The department shall provide such children and young 22 adults with opportunities to participate in life skills 23 activities in their foster families and communities which are 24 reasonable and appropriate for their respective ages or for any 25 special needs they may have and shall provide them with services 26 to build life skills and increase their ability to live 27 independently and become self-sufficient. 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29 provision of opportunities for participation in age-appropriate 30 life skills activities, the department shall:

Develop a list of age-appropriate activities and
responsibilities to be offered to all children involved in
independent living transition services and their foster parents.

2. Provide training for staff and foster parents to address the issues of older children in foster care in transitioning to adulthood, which shall include information on high school completion, grant applications, vocational school opportunities, supporting education and employment opportunities, and opportunities to participate in appropriate daily activities.

Develop procedures to maximize the authority of foster 41 3. parents, family foster homes, residential child-caring agencies, 42 43 or other authorized caregivers to approve participation in age-44 appropriate activities of children in their care. The ageappropriate activities and the authority of the foster parent, 45 family foster home, residential child-caring agency, or 46 47 caregiver shall be developed into a written plan that the foster parent, family foster home, residential child-caring agency, or 48 49 careqiver, the child, and the case manager all develop together, 50 sign, and follow. 5. Develop and implement procedures for older children to directly access and manage the personal allowance they receive from the department in order to learn responsibility and participate in age-appropriate life skills activities to the extent feasible.

67 Make a good faith effort to fully explain, prior to 6. execution of any signature, if required, any document, report, 68 form, or other record, whether written or electronic, presented 69 to a child or young adult pursuant to this chapter and allow for 70 71 the recipient to ask any appropriate questions necessary to 72 fully understand the document.
