Senate Amendment (with title amendment)

Delete everything after the enacting clause and insert:

Section 1. Subsection (5) of section 1006.06, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

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1006.06 School food service programs.--

9 (5) (a) Each district school board shall implement school breakfast programs in all elementary schools that make breakfast 10 meals available to all students in kindergarten through grade 6 11 12 in each district school, unless the elementary school. By the beginning of the 2010-2011 school year, the school breakfast 13 14 programs shall make breakfast meals available to all students in 15 each elementary, middle, and high school. Each school shall, to the maximum extent practicable, make breakfast meals available to 16 17 students at an alternative site location, which may include, but

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18	need not be limited to, alternative breakfast options as
19	described in publications of the Food and Nutrition Service of
20	the United States Department of Agriculture for the federal
21	School Breakfast Program goes only through grade 5, in which case
22	the requirement shall apply only through grade 5. Each district
23	school board shall implement breakfast programs in all elementary
24	schools in which students are eligible for free and reduced price
25	lunch meals, to the extent specifically funded in the General
26	Appropriations Act.
27	(b) Beginning with the 2009-2010 school year, each school
28	district must annually set prices for breakfast meals at rates
29	that, combined with federal reimbursements, are sufficient to
30	defray costs of school breakfast programs without requiring
31	allocations from the district's operating funds, except if the
32	district school board approves lower rates.
33	(c) Each district school board is encouraged to provide

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48 (e) Each school district shall annually provide to all 49 students in each elementary, middle, and high school information 50 prepared by the district's food service administration regarding 51 its school breakfast programs. The information shall be 52 communicated through school announcements and written notice sent 53 to all parents.

54 <u>(f)</u> A district school board may operate a breakfast program 55 providing for food preparation at the school site or in central 56 locations with distribution to designated satellite schools or 57 any combination thereof.

58 (g) (b) The commissioner shall make every reasonable effort 59 to ensure that any school designated a "severe need school" 60 receives the highest rate of reimbursement to which it is 61 entitled <u>under pursuant to</u> 42 U.S.C. s. 1773 for each free and 62 reduced price breakfast meal served.

63 (h) (c) The department shall <u>annually allocate among the</u>
64 <u>school districts funds provided from the</u> calculate and distribute
65 a school district breakfast supplement for each school year by
66 multiplying the state breakfast rate as specified in the General
67 Appropriations Act <u>based on each district's total</u> by the number
68 of free and <u>reduced-price</u> reduced price breakfast meals served.

69 (d) The Legislature shall provide sufficient funds in the 70 General Appropriations Act to reimburse participating school 71 districts for the difference between the average federal 72 reimbursement for free and reduced price breakfasts and the 73 average statewide cost for breakfasts.

74 Section 2. (1) The Office of Program Policy Analysis and 75 Government Accountability, by January 15, 2009, shall submit a 76 report to the Governor, the President of the Senate, the Speaker 77 of the House of Representatives, the members of the State Board



of Education, and the Commissioner of Education on school 78 79 district food service programs. The report shall: 80 (a) Estimate the district-by-district cost if each school district implements a universal-free school breakfast program in 81 82 all elementary, middle, and high schools. The estimate shall 83 consider the marginal costs per breakfast meal, anticipated 84 increases in student participation rates, expected reductions in the marginal costs per breakfast meal which result from increased 85 86 economies of scale, offsetting federal reimbursements, impact on 87 the marginal costs per breakfast meal of limiting participation 88 in a universal-free school breakfast program to schools having 89 various percentages of students eligible for free or reduced-90 price meals, and impact on student participation rates and marginal costs per breakfast meal of alternatives to serving 91 92 meals in school cafeterias. The estimate shall also consider the experiences of specific Florida schools and school districts 93 94 implementing a universal-free school breakfast program. 95 (b) Determine the extent to which school district food 96 service programs are fiscally self-sufficient or require 97 financial support from other district operating funds. (c) Examine for at least the previous 5 years the prices 98 99 that school food service programs charged for meals, the 100 frequency of price-level increases, and the relationship between 101 increases in the costs per meal and price-level increases. 102 (d) Identify best practices for the efficient and effective operation of school district food service programs, which shall 103 include strategies for a school district to reduce the costs of 104 105 its food service programs without sacrificing the nutritional 106 value of meals, including, but not limited to, the use of

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107	alternatives to the daily counting of meals at the point of
108	service which are authorized under 7 C.F.R. s. 210.7(c)(2).
109	(e) Evaluate the methodology and forms used for school
110	district food service programs to report their revenues and
111	expenditures to the Department of Education. The evaluation shall
112	assess whether the forms require food service programs to
113	accurately report their total operating costs, including, but not
114	limited to, food, labor, equipment, utilities, janitorial
115	services, overhead, and indirect costs; whether the calculations
116	submitted on the forms accurately report the average costs per
117	meal; and whether information obtained from the forms as
118	submitted to the department allows an equitable district-by-
119	district comparison of the average costs per meal.
120	(f) Assess the methodology used to allocate funds provided
121	in the General Appropriations Act for school district food
122	service programs and the extent to which the allocation
123	methodology creates incentives for the fiscal efficiency of the
124	food service programs.
125	(g) Evaluate the organizational structure of the state for,
126	and the state implementation and programmatic management of,
127	federal programs administered by the Food and Nutrition Service
128	of the United States Department of Agriculture, including, but
129	not limited to, the National School Lunch Program, the federal
130	School Breakfast Program, and the federal Summer Food Service
131	Program.
132	(2) The Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government
133	Accountability shall consult with staff of the education
134	committees of the Senate and House of Representatives, the
135	Department of Education, the Department of Agriculture and



136	Consumer Services, and the Auditor General concerning the
137	research design for the report.
