7	tuition assistance programs rather than financial aid
8	programs; requiring that an institution meet a specified
9	retention rate in order to participate in either program;
10	requiring that a student receiving an award under either
11	program maintain a specified grade point average, earn a
12	certain amount of academic credit each semester or
13	equivalent term, file certain information with the
14	Department of Education concerning financial need, and
15	demonstrate unmet financial need at the institution;
16	requiring institutions participating in either program to
17	remit to the department the amount of tuition assistance
18	expended for students who fail to meet certain
19	requirements; limiting the period during which a student
20	may receive an award of tuition assistance; providing an
21	effective date.
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23	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
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25	Section 1. Section 1009.89, Florida Statutes, is amended to

27	1009.89 The William L. Boyd, IV, Florida resident access
28	grants
29	(1) The Legislature finds and declares that independent
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30 nonprofit colleges and universities eligible to participate in 31 the William L. Boyd, IV, Florida Resident Access Grant Program 32 are an integral part of the higher education system in this state and that a significant number of state residents choose this form 33 34 of higher education. The Legislature further finds that a strong 35 and viable system of independent nonprofit colleges and universities reduces the tax burden on the citizens of the state. 36 37 Because The William L. Boyd, IV, Florida Resident Access Grant 38 Program is not related to a student's financial need or other 39 criteria upon which financial aid programs are based, it is the 40 intent of the Legislature that the William L. Boyd, IV, Florida 41 Resident Access Grant Program not be considered a financial aid 42 program but rather a tuition assistance program for its citizens.

43 (2) The William L. Boyd, IV, Florida Resident Access Grant
44 Program shall be administered by the Department of Education. The
45 State Board of Education shall adopt rules for the administration
46 of the program.

47 The department shall issue through the program a (3) 48 William L. Boyd, IV, Florida resident access grant to any full-49 time degree-seeking undergraduate student registered at an 50 independent nonprofit college or university that which is located 51 in and chartered by the state; that which is accredited by the 52 Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges 53 and Schools; that which grants baccalaureate degrees; that has a 54 mean retention rate, based on data for baccalaureate-degree-55 seeking students reported the prior year to the federal 56 Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System, which is no more 57 than two standard deviations below the mean retention rate for 58 all public and private baccalaureate degree-granting institutions

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59 in the state; that which is not a state university or state 60 community college; and that which has a secular purpose, so long as the receipt of state aid by students at the institution would 61 not have the primary effect of advancing or impeding religion or 62 63 result in an excessive entanglement between the state and any religious sect. Any independent college or university that was 64 65 eligible to receive tuition vouchers on January 1, 1989, and that 66 which continues to meet the criteria under which its eligibility 67 was established, shall remain eligible to receive William L. 68 Boyd, IV, Florida resident access grant payments. An institution that does not meet the required retention rate on July 1, 2008, 69 70 remains eligible to participate until July 1, 2011. 71 A person is eligible to receive such William L. Boyd, (4) 72 IV, Florida resident access grant if: 73 (a) He or she meets the general requirements, including 74 residency, for student eligibility as provided in s. 1009.40, 75 except as otherwise provided in this section; and 76 (b)1. He or she is enrolled as a full-time undergraduate 77 student at an eligible college or university; 78 2. He or she is not enrolled in a program of study leading 79 to a degree in theology or divinity; and 80 He or she maintains a cumulative grade point average of 3. at least 2.25 on a 4.0 scale and earns 12 hours of academic 81 82 credit for each semester, or the equivalent for each quarter, 83 that he or she receives an award; is making satisfactory academic 84 progress as defined by the college or university in which he or she is enrolled. 85 86 4. He or she files with the department information 87 concerning financial need on a form approved by the department;

89 <u>5. He or she demonstrates unmet financial need at the</u>
90 <u>institution where he or she is enrolled.</u>

(5) (a) Funding for the William L. Boyd, IV, Florida 91 92 Resident Access Grant Program shall be based on a formula composed of planned enrollment and the state cost of funding 93 94 undergraduate enrollment at public institutions pursuant to s. 95 1011.90. The amount of the William L. Boyd, IV, Florida resident 96 access grant issued to a full-time student shall be an amount as 97 specified in the General Appropriations Act. The William L. Boyd, 98 IV, Florida resident access grant may be paid on a prorated basis 99 in advance of the registration period. The department shall make 100 such payments to the college or university in which the student is enrolled for credit to the student's account for payment of 101 102 tuition and fees. Institutions shall certify to the department 103 the amount of funds disbursed to each student and shall remit to 104 the department any undisbursed advances or refunds within 60 days 105 of the end of regular registration. Each institution shall 106 annually remit to the department the amount of the grant expended 107 under this program for each student who failed to maintain a 108 cumulative grade point average of at least 2.25 on a 4.0 scale or 109 who failed to earn 12 hours of academic credit for each semester, or the equivalent for each quarter, that he or she received an 110 111 award. Students shall not be eligible to receive the award for 112 more than 8  $\frac{9}{2}$  semesters or an equivalent number of  $\frac{14}{14}$  quarters, except as otherwise provided in s. 1009.40(3). 113

(b) If the combined amount of the William L. Boyd, IV,
Florida resident access grant issued pursuant to this act and all
other scholarships and grants for tuition or fees exceeds the

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amount charged to the student for tuition and fees, the department shall reduce the William L. Boyd, IV, Florida resident access grant issued pursuant to this act by an amount equal to such excess.

(6) If the number of eligible students exceeds the total
authorized in the General Appropriations Act, an institution may
use its own resources to assure that each eligible student
receives the full benefit of the grant amount authorized.

The Legislature further finds that strong, 135 viable independent for-profit colleges and universities reduce the tax burden on the residents of the state. Because The Access 136 137 to Better Learning and Education Grant Program is not related to 138 a student's financial need or other criteria upon which financial 139 aid programs are based, it is the intent of the Legislature that 140 the Access to Better Learning and Education Grant Program not be 141 considered a financial aid program but rather a tuition 142 assistance program for state residents.

143 (2) The Access to Better Learning and Education Grant
144 Program shall be administered by the Department of Education. The
145 State Board of Education shall adopt rules for administering the

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146 program.

147 (3) The department shall issue an access grant to any full-148 time student seeking a baccalaureate degree who is registered at a for-profit college or university that is located in and 149 150 chartered by the state and that is accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools 151 152 or who is registered at a nonprofit college or university that is 153 chartered out of the state, that has been located in the state 154 for 10 years or more, and that is accredited by the Commission on 155 Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the 156 Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools, the North 157 Central Association of Colleges and Schools, or the New England 158 Association of Colleges and Schools; that grants baccalaureate 159 degrees; that has a mean retention rate, based on data reported 160 to the federal Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System, 161 which is no more than two standard deviations below the mean 162 retention rate for all public and private baccalaureate degree-163 granting institutions in the state; that is not a state 164 university or state community college; and that has a secular 165 purpose, if the receipt of state aid by students at the 166 institution would not have the primary effect of advancing or 167 impeding religion or result in an excessive entanglement between 168 the state and any religious sect. Institutions eligible for the 169 Access to Better Learning and Education Grant Program in the 170 initial year of funding shall include only those for-profit 171 colleges or universities identified in this subsection. Nonprofit colleges or universities identified in this subsection shall be 172 173 eligible for financial support in the second year of funding. An 174 institution that does not meet the required retention rate on

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175 July 1, 2008, remains eligible to participate until July 1, 2011. 176 (4) A person is eligible to receive an access grant if: 177 He or she meets the general requirements, including (a) residency, for student eligibility as provided in s. 1009.40, 178 179 except as otherwise provided in this section; and (b)1. He or she is enrolled as a full-time undergraduate 180 181 student at an eligible college or university in a program of 182 study leading to a baccalaureate degree; 183 2. He or she is not enrolled in a program of study leading 184 to a degree in theology or divinity; and He or she maintains a cumulative grade point average of 185 3. 186 at least 2.25 on a 4.0 scale and earns 12 hours of academic 187 credit for each semester, or the equivalent for each quarter, that he or she receives an award; is making satisfactory academic 188 189 progress as defined by the college or university in which he or 190 she is enrolled. 191 4. He or she files with the department information 192 concerning financial need on a form approved by the department; 193 and 194 5. He or she demonstrates unmet financial need at the 195 institution where he or she is enrolled. 196 The amount of the access grant issued to a full-time (5)(a) 197 student shall be an amount specified in the General 198 Appropriations Act. The access grant may be paid on a prorated 199 basis in advance of the registration period. The department shall 200 make payments to the college or university in which the student is enrolled for credit to the student's account for payment of 201 202 tuition and fees. Institutions shall certify to the department 203 the amount of funds disbursed to each student and shall remit to

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the department any undisbursed advances or refunds within 60 days 204 205 after the end of regular registration. Each institution shall 206 annually remit to the department the amount of tuition assistance 207 expended under this program for each student who failed to maintain a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.25 on a 208 209 4.0 scale or who failed to earn 12 hours of academic credit for 210 each semester, or the equivalent for each quarter, that he or she 211 received an award. A student may not receive the award for more 212 than 8  $\frac{9}{2}$  semesters or an equivalent number of  $\frac{14}{14}$  quarters, except as otherwise provided in s. 1009.40(3). 213

(b) If the combined amount of the access grant issued pursuant to this section and all other scholarships and grants for tuition or fees exceeds the amount charged to the student for tuition and fees, the department shall reduce the grant issued under this section by an amount equal to the excess.

(6) If the number of eligible students exceeds the total authorized in the General Appropriations Act, an institution may use its own resources to assure that each eligible student receives the full benefit of the grant amount authorized.

(7) This section shall be implemented only to the extentspecifically funded and authorized by law.

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Section 3. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law.
