Senate House

The Committee on General Government Appropriations (Dean) recommended the following:

Senate Amendment (with title amendment)

Delete everything after the enacting clause and insert:

Section 1. Florida Springs Stewardship Task Force.-

- (1) FINDINGS.-The Legislature finds that:
- (a) Florida's springs are valuable resources that provide recreational and tourism opportunities, significant financial benefit to local economies, and critical habitat for endangered or threatened plant and animal species.
- (b) The flow and water quality of Florida's springs are direct reflections of the aquifer systems in Florida and

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consequently are indicators of the condition of a significant portion of the state's water resources.

- (c) Cooperative efforts are best for identifying bestmanagement practices for the protection, restoration, and preservation of the state's water resources, including springs.
- (d) The state's residents want to be good stewards of the state's resources and, through educational awareness programs, will voluntarily implement best-management practices into their daily activities.
 - (2) DEFINITIONS.—As used in this section, the term:
- (a) "Seep" means a place where the water table aquifer intersects the land surface and flows onto the land.
- (b) "Spring" means a point where ground water is discharged onto the earth's surface, including under any surface water of the state, and excludes seeps.
- (c) "Zone of influence" means the geographic area that contributes most directly to the water quantity and quality of a spring.
 - (3) TASK FORCE.—
- (a) The Florida Springs Stewardship Task Force is created and shall consist of nine members as follows:
- 1. One representative from the Department of Environmental Protection, to be appointed by the Secretary of Environmental Protection.
- 2. One representative from the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, to be appointed by the Commissioner of Agriculture.
- 3. One representative from the Department of Community Affairs, to be appointed by the Secretary of Community Affairs.

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- 4. One representative from the water management district that has the greatest number of first-magnitude springs within its jurisdiction, to be appointed by the executive director of that water management district.
- 5. Two members appointed by the President of the Senate, one of whom shall be a representative of the development community and one of whom shall be a representative of a local chamber of commerce.
- 6. Two members appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, one of whom shall be a locally elected county or municipal official and one of whom shall be a representative of the environmental community.
- 7. One member appointed by the Commissioner of Agriculture who shall be a representative of the agricultural community.
- (b) Task force members shall be appointed by August 1, 2009. Members shall choose a chair and vice chair from the membership of the task force.
 - (c) The task force shall:
- 1. Collect and inventory all existing data identifying the zone of influence for each of the state's 33 known firstmagnitude springs and identifying land uses in these areas.
- 2. Identify and compile a list of existing best-management practices for identified land uses and other water pollutant controls.
- 3. Identify all existing and reasonably expected funding sources available to implement best-management practices and other water pollutant controls that protect the state's firstmagnitude springs and propose a priority list of projects for funding.

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- 4. Take public input and testimony regarding issues related to spring protection, restoration, and preservation.
- 5. Propose a program that emphasizes education and outreach and that encourages the implementation of best-management practices for agricultural and nonagricultural land uses and other water pollutant controls, including specific provisions for cost-share assistance with the implementation of such practices, as well as recognition of agricultural and nonagricultural landowners who participate in the program.
- 6. The task force shall submit a report summarizing the data collected, public input and testimony, and the findings and proposals of the task force to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives by January 31, 2010.
- (d) All state agencies are directed, and all other agencies and local governments are requested, to render assistance to and cooperate with the task force.
 - (e) The task force expires January 31, 2010. Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2009.
