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I. Summary:

Current law permits police and vehicles owned, operated, or leased by the Department of Corrections to show or display blue lights when responding to emergencies. However, of Florida's 67 counties, 9 counties operate their jail detention facilities in county departments rather than Sheriff's Offices.

Senate Bill 1030 amends s. 316.2397, F.S., to allow vehicles owned, operated, or leased by any county correctional agency to show or display blue lights when responding to emergencies.

This bill substantially amends s. 316.2397 of the Florida Statutes.

II. Present Situation:

Section 316.2397, F.S., provides it is expressly prohibited for any vehicle or equipment, except police vehicles, to show or display blue lights. However, vehicles owned, operated, or leased by the Department of Corrections may show or display blue lights when responding to emergencies. A violation is a noncriminal traffic infraction, punishable as a nonmoving violation.

Currently, of the 67 counties in Florida, 9¹operate their county jail facilities in county departments rather than Sheriff's Offices, and therefore, are not authorized to display blue lights under the current statute.

¹ County-operated detention facilities are located in Jackson County, Oskaloosa County, Miami-Dade County, Orange County, Osceola County, Volusia County, and Walton County. Privately operated detention facilities are located in Citrus County and Hernando County.

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

This bill amends s. 316.2397(2), F.S., revising provisions restricting the use of certain colored light lights. Specifically, the bill allows vehicles owned, operated, or leased by any county correctional agency to show or display blue lights when responding to emergencies.
