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8	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
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10	Section 1. Subsection (2) of section 1003.42, Florida
11	Statutes, is amended to read:
12	1003.42 Required instruction
13	(2) Members of the instructional staff of the public
14	schools, subject to the rules of the State Board of Education and
15	the district school board, shall teach efficiently and
16	faithfully, using the books and materials required that meet the
17	highest standards for professionalism and historic accuracy,
18	following the prescribed courses of study, and employing approved
19	methods of instruction, the following:
20	(a) The history and content of the Declaration of
21	Independence, including national sovereignty, natural law, self-
22	evident truth, equality of all persons, limited government,
23	popular sovereignty, and inalienable rights of life, liberty, and
24	property, and how they form the philosophical foundation of our
25	government.
26	(b) The history, meaning, significance, and effect of the
27	provisions of the Constitution of the United States and
28	amendments thereto, with emphasis on each of the 10 amendments

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29 that make up the Bill of Rights and how the constitution provides 30 the structure of our government.

31 (c) The arguments in support of adopting our republican 32 form of government, as they are embodied in the most important of 33 the Federalist Papers.

34 (d) Flag education, including proper flag display and flag35 salute.

36 (e) The elements of civil government, including the primary
37 functions of and interrelationships between the Federal
38 Government, the state, and its counties, municipalities, school
39 districts, and special districts.

40 The history of the United States, including the period (f) 41 of discovery, early colonies, the War for Independence, the Civil 42 War, the expansion of the United States to its present 43 boundaries, the world wars, and the civil rights movement to the present. American history shall be viewed as factual, not as 44 constructed, shall be viewed as knowable, teachable, and 45 46 testable, and shall be defined as the creation of a new nation 47 based largely on the universal principles stated in the 48 Declaration of Independence.

49 The history of the Holocaust (1933-1945), the (q) 50 systematic, planned annihilation of European Jews and other 51 groups by Nazi Germany, a watershed event in the history of 52 humanity, to be taught in a manner that leads to an investigation 53 of human behavior, an understanding of the ramifications of 54 prejudice, racism, and stereotyping, and an examination of what 55 it means to be a responsible and respectful person, for the 56 purposes of encouraging tolerance of diversity in a pluralistic

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57 society and for nurturing and protecting democratic values and 58 institutions.

(h) The history of African Americans, including the history of African peoples before the political conflicts that led to the development of slavery, the passage to America, the enslavement experience, abolition, and the contributions of African Americans to society.

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(i) The elementary principles of agriculture.

(j) The true effects of all alcoholic and intoxicatingliquors and beverages and narcotics upon the human body and mind.

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(k) Kindness to animals.

68 69 (1) The history of the state.

(m) The conservation of natural resources.

(n) Comprehensive health education that addresses concepts of community health; consumer health; environmental health; family life, including an awareness of the benefits of sexual abstinence as the expected standard and the consequences of teenage pregnancy; mental and emotional health; injury prevention and safety; nutrition; personal health; prevention and control of disease; and substance use and abuse.

(o) Such additional materials, subjects, courses, or fields in such grades as are prescribed by law or by rules of the State Board of Education and the district school board in fulfilling the requirements of law.

81 (p) The study of Hispanic contributions to the United82 States.

83 (q) The study of women's contributions to the United84 States.

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85 (r) The nature and importance of free enterprise to the86 United States economy.

87 (s) A character-development program in the elementary schools, similar to Character First or Character Counts, which is 88 89 secular in nature. Beginning in school year 2004-2005, the 90 character-development program shall be required in kindergarten 91 through grade 12. Each district school board shall develop or 92 adopt a curriculum for the character-development program that 93 shall be submitted to the department for approval. The characterdevelopment curriculum shall emphasize stress the qualities of 94 patriotism; responsibility; citizenship; kindness; respect for 95 96 authority, life, liberty, and personal property; honesty; 97 charity; self-control; racial, ethnic, and religious tolerance; 98 and cooperation; and conflict-resolution management, including 99 peer mediation.

(t) In order to encourage patriotism, the sacrifices that veterans have made in serving our country and protecting democratic values worldwide. Such instruction must occur on or before Veterans' Day and Memorial Day. Members of the instructional staff are encouraged to use the assistance of local veterans when practicable.

107 The State Board of Education is encouraged to adopt standards and 108 pursue assessment of the requirements of this subsection.

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Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2008.

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
