### **SUMMARY ANALYSIS**

Current law permits police and vehicles owned, operated, or leased by the Department of Corrections to show or display blue lights when responding to emergencies. However, of Florida's 67 counties, 9 counties operate their jail detention facilities in county departments rather than Sheriff's Offices.

HB 545 amends s. 316.2397, F.S. to allow vehicles owned, operated, or leased by any county correctional agency to show or display blue lights when responding to emergencies.

The bill has no fiscal impact on state and local government and an effective date of July 1, 2009.

#### **FULL ANALYSIS**

#### I. SUBSTANTIVE ANALYSIS

## A. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

### **Present Situation**

Section 316.2397(2), F.S., prohibits any vehicle or equipment, with the exception of police vehicles, to show or display blue lights. As it is currently written, the statute also allows vehicles owned, operated, or leased by the Department of Corrections to show or display blue lights when responding to emergencies.

Currently, of the 67 counties in Florida, 9<sup>1</sup> operate their county jail facilities in county departments rather than Sheriff's Offices, and therefore, are not authorized to display blue lights under the current statute.

### **Proposed Changes**

HB 545 would enable vehicles "owned, operated, or leased by any county correctional agency" to show or display blue lights when responding to emergencies. .

# **B. SECTION DIRECTORY:**

Section 1: Amends Section 316.2397(2), F.S., by revising provisions restricting the use of certain

colored lights; providing vehicles "owned, operated, or leased" by any county

correctional agency to show or display blue lights when responding to emergencies.

Section 2: Provides an effective date of July 1, 2009.
