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20	WHEREAS, more than 5 million United States residents
21	have Alzheimer's disease and more than 50 percent of those
22	individuals wander and become lost, and
23	WHEREAS, autism is the fastest-growing serious
24	developmental disability in the United States, and many
25	autistic individuals wander and are attracted to water,
26	causing drowning to be the leading cause of death for children
27	who have autism, and
28	WHEREAS, Project Lifesaver is a search-and-rescue
29	program that can quickly find wandering individuals who have
30	Alzheimer's disease, autism, Down's syndrome, or other mental
31	impairments, and
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1 WHEREAS, Project Lifesaver was established in Virginia 2 in 1999 and has been implemented by law enforcement agencies and public safety agencies across the country, and 3 4 WHEREAS, agencies that sponsor local lifesaver projects have stated that the program materially reduces the time 5 6 required to find lost persons, often to less than one-half 7 hour after the person is reported missing, within which period 8 there is a 100-percent recovery rate, and 9 WHEREAS, 13 Florida counties and 5 police departments have implemented a version of Project Lifesaver, and Pasco 10 County residents have taken the lead in extending the program 11 12 statewide, NOW, THEREFORE, 13 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: 14 15 Section 1. Project Lifesaver; legislative intent; 16 17 administration; grants to counties; program requirements.--18 (1) The Legislature encourages each county in this state to implement a county lifesaver project that is modeled 19 after Project Lifesaver, a search-and-rescue program designed 2.0 21 to quickly find a lost or wandering person who is mentally 22 impaired due to Alzheimer's disease, autism, Down's syndrome, 23 or other causes. The program uses small transmitters, which are usually worn on a participant's wrist, to electronically 2.4 track lost or wandering participants. A law enforcement 25 agency, usually the sheriff's office, is equipped with 26 27 receivers that track the transmitters. 2.8 (2) The Department of Law Enforcement shall serve as the liaison to county lifesaver projects and shall administer 29 the state grant moneys awarded for the purpose of starting the 30 projects. The maximum amount that a county may receive for 31

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1 startup is \$10,000, and the amount awarded must be matched 2 50-50 by county funds, such as funds obtained from the forfeited property of drug dealers. 3 4 (3) To initiate Project Lifesaver in a county, the 5 sheriff's office must approve the implementation. If the 6 county approves initiating the project in the 2007-2008 fiscal 7 year, the sheriff's office must, by October 1, 2008, submit to 8 the department an application that includes: 9 (a) An estimate of the number of people who might 10 qualify for assistance; (b) An estimate of the startup cost; 11 12 (c) A statement of the number of personnel available 13 for tracking lost individuals; and (d) The source or sources and the amount of local 14 funds available for matching state grant moneys. 15 (4) The department must prioritize the grant awards in 16 17 accordance with the respective counties' needs for tracking services and the availability of local funding sources, as 18 documented in the applications. Awards to qualifying counties 19 20 must be prorated in accordance with the availability of state 21 funds. 22 (5) With the initial grant money and local matching 23 funds, the county sheriff's office shall purchase emergency response kits, which include equipment necessary to track and 2.4 triangulate searches, as well as transmitters, and shall 25 provide 3 days' training for up to 17 deputies. Through its 26 27 community resource officer, the sheriff's office shall solicit 2.8 moneys from private sources so as to assure that within 3 years the program will be self-supporting and will not require 29 30 state funding. 31

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1 Section 2. The sum of \$670,000 is appropriated from 2 the General Revenue Fund to the Department of Law Enforcement 3 for the purpose of awarding grants to counties that qualify under this act to start county lifesaver projects during the 4 5 2007-2008 fiscal year. б Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2007. 7 ****** 8 9 SENATE SUMMARY 10 Provides legislative intent to encourage counties to implement county lifesaver projects, which are electronic monitoring programs for tracking lost persons who have a 11 mental disability such as Alzheimer's disease, autism, or Down's syndrome. Designates the Department of Law 12 Enforcement as the administrative agency. Provides procedures for starting the program in a county. Provides procedures for applying for state grant funds and requires local matching funds. Provides for prioritizing 13 14 and prorating grants. Requires the lead agency, which will usually be the county sheriff's office, to use the 15 funds for specified purchases and training.
