(1) The maximum number of students who are assigned to
each teacher who is teaching in public school classrooms for
prekindergarten through grade 3 does not exceed 18 students;

(2) The maximum number of students who are assigned to
each teacher who is teaching in public school classrooms for
grades 4 through 8 does not exceed 22 students; and

(3) The maximum number of students who are assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public school classrooms for grades 9 through 12 does not exceed 25 students.

32 (b) Upon confirmation that schools have met the class size 33 requirements of subsection (a) through the October student 34 membership survey each year, schools may exceed these 35 requirements in the event of unexpected student enrollment 36 growth with the following restrictions:

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Amendment No. 98 REVISION OF THE CLASS SIZE REQUIREMENTS FOR PUBLIC 99 SCHOOLS. -- Proposes amendment of the State Constitution to 100 provide flexibility for schools to meet class size requirements 101 for public schools due to unexpected student growth after the 102 October student membership survey. For public school classrooms 103 for prekindergarten through grade 3, for grades 4 through 8, and for grades 9 through 12, upon confirmation that a school has met 104 105 class size requirements through the October student membership 106 survey, provides a limit on the maximum number of students who 107 may be assigned to each teacher in an individual classroom. 108 Provides that class size requirements do not apply to virtual 109 classes. Modifies requirements for funding to require that the 110 Legislature provide sufficient funds to maintain class size requirements. Clarifies that class size requirements apply by 111 the beginning of the 2010-2011 school year and for each school 112 113 year thereafter. Schedules these revisions to take effect upon 114 approval by the electors of this state and to operate retroactively to the beginning of the 2010-2011 school year. 115
