to be taught in a manner that leads to an 23 investigation of human behavior, an understanding of the ramifications of prejudice, racism, and stereotyping, and an 2.4 examination of what it means to be a responsible and 25 respectful person, for the purposes of encouraging tolerance 26 27 of diversity in a pluralistic society and for nurturing and 2.8 protecting democratic values and institutions. 29 (h) The history of African Americans, including the history of African peoples before the political conflicts that 30 led to the development of slavery, the passage to America, the 31 2

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1 enslavement experience, abolition, and the contributions of 2 African Americans to society. (i) The elementary principles of agriculture. 3 4 (j) The true effects of all alcoholic and intoxicating liquors and beverages and narcotics upon the human body and 5 б mind. 7 (k) Kindness to animals. 8 (1) The history of the state. (m) The conservation of natural resources. 9 10 (n) Comprehensive health education that addresses concepts of community health; consumer health; environmental 11 12 health; family life, including an awareness of the benefits of 13 sexual abstinence as the expected standard and the consequences of teenage pregnancy; mental and emotional 14 health; injury prevention and safety; nutrition; personal 15 health; prevention and control of disease; and substance use 16 17 and abuse. (o) Such additional materials, subjects, courses, or 18 fields in such grades as are prescribed by law or by rules of 19 20 the State Board of Education and the district school board in 21 fulfilling the requirements of law. 22 (p) The study of Hispanic contributions to the United 23 States. The study of women's contributions to the United 2.4 (q) States. 25 (r) The nature and importance of free enterprise to 26 27 the United States economy. 28 (s) A character-development program in the elementary schools, similar to Character First or Character Counts, which 29 is secular in nature. Beginning in school year 2004-2005, the 30 character-development program shall be required in 31 3

1 kindergarten through grade 12. Each district school board 2 shall develop or adopt a curriculum for the character-development program that shall be submitted to the 3 department for approval. The character-development curriculum 4 5 shall stress the qualities of patriotism; responsibility; б citizenship; kindness; respect for authority, life, liberty, 7 and personal property; honesty; charity; self-control; racial, 8 ethnic, and religious tolerance; and cooperation; and conflict-resolution management, including peer mediation. 9 (t) In order to encourage patriotism, the sacrifices 10 that veterans have made in serving our country and protecting 11 12 democratic values worldwide. Such instruction must occur on or 13 before Veterans' Day and Memorial Day. Members of the instructional staff are encouraged to use the assistance of 14 15 local veterans when practicable. 16 17 The State Board of Education is encouraged to adopt standards 18 and pursue assessment of the requirements of this subsection. 19 Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2007. 2.0 21 STATEMENT OF SUBSTANTIAL CHANGES CONTAINED IN COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR 22 Senate Bill 468 23 2.4 The committee substitute removes the requirement for a conflict resolution course for 6th grade students and instead, 25 provides that conflict resolution, including peer mediation, be incorporated into existing character development programs. 26 27 2.8 29 30 31
