12	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

14	Section 1. Subsection (5) of section 316.515, Florida
15	Statutes, is amended to read:
16	316.515 Maximum width, height, length
17	(5) IMPLEMENTS OF HUSBANDRY AND FARM EQUIPMENT;
18	AGRICULTURAL TRAILERS; FORESTRY EQUIPMENT; SAFETY REQUIREMENTS
19	(a) Notwithstanding any other provisions of law, straight
20	trucks, agricultural tractors, and cotton module movers, not
21	exceeding 50 feet in length, or any combination of up to and
22	including three implements of husbandry, including the towing
23	power unit, and any single agricultural trailer with a load
24	thereon or any agricultural implements attached to a towing power
25	unit <del>not exceeding 130 inches in width</del> , or a self-propelled
26	agricultural implement or an agricultural tractor not exceeding
27	130 inches in width, is authorized for the purpose of
28	transporting peanuts, grains, soybeans, cotton, hay, straw, or
29	other perishable farm products from their point of production to

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the first point of change of custody or of long-term storage, and 30 31 for the purpose of returning to such point of production, or for 32 the purpose of moving such tractors, movers, and implements from one point of agricultural production to another, by a person 33 34 engaged in the production of any such product or custom hauler, if such vehicle or combination of vehicles otherwise complies 35 with this section. The Department of Transportation may issue 36 37 overwidth permits for implements of husbandry greater than 130 38 inches, but not more than 170 inches, in width. The Department of 39 Transportation may issue overlength permits for cotton module 40 movers greater than 50 feet but not more than 55 feet in overall 41 length. Such vehicles shall be operated in accordance with all 42 safety requirements prescribed by law and rules of the Department 43 of Transportation.

44 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, equipment (b) 45 not exceeding 136 inches in width and not capable of speeds 46 exceeding 20 miles per hour which is used exclusively for 47 harvesting forestry products is authorized for the purpose of transporting equipment from one point of harvest to another point 48 49 of harvest, not to exceed 10 miles, by a person engaged in the 50 harvesting of forestry products. Such vehicles must be operated 51 during daylight hours only, in accordance with all safety requirements prescribed by s. 316.2295(5) and (6). 52

(c) The width and height limitations of this section do not apply to farming or agricultural equipment, whether selfpropelled, pulled, or hauled, when temporarily operated during daylight hours upon a public road that is not a limited access facility as defined in s. 334.03(13), and the width and height limitations may be exceeded by such equipment without a permit.

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To be eligible for this exemption, the equipment shall be
operated within a radius of 50 miles of the real property owned,
rented, or leased by the equipment owner. However, farming or
agricultural equipment greater than 174 inches in width is
required to have one warning lamp mounted on each side of the
equipment to denote the width and a slow-moving vehicle sign.
Warning lamps required by this paragraph are required to be
visible from the front and rear of the vehicle and must be
visible from a distance of at least 1,000 feet.
(d) The operator of equipment operated under this
subsection is responsible for verifying that the route used has
adequate clearance for the equipment.
Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2008.
