588-1984-07 1 A bill to be entitled 2 An act relating to physician assistants; amending ss. 458.347, 459.022, F.S.; requiring 3 that a prescription be filled in a pharmacy 4 5 unless it is a drug dispensed by a physician б assistant; providing that authority to dispense 7 may be delegated only by supervisory physicians 8 registered as dispensing practitioners; providing an effective date. 9 10 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: 11 12 13 Section 1. Paragraph (e) of subsection (4) of section 458.347, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 14 458.347 Physician assistants.--15 (4) PERFORMANCE OF PHYSICIAN ASSISTANTS.--16 17 (e) A supervisory physician may delegate to a fully licensed physician assistant the authority to prescribe or 18 dispense any medication used in the supervisory physician's 19 practice unless such medication is listed on the formulary 20 created pursuant to paragraph (f). A fully licensed physician 21 22 assistant may only prescribe or dispense such medication under 23 the following circumstances: 1. A physician assistant must clearly identify to the 2.4 patient that he or she is a physician assistant. Furthermore, 25 the physician assistant must inform the patient that the 26 patient has the right to see the physician prior to any 27 2.8 prescription being prescribed or dispensed by the physician 29 assistant. 30 2. The supervisory physician must notify the department of his or her intent to delegate, on a 31 1

1 department-approved form, before delegating such authority and 2 notify the department of any change in prescriptive privileges of the physician assistant. Authority to dispense may be 3 4 delegated only by a supervising physician who is registered as 5 a dispensing practitioner in compliance with s. 465.0276. 6 3. The physician assistant must file with the 7 department, before commencing to prescribe or dispense, 8 evidence that he or she has completed a continuing medical education course of at least 3 classroom hours in prescriptive 9 10 practice, conducted by an accredited program approved by the boards, which course covers the limitations, responsibilities, 11 12 and privileges involved in prescribing medicinal drugs, or 13 evidence that he or she has received education comparable to the continuing education course as part of an accredited 14 physician assistant training program. 15 4. The physician assistant must file with the 16 17 department, before commencing to prescribe or dispense, evidence that the physician assistant has a minimum of 3 18 months of clinical experience in the specialty area of the 19 supervising physician. 20 21 5. The physician assistant must file with the 22 department a signed affidavit that he or she has completed a 23 minimum of 10 continuing medical education hours in the specialty practice in which the physician assistant has 2.4 prescriptive privileges with each licensure renewal 25 application. 26 27 6. The department shall issue a license and a 2.8 prescriber number to the physician assistant granting authority for the prescribing of medicinal drugs authorized 29 30 within this paragraph upon completion of the foregoing 31

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1 requirements. The physician assistant shall not be required to 2 independently register pursuant to s. 465.0276. 3 7. The prescription must be written in a form that 4 complies with chapter 499 and must contain, in addition to the supervisory physician's name, address, and telephone number, 5 6 the physician assistant's prescriber number. Unless it is a 7 drug or drug sample dispensed by the physician assistant, the prescription must be filled in a pharmacy permitted under 8 chapter 465 and must be dispensed in that pharmacy by a 9 10 pharmacist licensed under chapter 465. The appearance of the prescriber number creates a presumption that the physician 11 12 assistant is authorized to prescribe the medicinal drug and 13 the prescription is valid. 8. The physician assistant must note the prescription 14 or dispensing of medication in the appropriate medical record, 15 and the supervisory physician must review and sign each 16 17 notation. For dispensing purposes only, the failure of the 18 supervisory physician to comply with these requirements does not affect the validity of the prescription. 19 20 9. This paragraph does not prohibit a supervisory 21 physician from delegating to a physician assistant the 22 authority to order medication for a hospitalized patient of 23 the supervisory physician. 2.4 25 This paragraph does not apply to facilities licensed pursuant to chapter 395. 26 27 Section 2. Paragraph (e) of subsection (4) of section 2.8 459.022, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 29 459.022 Physician assistants.--(4) PERFORMANCE OF PHYSICIAN ASSISTANTS.--30 31

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1	(e) A supervisory physician may delegate to a fully
2	licensed physician assistant the authority to prescribe or
3	dispense any medication used in the supervisory physician's
4	practice unless such medication is listed on the formulary
5	created pursuant to s. 458.347. A fully licensed physician
6	assistant may only prescribe <u>or dispense</u> such medication under
7	the following circumstances:
8	1. A physician assistant must clearly identify to the
9	patient that she or he is a physician assistant. Furthermore,
10	the physician assistant must inform the patient that the

12	prescription being prescribed or dispensed by the physician

The department shall issue a license and a 13 prescriber number to the physician assistant granting authority for the prescribing of medicinal drugs authorized 14 within this paragraph upon completion of the foregoing 15 requirements. The physician assistant shall not be required to 16 17 independently register pursuant to s. 465.0276. 18 7. The prescription must be written in a form that complies with chapter 499 and must contain, in addition to the 19 20 supervisory physician's name, address, and telephone number, 21 the physician assistant's prescriber number. Unless it is a 22 drug or drug sample dispensed by the physician assistant, the 23 prescription must be filled in a pharmacy permitted under chapter 465, and must be dispensed in that pharmacy by a 2.4 pharmacist licensed under chapter 465. The appearance of the 25 prescriber number creates a presumption that the physician 26 27 assistant is authorized to prescribe the medicinal drug and 2.8 the prescription is valid. 29 8. The physician assistant must note the prescription 30 or dispensing of medication in the appropriate medical record, and the supervisory physician must review and sign each 31 5

1 notation. For dispensing purposes only, the failure of the 2 supervisory physician to comply with these requirements does not affect the validity of the prescription. 3 4 9. This paragraph does not prohibit a supervisory physician from delegating to a physician assistant the 5 6 authority to order medication for a hospitalized patient of 7 the supervisory physician. 8 9 This paragraph does not apply to facilities licensed pursuant 10 to chapter 395. Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2007. 11 12 STATEMENT OF SUBSTANTIAL CHANGES CONTAINED IN 13 COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR Senate Bill 692 14 15 16 The committee substitute specifies the conditions under which a physician assistant may dispense medicinal drugs by: 17 Authorizing the supervising medical or osteopathic 18 physician to delegate to the physician assistant the authority to dispense medications. 19 Requiring the supervising medical or osteopathic 20 physician to be registered as a dispensing practitioner. 21 Specifying that a physician assistant is not required to register independently of his or her supervising 22 physician. 23 2.4 25 26 27 28 29 30 31
