Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: Section 1. Section 381.84, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 381.84 Comprehensive Statewide Tobacco Education and Use

(1) DEFINITIONS.--As used in this section and for purposes Page 1 of 14

44 (2)PURPOSE, FINDINGS, AND INTENT. -- It is the purpose of this section to implement s. 27, Art. X of the State 45 Constitution. The Legislature finds that s. 27, Art. X of the 46 State Constitution requires the funding of a statewide tobacco 47 48 education and use prevention program that focuses on tobacco use 49 by youth. The Legislature further finds that the primary goals 50 of the program are to reduce the prevalence of tobacco use among youth, adults, and pregnant women; reduce per capita tobacco 51 52 consumption; implement interventions to detect, prevent, and treat tobacco-related chronic diseases; and reduce exposure to 53 environmental tobacco smoke. Further, it is the intent of the 54 Legislature to base increases in funding for individual 55 components of the program on the results of assessments and 56 Page 2 of 14

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57 evaluations. Recognizing that some components will need to grow 58 faster than inflation, it is the intent of the Legislature to 59 fund portions of the program on a nonrecurring basis in the 60 early years so that those components that are most effective can 61 be supported as the program matures.

PROGRAM COMPONENTS AND REQUIREMENTS. -- The department 62 (3) 63 shall conduct a comprehensive, statewide tobacco education and 64 use prevention program consistent with the recommendations for 65 effective program components contained in the 1999 Best Practices for Comprehensive Tobacco Control Programs of the CDC, 66 67 as amended by the CDC. The program shall include the following components, each of which shall focus on educating people, 68 particularly youth and their parents, about the health hazards 69 70 of tobacco and discouraging the use of tobacco:

(a) Counter-marketing and advertising; <u>Internet</u> cyberspace resource center.--The counter-marketing and advertising campaign shall include, at a minimum, Internet, print, radio, and television advertising and shall be funded with a minimum of one-third of the total annual appropriation required by s. 27, Art. X of the State Constitution.

77 The campaign shall include an Internet A cyberspace 1. resource center for copyrighted materials and information 78 79 concerning tobacco education and use prevention, including 80 cessation, shall be maintained by the program. Such resource center must be accessible to the public, including parents, 81 82 teachers, and students, at each level of public and private schools, universities, and colleges in the state and shall 83 provide links to other relevant resources. The Internet address 84 Page 3 of 14

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for the resource center must be incorporated in all advertising.
The information maintained in the resource center shall be used
by the other components of the program.

The campaign shall utilize innovative communication 88 2. 89 strategies, such as targeting specific audiences through personal communication devices and online networking 90 91 environments. The campaign shall specifically employ innovative 92 channels to disseminate the campaign message, including 93 utilizing physicians licensed under chapter 458 or chapter 459 94 and dentists licensed under chapter 466 to target specific 95 audiences and provide brief advice to quit the use of tobacco.

96 (b) Cessation programs, counseling, and treatment.--This
97 program component shall include three two subcomponents:

98 1. A statewide toll-free cessation service, which may 99 include counseling, referrals to other local resources and 100 support services, and treatment to the extent funds are 101 available for treatment services.; and

2. A local community-based program to disseminate
 information about <u>tobacco-use</u> <del>smoking</del> cessation, how <u>tobacco-use</u>
 <del>smoking</del> cessation relates to prenatal care and obesity
 prevention, and other chronic tobacco-related diseases.

1063. A statewide program that utilizes physicians licensed107under chapter 458 or chapter 459 and dentists licensed under108chapter 466 to deliver brief advice to quit the use of tobacco.

109 (c) Surveillance and evaluation.--The program shall
 110 conduct ongoing epidemiological surveillance and shall contract
 111 for annual independent evaluations of the effectiveness of the

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112 various components of the program in meeting the goals as set 113 forth in subsection (2).

(d) Youth school programs.--School and after-school programs shall use current evidence-based curricula and programs that involve youth to educate youth about the health hazards of tobacco, help youth develop skills to refuse tobacco, and demonstrate to youth how to stop using tobacco.

Statewide and community programs and chronic disease 119 (e) 120 prevention. -- The department shall promote and support statewide 121 and local community-based partnerships that encourage and support individuals, especially youth, to make behavior choices 122 consistent with tobacco-free norms. In addition, the department 123 124 shall promote and support statewide and community emphasize 125 programs involving youth, including programs for the prevention, 126 detection, and treatment early intervention of tobacco-related smoking-related chronic diseases, such as cancer, chronic lung 127 128 and respiratory diseases, and heart disease.

(f) Training.--The program shall include the training of health care practitioners, <u>tobacco-use cessation</u> <del>smoking</del>-<del>cessation</del> counselors, and teachers by health professional students and other tobacco-use prevention specialists who are trained in preventing tobacco use and health education. <u>Tobacco-</u> <u>use cessation</u> <del>Smoking cessation</del> counselors shall be trained by specialists who are certified in tobacco-use cessation.

(g) Administration <u>and management.--The department shall</u>
administer the program within the expenditure limit established
in subsection (8). As part of this component, the department
shall coordinate the activities of the state and local tobacco

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140 control community. In addition, statewide programs, and county 141 health departments. -- Each county health department is eligible 142 to receive a portion of the annual appropriation, on a per 143 capita basis, for coordinating tobacco education and use prevention programs within that county. Appropriated funds may 144 145 be used to improve the infrastructure of the county health 146 department to implement the comprehensive, statewide tobacco 147 education and use prevention program. each county health 148 department shall prominently display in all treatment rooms and waiting rooms, counter-marketing and advertisement materials in 149 150 the form of wall posters, brochures, television advertising if 151 televisions are used in the lobby or waiting room, and screensavers and Internet advertising if computer kiosks are 152 available for use or viewing by people at the county health 153 154 department.

155 (h) Enforcement and awareness of related laws.--In 156 coordination with the Department of Business and Professional 157 Regulation, the program shall monitor the enforcement of laws, 158 rules, and policies prohibiting the sale or other provision of tobacco to minors, as well as the continued enforcement of the 159 160 Clean Indoor Air Act prescribed in chapter 386. The 161 advertisements produced in accordance with paragraph (a) may 162 also include information designed to make the public aware of these related laws and rules. The departments may enter into 163 interagency agreements to carry out this program component. 164

(i) AHEC <u>tobacco-use cessation</u> <del>smoking cessation</del> initiative.--For the <del>2007-2008 and</del> 2008-2009 fiscal <u>year</u> <del>years</del> only, the AHEC network shall expand the AHEC <u>tobacco-use</u> Page 6 of 14

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168 <u>cessation</u> <del>smoking cessation</del> initiative to each county within the 169 state and perform other activities as determined by the 170 department.

(4) ADVISORY COUNCIL; MEMBERS, APPOINTMENTS, AND
MEETINGS.--The Tobacco Education and Use Prevention Advisory
Council is created within the department.

(a) The council shall consist of <u>24</u> <del>23</del> members, including:
175 1. The State Surgeon General, who shall serve as the
176 chairperson.

177 2. One county health department director, appointed by the178 State Surgeon General.

179 3. Two members appointed by the Commissioner of Education,180 of whom one must be a school district superintendent.

181 4. The chief executive officer of the Florida Division of182 the American Cancer Society, or his or her designee.

183 5. The chief executive officer of the Greater Southeast
184 Affiliate of the American Heart Association, or his or her
185 designee.

186 6. The chief executive officer of the American Lung187 Association of Florida, or his or her designee.

188 7. The dean of the University of Miami School of Medicine,189 or his or her designee.

190 8. The dean of the University of Florida College of191 Medicine, or his or her designee.

192 9. The dean of the University of South Florida College of193 Medicine, or his or her designee.

194 10. The dean of the Florida State University College of 195 Medicine, or his or her designee.

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196 11. The dean of Nova Southeastern College of Osteopathic197 Medicine, or his or her designee.

198 12. The dean of the Lake Erie College of Osteopathic199 Medicine in Bradenton, Florida, or his or her designee.

13. The chief executive officer of the Campaign forTobacco Free Kids, or his or her designee.

14. The chief executive officer of the Legacy Foundation,or his or her designee.

15. Four members appointed by the Governor, of whom two must have expertise in the field of tobacco-use prevention and education or <u>tobacco-use</u> <del>smoking</del> cessation and one individual who shall be between the ages of 16 and 21 at the time of his or her appointment.

16. Two members appointed by the President of the Senate,
of whom one must have expertise in the field of tobacco-use
prevention and education or <u>tobacco-use</u> smoking cessation.

212 17. Two members appointed by the Speaker of the House of 213 Representatives, of whom one must have expertise in the field of 214 tobacco-use prevention and education or <u>tobacco-use</u> <del>smoking</del> 215 cessation.

216 <u>18. The dean of a School of Nursing, Health and Natural</u> 217 <u>Sciences, or Allied Health Sciences academic program at a</u> 218 <u>historically black college or university, or his or her</u> 219 <u>designee. This member shall be selected from a different college</u> 220 <u>or university every 3 years.</u>

(b) The appointments shall be for 3-year terms and shall
reflect the diversity of the state's population. A vacancy shall

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223 be filled by appointment by the original appointing authority 224 for the unexpired portion of the term.

(c) An appointed member may not serve more than twoconsecutive terms.

(d) The council shall meet at least quarterly and upon the
call of the chairperson. Meetings may be held via teleconference
or other electronic means.

(e) Members of the council shall serve without
compensation, but are entitled to reimbursement for per diem and
travel expenses pursuant to s. 112.061. Members who are state
officers or employees or who are appointed by state officers or
employees shall be reimbursed for per diem and travel expenses
pursuant to s. 112.061 from the state agency through which they
serve.

(f) The department shall provide council members with
information and other assistance as is reasonably necessary to
assist the council in carrying out its responsibilities.

(5) COUNCIL DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES.--The council
shall advise the State Surgeon General as to the direction and
scope of the Comprehensive Statewide Tobacco Education and Use
Prevention Program. The responsibilities of the council include,
but are not limited to:

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(a) Providing advice on program priorities and emphases.

(b) Providing advice on the overall program budget.

(c) Providing advice on copyrighted material, trademark,
and future transactions as they pertain to the tobacco education
and use prevention program.

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Internet, portable media players, radio, and television as it relates to the advertising component of the tobacco education and use prevention program.

(e) Participating in periodic program evaluation.

(f) Assisting in the development of guidelines to ensure
fairness, neutrality, and adherence to the principles of merit
and quality in the conduct of the program.

(g) Assisting in the development of administrative
procedures relating to solicitation, review, and award of
contracts and grants in order to ensure an impartial, highquality peer review system.

(h) Assisting in the development and supervision of peerreview panels.

264 (i) Reviewing reports of peer review panels and making265 recommendations for contracts and grants.

(j) Reviewing the activities and evaluating the
performance of the AHEC network to avoid duplicative efforts
using state funds.

(k) Recommending meaningful outcome measures through a
regular review of tobacco-use prevention and education
strategies and programs of other states and the Federal
Government.

(1) Recommending policies to encourage a coordinated response to tobacco use in this state, focusing specifically on creating partnerships within and between the public and private sectors.

277 (6) CONTRACT REQUIREMENTS.--Contracts or grants for the 278 program components or subcomponents described in paragraphs Page 10 of 14

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279 (3)(a)-(f) shall be awarded by the State Surgeon General, after 280 consultation with the council, on the basis of merit, as determined by an open, competitive, peer-reviewed process that 281 282 ensures objectivity, consistency, and high quality. The 283 department shall award such grants or contracts no later than 284 October 1 for each fiscal year. A recipient of a contract or 285 grant for the program component described in paragraph (3)(c) is 286 not eligible for a contract or grant award for any other program 287 component described in subsection (3) in the same state fiscal 288 year. A school or college of medicine that is represented on the 289 council is not eligible to receive a contract or grant under this section. For the 2007 2008 and 2008 2009 fiscal years only, 290 291 the department shall award a contract or grant in the amount of 292 \$10 million to the AHEC network for the purpose of developing 293 the components described in paragraph (3) (i). The AHEC network 294 may apply for a competitive contract or grant after the 2008-295 2009 fiscal year.

296 In order to ensure that all proposals for funding are (a) 297 appropriate and are evaluated fairly on the basis of merit, the State Surgeon General, in consultation with the council, shall 298 299 appoint a peer review panel of independent, qualified experts in 300 the field of tobacco control to review the content of each 301 proposal and establish its priority score. The priority scores shall be forwarded to the council and must be considered in 302 determining which proposals will be recommended for funding. 303

(b) The council and the peer review panel shall establish
 and follow rigorous guidelines for ethical conduct and adhere to
 a strict policy with regard to conflicts of interest. A member

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307 of the council or panel may not participate in any discussion or 308 decision with respect to a research proposal by any firm, 309 entity, or agency with which the member is associated as a 310 member of the governing body or as an employee or with which the 311 member has entered into a contractual arrangement. Meetings of 312 the council and the peer review panels are subject to chapter 313 119, s. 286.011, and s. 24, Art. I of the State Constitution.

(c) In each contract or grant agreement, the department shall limit the use of food and promotional items to no more than 2.5 percent of the total amount of the contract or grant and limit overhead or indirect costs to no more than 7.5 percent of the total amount of the contract or grant. The department, in consultation with the Department of Financial Services, shall publish guidelines for appropriate food and promotional items.

(d) In each advertising contract, the department shall limit the total of production fees, buyer commissions, and related costs to no more than 10 percent of the total contract amount.

325 (e) Notwithstanding the competitive process for contracts326 prescribed in this subsection:

327 <u>1. For the 2008-2009 fiscal year only, the department</u> 328 <u>shall award a contract or grant in the amount of \$6 million to</u> 329 <u>the AHEC network for the purpose of developing the component</u> 330 <u>described in paragraph (3)(i).</u>

331 <u>2. For the 2008-2009 fiscal year only, the department</u> 332 <u>shall equally award contracts or grants totaling \$4 million to</u> 333 <u>each medical school in this state recognized and approved by an</u> 334 <u>accrediting agency recognized by the United States Office of</u>

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335 <u>Education for the purpose of implementing the component</u>
336 described in paragraph (3)(i).

3. Beginning with the 2008-2009 fiscal year and continuing 337 338 thereafter, the department shall award contracts or grants in 339 the amount of \$10 million to the H. Lee Moffitt Cancer Center 340 and Research Institute and \$1 million to the University of 341 Florida Shands Cancer Center for the purpose of implementing chronic disease prevention, detection, and treatment programs in 342 343 accordance with paragraph (3)(e), each county health department 344 is eligible for core funding, on a per capita basis, to 345 implement tobacco education and use prevention activities within that county. 346

ANNUAL REPORT REQUIRED. -- By January 31 of each year, 347 (7)348 the department shall provide to the Governor, the President of 349 the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives a 350 report that evaluates the program's effectiveness in reducing 351 and preventing tobacco use and that recommends improvements to 352 enhance the program's effectiveness. The report must contain, at 353 a minimum, an annual survey of youth attitudes and behavior toward tobacco, as well as a description of the progress in 354 355 reducing the prevalence of tobacco use among youth, adults, and 356 pregnant women; reducing per capita tobacco consumption; and 357 reducing exposure to environmental tobacco smoke.

(8) LIMITATION ON ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES.--From the total
funds appropriated for the Comprehensive Statewide Tobacco
Education and Use Prevention Program in the General
Appropriations Act, an amount of up to 5 percent may be used by
the department for administrative expenses.

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363 (9) RULEMAKING AUTHORIZED.--By January 1, 2008, The
364 department shall adopt rules pursuant to ss. 120.536(1) and
365 120.54 to administer this section.

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Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2008.

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
