The Legislature further finds that a strong 33 and viable system of independent nonprofit colleges and 34 universities reduces the tax burden on the citizens of the state. 35 Because The William L. Boyd, IV, Florida Resident Access Grant Program is not related to a student's financial need or other 36 37 criteria upon which financial aid programs are based, it is the intent of the Legislature that the William L. Boyd, IV, Florida 38 39 Resident Access Grant Program not be considered a financial aid 40 program but rather a tuition assistance program for its citizens.

(2) The William L. Boyd, IV, Florida Resident Access Grant
Program shall be administered by the Department of Education. The
State Board of Education shall adopt rules for the administration
of the program.

Boyd, IV, Florida resident access grant to any full-47 time degree-seeking undergraduate student registered at an 48 independent nonprofit college or university that which is located 49 in and chartered by the state; that which is accredited by the 50 Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges 51 and Schools; that which grants baccalaureate degrees; that which 52 is not a state university or state community college; and that 53 which has a secular purpose, so long as the receipt of state aid 54 by students at the institution would not have the primary effect 55 of advancing or impeding religion or result in an excessive 56 entanglement between the state and any religious sect. Any 57 independent college or university that was eligible to receive tuition vouchers on January 1, 1989, and that which continues to 58

Institutions shall certify to the department 93 94 the amount of funds disbursed to each student and shall remit to 95 the department any undisbursed advances or refunds within 60 days 96 of the end of regular registration. Each institution shall 97 annually remit to the department the amount of the grant expended under this program for each student who failed to maintain a 98 99 cumulative grade point average of at least 2.25 on a 4.0 scale or 100 who failed to earn 12 hours of academic credit for each semester, or the equivalent for each quarter, that he or she received an 101 102 award. Students shall not be eliqible to receive the award for 103 more than 8 $\frac{9}{14}$ semesters or an equivalent number of $\frac{14}{14}$ quarters, 104 except as otherwise provided in s. 1009.40(3).

(b) If the combined amount of the William L. Boyd, IV, Florida resident access grant issued pursuant to this act and all other scholarships and grants for tuition or fees exceeds the amount charged to the student for tuition and fees, the department shall reduce the William L. Boyd, IV, Florida resident access grant issued pursuant to this act by an amount equal to such excess.

(6) If the number of eligible students exceeds the total authorized in the General Appropriations Act, an institution may use its own resources to assure that each eligible student receives the full benefit of the grant amount authorized.
