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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

- Section 1. Subsections (9) through (15) are added to section 464.003, Florida Statutes, to read:
 - 464.003 Definitions.--As used in this part, the term:
- (9) "Clinical preceptor" means a registered nurse employed by a clinical training facility who serves as a role model and clinical resource person for a specified period to an individual enrolled in an approved nursing education program.
- (10) "Clinical preceptor program" means a program that uses individualized teaching-learning strategies in which a nursing student participates in clinical nursing practice while assigned to a clinical preceptor.
- (11) "Clinical simulation" means a strategy used to replicate clinical practice as closely as possible to teach theory, assessment, technology, pharmacology, and skills.
- (12) "Clinical training" means direct nursing care experiences with patients or clients that offer the student the opportunity to integrate, apply, and refine specific skills and abilities based on theoretical concepts and scientific principles.
- (13) "Community-based clinical experiences" means activities consistent with the curriculum and involving individuals, families, and groups with the intent of promoting wellness, maintaining health, and preventing illness. Structured nursing services may not be offered, and invasive procedures may not be performed, at sites used for community-based clinical experiences.

(14) "Curriculum" means the planned sequence of course offerings and learning experiences that comprise a nursing education program.

- (15) "Probationary status" means the status of a nursing education program that has not met the standards of s. 464.019.
- Section 2. Section 464.019, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

- 464.019 Approval of nursing programs.--
- (1) An institution that wishes to conduct a program for the education of professional or practical nurses must submit a program application and a program review fee of \$1,000 to the department. Within 3 months after receipt of a program application and program review fee, the board shall approve a program that documents compliance with the standards in paragraphs (a) through (l) or shall issue a notice of intent to deny the application under subsection (3). Each program application must document that:
- (a) The institution's professional nursing program faculty are led by a director who is a licensed registered nurse in this state and who has at least a bachelor's degree in nursing and a master's degree in nursing or a related field.
- (b) The institution's practical nursing program faculty are led by a director who is licensed as a registered nurse in this state and who has at least a bachelor's degree in nursing.
- (c) At least 50 percent of the institution's professional nursing program's faculty members are registered nurses licensed

in this state with a bachelor's degree in nursing and a master's degree in nursing or a related field.

- (d) At least 50 percent of the institution's practical nursing program's faculty members are registered nurses licensed in this state with a bachelor's degree in nursing.
- (e) At least 50 percent of the institution's curriculum consists of clinical training.
- (f) No more than 25 percent of the institution's clinical training consists of clinical simulation.
- (g) The institution has signed an agreement with each agency, facility, and organization included in the curriculum plan as a clinical training site or a community-based clinical experience site.
- (h) The institution has written policies for faculty that include provisions for direct supervision by faculty or clinical preceptors for students in clinical training consistent with the following standards:
- 1. The number of program faculty members equals at least one faculty member supervising every 12 students unless the written agreement between the program and the agency, facility, or organization providing clinical training sites allows more students, not to exceed 18 students, to be supervised by one faculty member.
- 2. Indirect supervision may occur only in community-based clinical experiences and only when the supervisor is immediately available to the student by telephone.
- (i) The institution's curriculum plan documents both clinical experience and theoretical instruction in medical,

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surgical, obstetric, pediatric, geriatric, and psychiatric
nursing in acute care, long-term care, and community settings.

(j) The institution's professional nursing programs provide instruction in biological, physical, social, and behavioral sciences.

- (k) The institution's practical nursing programs provide theoretical instruction and clinical application of personal, family, and community health concepts; nutrition; human growth and development throughout the life span; body structure and function; interpersonal relationship skills; mental health concepts; pharmacology and administration of medications; and legal aspects of practice.
- (1) The institution's professional nursing programs meet the standards for practical nursing programs in paragraph (k) and provide theoretical instruction and clinical application in interpersonal relationships and leadership skills, professional role and function, and health teaching and counseling skills.
- (2) (a) Professional or practical nursing programs that receive full or provisional approval from the board before July 1, 2009, are considered approved under this section. To retain approved status, a program must submit the report required under paragraph (c) to the board by November 1, 2009, and annually thereafter.
- (b) Professional or practical nursing programs that are approved by the board under subsection (1) on or after July 1, 2009, shall annually submit the report required under paragraph (c) to the board by November 1 of each year following initial approval.

(c) The annual report required by this subsection shall document the program's retention rates of students tracked from program entry to graduation and provide a statement verifying continued compliance with subsection (1).

- (3) If the board determines that the program application does not document compliance with subsection (1), the board shall provide the applicant with a notice of intent to deny the application, which shall set forth written reasons for the denial. Within 30 days after receipt of the notice of intent to deny the application, the applicant may submit to the board documentation rebutting the board's reasons for denial. Within 30 days after receipt of such documentation from an applicant, the board must issue a notice indicating its approval or denial of the program application. An applicant may request a hearing on the denial of its program application pursuant to chapter 120.
- (4) The board shall publish on its Internet website the following information about nursing programs located in this state:
- (a) Each program application, including all related documentation provided by the applicant, for each approved nursing program.
 - (b) A comprehensive list of nursing programs in the state.
- (c) The accreditation status of each program, including identification of the accrediting body.
 - (d) Each program's approval status.
- (e) Each program's graduate passage rate for the National
 Council of State Boards of Nursing Licensing Examination.

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(f) The national average passage rate for the National Council of State Boards of Nursing Licensing Examination.

- (g) Each program's student retention rates tracked from program entry to graduation.
- The information published pursuant to this subsection shall be made available in a manner that allows interactive searches and comparisons of specific programs. The board shall publish this information on its Internet website by December 31, 2009, and update the information at least quarterly.
- (5) (a) If the performance of a program's graduates on the National Council of State Boards of Nursing Licensing

 Examination falls 10 percent or more below the national average, as published by the contract testing service of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing, for 2 consecutive years, the program shall be placed on probation and the program director shall be required to appear before the board to present a plan for remediation. The program must achieve compliance with the graduation performance requirements of this paragraph within the next 2 consecutive years.
- (b) If a program fails to submit the annual report required by subsection (2), or if the program's report fails to document compliance with subsection (1), the program shall be placed on probation. The program must submit the annual report or document compliance, as appropriate, within 6 months after the program's placement on probation.
- (c) A program placed on probationary status shall disclose such status in writing to the program's students and applicants.

(d) The board may terminate a program that fails to comply
