A bill to be entitled

An act relating to childhood immunizations; amending s. 1003.22, F.S.; revising the list of required childhood immunizations; creating s. 1003.221; providing a set of recommended vaccination requirements that address the manner and frequency of administration of immunizations for children who are entitled to admittance into kindergarten or any other initial entrance into a public or private school in this state; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Subsection (3) of section 1003.22, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

1003.22 School-entry health examinations; immunization against communicable diseases; exemptions; duties of Department of Health.—

(3) The Department of Health may adopt rules necessary to administer and enforce this section. The Department of Health, after consultation with the Department of Education, shall adopt rules governing the immunization of children against, the testing for, and the control of preventable communicable diseases. The rules must include procedures for exempting a child from immunization requirements. Immunizations shall be required for poliomyelitis, diphtheria, measles rubeola, rubella, pertussis, mumps, tetanus, and other communicable diseases as determined by s.1003.221 and rules of the Department of Health. The manner and frequency of administration

of the immunization or testing shall be done according to s. 1003.221 conform to recognized standards of medical practice. The Department of Health shall supervise and secure the enforcement of the required immunization. Immunizations required by this section shall be available at no cost from the county health departments.

Section 2. Section 1003.221, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

1003.221 Immunization requirements.-

consideration should be given to discontinuing all further DTaP vaccines and tetanus-diphtheria-pertussis (Tdap) vaccines and switching to DT and tenanus-diphtheria (Td) vaccines.

- (3) In vaccinating his or her child, a parent or guardian, in consultation with his or her pediatrician, may choose between a measles-mumps-rubella combination vaccine, a measles-rubella combination vaccine, or a measles-only vaccine. Because rubella is dangerous to a fetus during pregnancy, only a female who does not contract rubella between 3 years of age and 8 years of age should be given a vaccine for rubella if she has not had rubella by 8 years of age. Similarly, the mumps vaccination need be given only to males who have not had mumps by 10 years of age. A booster for measles vaccine is required only if a blood titer test shows a lack of measles antibodies.
- (4) The polio vaccine should not be given with any other vaccine.

Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2009.
