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**SUMMARY ANALYSIS**

The bill provides that, upon presentation of valid identification, any person serving in any branch of the United States Armed Forces, and the spouse and minor children of such persons are not to be charged an admission fee to a state park on Memorial Day. The bill also provides free admission to state parks on Veterans Day for all state park attendees in honor of U.S. military veterans. The bill encourages the Division of Parks and Recreation to hold special events and to take other actions appropriate to show appreciation to those who have served our country in the armed forces.

The Department of Environmental Protection estimates that this legislation would result in a loss of \$43,000 annually to the State Park Trust Fund.

The bill provides an effective date, July 1, 2008.

## FULL ANALYSIS

### I. SUBSTANTIVE ANALYSIS

#### A. HOUSE PRINCIPLES ANALYSIS:

The bill does not appear to implicate any of the House Principals.

#### B. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

##### Present Situation

From its beginning in 1935, Florida's state park system has expanded to one of the largest and most heavily used systems in the country. Containing over 700,000 acres in 161 separate units, the state park system today represents a major commitment by the State of Florida to the preservation of its scenic resources. Florida state parks provide outstanding recreation opportunities for its citizens and visitors.<sup>1</sup> On average there are 17.4 million visitors per year to Florida's state parks.<sup>2</sup> Park entrance fees vary from \$3.00 per person to \$5.00 per vehicle.<sup>3</sup> There is currently no statutory provision for free park admission for active duty members of the U.S. military.

##### Effect of Proposed Changes

The bill creates s. 258.014(3), F.S., providing any person who is serving the United States Armed Forces, and the spouse and minor child of such persons, upon presentation of valid identification, will not be charged an admission fee to a state park on Memorial Day. The bill also provides free admission to state parks on Veterans Day for all state park attendees in honor of U.S. military veterans. The bill encourages the Division of Parks and Recreation to hold special events and to take other actions appropriate to show appreciation to those who have served our country in the armed forces.

#### C. SECTION DIRECTORY:

Section 1: Creates s. 258.014(3), F.S., providing free admission to state parks for certain persons on certain holidays.

Section 2: Provides an effective date.

### IV. AMENDMENTS/COUNCIL SUBSTITUTE CHANGES

The Environment & Natural Resources Council amended and passed HB 289 on April 2, 2008. CS/HB 289 differs from the original filed bill as follows: The original bill provides free admission to state parks on any federal or state holiday to any person who is serving in any branch of the United States Armed Forces, who is a veteran of the United States Armed Forces, or who is the spouse or minor child of such persons. The amended bill provides free admission to state parks on Memorial Day for all active U.S. military personnel, their spouses and minor children, and provides free admission to state parks on Veterans Day for all state park attendees in honor of U.S. military veterans. The amended bill also encourages the Division of Parks and Recreation to hold special events and to take other actions appropriate to show appreciation to those who have served our country in the armed forces.
