## Senate Amendment (with title amendment)

Delete everything after the enacting clause and insert:

Section 1. Section 381.911, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

381.911 Prostate Cancer Awareness Program.-

8 (1) To the extent that funds are specifically made 9 available for this purpose, the Prostate Cancer Awareness 10 Program is established within the <u>University of Florida Prostate</u> 11 <u>Disease Center Department of Health</u>. The purpose of this program 12 is to <u>diligently work toward implementing</u> <u>implement</u> the

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13 recommendations from of January 2000 of the Florida Prostate 14 Cancer Task Force to provide for statewide outreach to promote 15 prostate cancer awareness, to communicate the advantages of 16 early detection, to report recent progress in prostate cancer 17 research and the availability of clinical trials, to minimize 18 health disparities through outreach, education, and screening 19 events, to communicate best-practice principles to physicians 20 involved in the care of prostate cancer patients, and to 21 establish a communication platform for patients and their 22 advocates and health education activities to ensure that men are 23 aware of and appropriately seek medical counseling for prostate 24 cancer as an early-detection health care measure. 25 (2) For purposes of implementing the program, the 26 University of Florida Prostate Disease Center (UFPDC) may work with other organizations and institutions to create a systemic 27 28 focus on increasing community education and awareness about 29 prostate cancer by Department of Health and the Florida Public Health Institute, Inc., may: 30 (a) Conducting Conduct activities directly or entering 31 32 enter into contracts a contract with a qualified nonprofit 33 community education entities entity. 34 (b) Seeking Seek any available gifts, grants, or funds from 35 the state, the Federal Government, philanthropic foundations, 36 and industry or business groups. 37 (3) The University of Florida Prostate Disease Center shall 38 collaborate with the Department of Health to establish the UFPDC 39 Prostate Cancer Task Force and to lead the task force in 40 developing and implementing strategies to improve early detection and, consequently, reduce the number of patients 41

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42	succumbing to prostate cancer. A Prostate Cancer Advisory
43	committee is created to advise and assist the Department of
44	Health and the Florida Public Health Institute, Inc., in
45	implementing the program.
46	(a) The State Surgeon General, upon recommendation of the
47	executive director of the University of Florida Prostate Disease
48	Center in consultation with the Comprehensive Cancer Control
49	Program within the Department of Health and the Florida Cancer
50	Control Program, shall appoint geographically and
51	institutionally diverse task force the advisory committee
52	members, who shall consist of:
53	1. Three persons from prostate cancer survivor groups or
54	cancer-related advocacy groups.
55	<u>1.2.</u> One person Three persons who is a scientist are
56	<del>scientists</del> or <u>clinician</u> <del>clinicians</del> from <u>a community practice who</u>
57	is a known expert in prostate cancer care, research, or
58	education public universities or research organizations.
59	2.3. One person Three persons who is are engaged in the
60	practice of a cancer-related medical specialty from <u>a</u> health
61	organization organizations committed to cancer research and
62	control.
63	3. The executive director for the University of Florida
64	Prostate Disease Center or his or her designee.
65	4. One person, appointed by the Governor, who is a consumer
66	advocate and has been diagnosed with prostate cancer.
67	5. One person, appointed by the Governor, who is a
68	scientist or clinician from an instate university.
69	6. One person, appointed by the President of the Senate,
70	who is engaged in the practice of a cancer-related medical

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71	specialty from a health organization committed to cancer
72	research and control.
73	7. One person from the public, appointed by the President
74	of the Senate, who is a consumer advocate and has been diagnosed
75	with prostate cancer.
76	8. One person, appointed by the Speaker of the House of
77	Representatives, who is a scientist or clinician from a
78	community practice and is a known expert in prostate cancer
79	care, research, or education.
80	9. One person from the public, appointed by the Speaker of
81	the House of Representatives, who is a consumer advocate and has
82	been diagnosed with prostate cancer.
83	
84	At least one appointee by the Governor, at least one appointee
85	by the President of the Senate, and at least one appointee by
86	the Speaker of the House of Representatives must be a member of
87	an ethnic or racial minority group.
88	(b) Members shall serve without compensation but are
89	entitled to reimbursement, pursuant to s. 112.061, for per diem
90	and travel expenses incurred in the performance of their
91	official duties.
92	(c) Each member of the task force shall be appointed to a
93	4-year term; however, for the purpose of providing staggered
94	terms, of the initial appointments, four members shall be
95	appointed to 2-year terms and four members shall be appointed to
96	4-year terms with the remaining seat being filled by the UFPDC
97	executive director or his or her designee.
98	(d) At the first meeting of the task force each year, the
99	members shall elect a chair and a vice chair. A vacancy in the

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100	office of chair or vice chair shall be filled by vote of the
101	remaining members. The task force shall meet biannually and at
102	other times at the call of the UFPDC executive director or a
103	majority of the task force members. Five of the members of the
104	task force constitute a quorum, and an affirmative vote of a
105	majority of the members present is required for final action.
106	(e) The UFPDC Prostate Cancer Task Force shall:
107	1. Present policy recommendations related to prostate
108	cancer to the Department of Health and other appropriate
109	governmental entities.
110	2. Verify the accuracy of prostate cancer information
111	disseminated to the public.
112	3. Develop effective communication channels among all
113	private and public entities across the state which are involved
114	in prostate cancer education, research, treatment, and patient
115	advocacy.
116	4. Plan, develop, and implement activities designed to
117	heighten awareness and educate residents of this state,
118	especially those residents in underserved areas, regarding the
119	importance of early detection and effective treatment options
120	for prostate cancer.
121	5. Develop effective communication channels to various
122	stakeholders within and across the state.
123	6. Disseminate information on recent progress in prostate
124	cancer research and the availability of clinical trials.
125	7. Minimize health disparities through outreach, education,
126	and early detection initiatives.
127	8. Communicate best-practice principles to physicians
128	involved in the care of patients suffering from prostate cancer.
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129	9. Establish a communication platform for patients and
130	their advocates.
131	10. Conduct an annual prostate cancer symposium that brings
132	physicians, researchers, community leaders, prostate cancer
133	survivors, and prostate cancer advocates together to highlight
134	recent advances in prostate cancer research, clinical trials,
135	and best practices in the prevention of the disease, and to
136	promote strategies for successful rural and urban outreach,
137	community education, and increased awareness.
138	11. Submit and present an annual report to the Governor,
139	the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of
140	Representatives, and the State Surgeon General by January 15,
141	2011, and by January 15 each following year, which contains
142	recommendations for legislative changes necessary to decrease
143	the incidence of prostate cancer, decrease the racial and ethnic
144	disparities, and promote increased community education and
145	awareness.
146	(4) The program shall coordinate its efforts with those of
147	the Florida Public Health Institute, Inc.

155	An act relating to the Prostate Cancer Awareness
156	Program; amending s. 381.911, F.S.; revising the
157	purpose, structure, and objectives of the Prostate

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158 Cancer Awareness Program within the University of 159 Florida Prostate Disease Center; authorizing the 160 University of Florida Prostate Disease Center to work 161 with other organizations and institutions to create a 162 systemic focus on increasing community education and 163 awareness of prostate cancer; requiring the University of Florida Prostate Disease Center to collaborate with 164 165 the Department of Health to establish the UFPDC 166 Prostate Cancer Task Force, which was formerly 167 designated as a "committee"; requiring the State 168 Surgeon General, upon recommendation of the executive 169 director of the University of Florida Prostate Disease 170 Center in consultation with the Comprehensive Cancer 171 Control Program within the Department of Health and 172the Florida Cancer Control Program, to appoint members to the UFPDC Prostate Cancer Task Force; providing for 173 174 reimbursement for per diem and travel expenses; providing for terms of office; providing for the 175 176 appointment of a chair and co-chair; providing for 177 meetings; providing for a quorum of the task force; 178 providing the duties of the task force, including an 179 annual prostate cancer symposium and submission of an 180 annual report to the Governor, the State Surgeon 181 General, and the Legislature; providing an effective 182 date.

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WHEREAS, the Legislature recognizes that prostate cancer is a major public health problem and that promoting awareness of this disease is in the public interest of this state, and



187 WHEREAS, according to the Department of Health's Florida 188 Cancer Plan 2003-2006, prostate cancer was the most commonly 189 diagnosed cancer in Florida, accounting for one in every four 190 cancer diagnoses, and

191 WHEREAS, the costs of screening, staging, and treating 192 prostate cancer patients in both dollars and morbidity continue 193 to rise, which threatens the foundation of this state's health 194 system, and

195 WHEREAS, because African-American men are 2.8 times more 196 likely to succumb to prostate cancer than their white 197 counterparts, a call for action is mandatory, and

WHEREAS, there are currently no organized, active, or effective mechanisms in Florida to mitigate the incidence of prostate cancer, the lack of community education and awareness, the racial and ethnic disparities, and rising burdens of prostate cancer, and

203 WHEREAS, the Legislature finds that it is a public 204 necessity to work with the University of Florida Prostate 205 Disease Center to establish the UFPDC Prostate Cancer Task Force 206 and to make changes to the Prostate Cancer Awareness Program in 207 order to more effectively serve the needs of the people in 208 Florida, NOW, THEREFORE,
