4	outdated provisions; providing additional duties and
5	powers of the council; removing certain duties of the
6	Attorney General; removing a provision that discontinues
7	the council under certain conditions; creating s. 16.616,
8	F.S.; creating a direct-support organization; specifying
9	duties and requiring a contract; providing contract
10	requirements; providing for appointment of members of the
11	board of directors; requiring the direct-support
12	organization to form strategic partnerships for specified
13	purposes, including in specified counties; requiring
14	certain reports; providing additional duties and powers of
15	the direct-support organization; requiring the direct-
16	support organization to consider expansion of
17	participation in certain counties and initiation of
18	participation of certain other counties; providing an
19	effective date.

21	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
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23	Section 1. Section 16.615, Florida Statutes, is amended to
24	read:
25	16.615 Council on the Social Status of Black Men and
26	Boys
27	(1) The Council on the Social Status of Black Men and Boys
28	is established within the Department of Legal Affairs and shall
29	consist of 19 members appointed as follows:
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30 Two members of the Senate who are not members of the (a) 31 same political party, appointed by the President of the Senate 32 with the advice of the Minority Leader of the Senate. Two members of the House of Representatives who are not 33 (b) 34 members of the same political party, appointed by the Speaker of 35 the House of Representatives with the advice of the Minority 36 Leader of the House of Representatives. 37 (C) The Secretary of Children and Family Services or his or 38 her designee. 39 (d) The director of the Mental Health Program Office within 40 the Department of Children and Family Services or his or her 41 designee. 42 The State Surgeon General or his or her designee. (e) 43 (f) The Commissioner of Education or his or her designee. 44 The Secretary of Corrections or his or her designee. (g) 45 The Attorney General or his or her designee. (h) 46 The Secretary of Management Services or his or her (i) 47 designee. 48 The director of the Agency for Workforce Innovation or (i) 49 his or her designee. 50 (k) A businessperson who is an African American, as defined 51 in s. 760.80(2), of black origin appointed by the Governor. 52 Two persons appointed by the President of the Senate (1)53 who are not members of the Legislature or employed by state 54 government. One of the appointees must be a clinical 55 psychologist. 56 (m) Two persons appointed by the Speaker of the House of 57 Representatives who are not members of the Legislature or 58 employed by state government. One of the appointees must be an

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59 Africana studies professional.

60 (n) The deputy secretary for Medicaid in the Agency for61 Health Care Administration or his or her designee.

62 (o) The Secretary of Juvenile Justice or his or her63 designee.

64 (2) Each member of the council shall be appointed to a 465 year term; however, for the purpose of providing staggered terms,
66 of the initial appointments, 9 members shall be appointed to 267 year terms and 10 members shall be appointed to 4-year terms. A
68 member of the council may be removed at any time by the member's
69 appointing authority who shall fill the vacancy on the council.

70 (3)(a) At the first meeting of the council each year, the 71 members shall elect a chair and a vice chair.

(b) A vacancy in the office of chair or vice chair shall befilled by vote of the remaining members.

(4) (a) The council shall make a systematic study of the conditions affecting black men and boys, including, but not limited to, homicide rates, arrest and incarceration rates, poverty, violence, drug abuse, death rates, disparate annual income levels, school performance in all grade levels including postsecondary levels, and health issues.

(b) The council shall propose measures to alleviate and
correct the underlying causes of the conditions described in
paragraph (a). These measures may consist of changes to the law
or systematic changes that can be implemented without legislative
action.

(c) The council may study other topics suggested by theLegislature or as directed by the chair of the council.

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(d) The council shall receive suggestions or comments

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pertinent to the applicable issues from members of the
Legislature, governmental agencies, public and private
organizations, and private citizens.
(e) The council shall monitor outcomes of the direct-
support organization created pursuant to s. 16.616.
(f) The council shall develop a strategic program and
funding initiative to establish local Councils on the Social
Status of Black Men and Boys.
(5) The council may:
(a) Access data held by any state department or agency
which is otherwise a public record.
(b) Make requests directly to the Joint Legislative
Auditing Committee for assistance with research and monitoring of
outcomes by the Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government
Accountability.
(c) Request, through council members who are also
legislators, research assistance from the Office of Economic and
Demographic Research within the Legislature.
(d) Request information and assistance from the state or
any political subdivision, municipal corporation, public officer,
or governmental department thereof.
(e) Apply for and accept funds, grants, gifts, and services
from the state, the Federal Government or any of its agencies, or
any other public or private source for the purpose of defraying
clerical and administrative costs as may be necessary for
carrying out its duties under this section.
(f) Work directly with, or request information and
assistance on issues pertaining to education from, the
historically black colleges and universities of this state.

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117 <u>(6) (5)</u> The Office of the Attorney General shall provide 118 staff and administrative support to the council.

119 <u>(7)(6)</u> The council shall meet quarterly and at other times 120 at the call of the chair or as determined by a majority of 121 council members and approved by the Attorney General.

122 <u>(8) (7)</u> Eleven of the members of the council shall 123 constitute a quorum, and an affirmative vote of a majority of the 124 members present is required for final action.

125 <u>(9)(8)(a)</u> The council shall issue its first annual report 126 by December 15, 2007, and by December 15 each following year, 127 stating the findings, conclusions, and recommendations of the 128 council. The council shall submit the report to the Governor, the 129 President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of 130 Representatives, and the chairpersons of the standing committees 131 of jurisdiction in each chamber.

(b) The initial report must include the findings of an investigation into factors causing black-on-black crime from the perspective of public health related to mental health, other health issues, cultural disconnection, and cultural identity trauma.

137 <u>(10)(9)</u> Members of the council shall serve without 138 compensation. Members are entitled to reimbursement for per diem 139 and travel expenses as provided in s. 112.061. State officers and 140 employees shall be reimbursed from the budget of the agency 141 through which they serve. Other members may be reimbursed by the 142 Department of Legal Affairs.

143 <u>(11)(10)</u> The council and any subcommittees it forms <u>are</u> 144 shall be subject to the provisions of chapter 119, related to 145 public records, and the provisions of chapter 286, related to

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146	public meetings.
147	(12) (11) Each member of the council who is not otherwise
148	required to file a financial disclosure statement pursuant to s.
149	8, Art. II of the State Constitution or s. 112.3144, must file a
150	disclosure of financial interests pursuant to s. 112.3145.
151	(12) Notwithstanding subsection (6), the Attorney General
152	shall:
153	(a) Within 60 days after the effective date of this act,
154	fix a date for the initial meeting of the council.
155	(b) Notify each member of the council of the time, date,
156	and place where the initial meeting will be held.
157	(c) Make any other arrangements concerning the initial
158	meeting of the council.
159	(d) Serve as the presiding officer at the initial meeting
160	of the council until a chair is elected.
161	(13) This section expires July 1, 2012, unless reenacted by
162	the Legislature.
163	Section 2. Section 16.616, Florida Statutes, is created to
164	read:
165	16.616 Direct-support organization
166	(1) The Department of Legal Affairs shall establish a
167	direct-support organization that is:
168	(a) A Florida corporation, not for profit, incorporated
169	under the provisions of chapter 617 and approved by the Secretary
170	of State.
171	(b) Organized and operated exclusively to solicit funds;
172	request and receive grants, gifts, and bequests of money;
173	acquire, receive, hold, invest, and administer, in its own name,
174	property and funds; and make expenditures for the benefit of the

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175	purposes as specified by this section.
176	(c) Certified by the department, after review, to be
177	operating in a manner consistent with the statutory goals of the
178	organization and in the best interests of the state.
179	(2) The direct-support organization shall operate under
180	written contract with the Department of Legal Affairs. The
181	contract must provide for:
182	(a) Approval of the articles of incorporation and bylaws of
183	the direct-support organization by the department.
184	(b) Submission of an annual budget for the approval by the
185	department.
186	(c) Certification by the department that the direct-support
187	organization is complying with the terms of the contract and in a
188	manner consistent with the statutory goals and purposes, and in
189	the best interests, of the state. Such certification must be made
190	annually.
191	(d) The reversion to the department of moneys and property
192	held in trust by the direct-support organization if the direct-
193	support organization is no longer approved to operate or ceases
194	to exist.
195	(e) The disclosure of material provisions of the contract
196	and the distinction between the board of directors and the
197	direct-support organization to donors of gifts, contributions, or
198	bequests, as well as on all promotional and fundraising
199	publications.
200	(f) An annual financial audit in accordance with s.
201	215.981.
202	(g) The fiscal year of the direct-support organization, to
203	begin July 1 of each year and end June 30 of the following year.

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204	(h) Appointment of the board of directors to be made
205	pursuant to this section.
206	(i) Authority of the board of directors of the direct-
207	support organization to hire an executive director.
208	(3) The board of directors of the direct-support
209	organization shall consist of 13 members. Each member of the
210	board of directors shall be appointed to a 4-year term; however,
211	for the purpose of providing staggered terms, the President of
212	the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall
213	each initially appoint two members to serve a 2-year term, and
214	the Attorney General and the chair of the Council on the Social
215	Status of Black Men and Boys shall each initially appoint one
216	member to serve a 2-year term. All subsequent appointments shall
217	be for 4-year terms. Any vacancy that occurs shall be filled in
218	the same manner as the original appointment and shall be for the
219	unexpired term of that seat. The board of directors shall be
220	appointed as follows:
221	(a) Two members of the Council on the Social Status of
222	Black Men and Boys, appointed by the council chair.
223	(b) Three members appointed by the Attorney General.
224	(c) Four members appointed by the President of the Senate.
225	(d) Four members appointed by the Speaker of the House of
226	Representatives.
227	(4) In conjunction with the Council on the Social Status of
228	Black Men and Boys, and funded exclusively by the direct-support
229	organization, the direct-support organization shall form
230	strategic partnerships to foster the development of community and
231	private-sector resources and shall act as a liaison with state
232	agencies, other state governments, and the public and private

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233 sectors on matters that relate to underlying conditions that 234 affect black men and boys to bring about an environment that promotes the values of learning, family, prosperity, unity, and 235 236 self-worth. To that end, the direct-support organization is 237 charged with the following duties: 238 (a) Develop a strategic program and funding initiative to 239 expand the 5000 Role Models of Excellence in Miami-Dade and 240 Pinellas Counties and implement the 5000 Role Models of 241 Excellence in Broward, Palm Beach, Duval, Orange, and 242 Hillsborough Counties. The strategic program and funding 243 initiative shall be reported to the Legislature by February 15, 244 2009. 245 (b) Develop a strategic program and funding initiative to 246 implement the Reading 4 Success Program by the 100 Black Men of 247 Florida in Broward, Miami-Dade, Palm Beach, Duval, Orange, 248 Pinellas, and Hillsborough Counties. The strategic program and 249 funding initiative shall be reported to the Legislature by 250 February 15, 2009. 251 (c) Develop a strategic program and funding initiative to 252 implement the One Church, One Child program statewide. The 253 strategic program and funding initiative shall be reported to the 254 Legislature by February 15, 2009. 255 (d) Develop a strategic program and funding initiative to 256 implement the Mapping the Future for Black Males Program within 257 community colleges identified by the Council on the Social Status 258 of Black Men and Boys. The strategic program and funding 259 initiative shall be reported to the Legislature by February 15, 260 2009. 261 Develop a public awareness and marketing campaign (e)

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262 showcasing programs funded by the direct-support organization, as 263 well as other opportunities to implement the statutory duties of 264 the direct-support organization and the Council on the Social 265 Status of Black Men and Boys, pursuant to s. 16.615(4). The 266 campaign should also encourage the idea that each person has a 267 responsibility to make a difference in the community. 268 (f) Fund the clerical and administrative costs of the 269 Council on the Social Status of Black Men and Boys as may be 270 necessary for carrying out the council's duties under s. 16.615. 271 (5) The direct-support organization may: 272 (a) Develop a strategic program and funding initiative to 273 implement a health-screening program using mobile screening 274 services. 275 (b) Hold a statewide Black Policy Summit in conjunction 276 with a university in this state. 277 (c) Create a compendium of intervention programs in each 278 county, which can be used to determine how to maximize existing 279 resources and address underserved populations or unmet needs. 280 (6) The direct-support organization shall consider the participation of counties, in addition to those specified in 281 282 subsection (4), which demonstrate a willingness to participate 283 and an ability to be successful in any programs funded by the 284 direct-support organization. 285 Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2008.

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
