An act relating to the Prostate Cancer Awareness

Program; amending s. 381.911, F.S.; revising the purpose, structure, and objectives of the Prostate Cancer Awareness Program within the University of Florida Prostate Disease Center; authorizing the University of Florida Prostate Disease Center to work with other organizations and institutions to create a systemic focus on increasing community education and awareness of prostate cancer; requiring the University of Florida Prostate Disease Center to collaborate with the Department of Health to establish the UFPDC Prostate Cancer Task Force, which was formerly designated as a "committee"; requiring the State Surgeon General, upon recommendation of the executive director of the University of Florida Prostate Disease Center in consultation with the Comprehensive Cancer Control Program within the Department of Health and the Florida Cancer Control Program, to appoint members to the UFPDC Prostate Cancer Task Force; providing for reimbursement for per diem and travel expenses; providing for terms of office; providing for the appointment of a chair and co-chair; providing for meetings; providing for a quorum of the task force; providing the duties of the task force, including an annual prostate cancer symposium and submission of an annual report to the Governor, the State Surgeon General, and the Legislature; providing an effective date.

WHEREAS, the Legislature recognizes that prostate cancer is a major public health problem and that promoting awareness of this disease is in the public interest of this state, and

WHEREAS, according to the Department of Health's Florida Cancer Plan 2003-2006, prostate cancer was the most commonly diagnosed cancer in Florida, accounting for one in every four cancer diagnoses, and

WHEREAS, the costs of screening, staging, and treating prostate cancer patients in both dollars and morbidity continue to rise, which threatens the foundation of this state's health system, and

WHEREAS, because African-American men are 2.8 times more likely to succumb to prostate cancer than their white counterparts, a call for action is mandatory, and

WHEREAS, there are currently no organized, active, or effective mechanisms in Florida to mitigate the incidence of prostate cancer, the lack of community education and awareness, the racial and ethnic disparities, and rising burdens of prostate cancer, and

WHEREAS, the Legislature finds that it is a public necessity to work with the University of Florida Prostate Disease Center to establish the UFPDC Prostate Cancer Task Force and to make changes to the Prostate Cancer Awareness Program in order to more effectively serve the needs of the people in Florida, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 381.911, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

- 381.911 Prostate Cancer Awareness Program. -
- (1) To the extent that funds are specifically made available for this purpose, the Prostate Cancer Awareness Program is established within the University of Florida Prostate Disease Center Department of Health. The purpose of this program is to diligently work toward implementing implement the recommendations from of January 2000 of the Florida Prostate Cancer Task Force to provide for statewide outreach to promote prostate cancer awareness, to communicate the advantages of early detection, to report recent progress in prostate cancer research and the availability of clinical trials, to minimize health disparities through outreach, education, and screening events, to communicate best-practice principles to physicians involved in the care of prostate cancer patients, and to establish a communication platform for patients and their advocates and health education activities to ensure that men are aware of and appropriately seek medical counseling for prostate cancer as an early-detection health care measure.
- (2) For purposes of implementing the program, the
  University of Florida Prostate Disease Center (UFPDC) may work
  with other organizations and institutions to create a systemic
  focus on increasing community education and awareness about
  prostate cancer by Department of Health and the Florida Public
  Health Institute, Inc., may:
- (a) <u>Conducting Conduct</u> activities directly or <u>entering</u> enter into <u>contracts</u> a <u>contract</u> with a qualified nonprofit community education entities <u>entity</u>.

(b) <u>Seeking Seek</u> any available gifts, grants, or funds from the state, the Federal Government, philanthropic foundations, and industry or business groups.

- (3) The University of Florida Prostate Disease Center shall collaborate with the Department of Health to establish the UFPDC Prostate Cancer Task Force and to lead the task force in developing and implementing strategies to improve early detection and, consequently, reduce the number of patients succumbing to prostate cancer. A Prostate Cancer Advisory committee is created to advise and assist the Department of Health and the Florida Public Health Institute, Inc., in implementing the program.
- (a) The State Surgeon General, upon recommendation of the executive director of the University of Florida Prostate Disease Center in consultation with the Comprehensive Cancer Control Program within the Department of Health and the Florida Cancer Control Program, shall appoint geographically and institutionally diverse task force the advisory committee members, who shall consist of:
- 1. Three persons from prostate cancer survivor groups or cancer-related advocacy groups.
- 1.2. One person Three persons who is a scientist are scientists or clinician elinicians from a community practice who is a known expert in prostate cancer care, research, or education public universities or research organizations.
- $\underline{\text{2.3.}}$  One person Three persons who  $\underline{\text{is}}$  are engaged in the practice of a cancer-related medical specialty from  $\underline{\text{a}}$  health  $\underline{\text{organization}}$  organizations committed to cancer research and control.

3. The executive director for the University of Florida Prostate Disease Center or his or her designee.

- 4. One person, appointed by the Governor, who is a consumer advocate and has been diagnosed with prostate cancer.
- 5. One person, appointed by the Governor, who is a scientist or clinician from an instate university.
- 6. One person, appointed by the President of the Senate, who is engaged in the practice of a cancer-related medical specialty from a health organization committed to cancer research and control.
- 7. One person from the public, appointed by the President of the Senate, who is a consumer advocate and has been diagnosed with prostate cancer.
- 8. One person, appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, who is a scientist or clinician from a community practice and is a known expert in prostate cancer care, research, or education.
- 9. One person from the public, appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, who is a consumer advocate and has been diagnosed with prostate cancer.
- At least one appointee by the Governor, at least one appointee by the President of the Senate, and at least one appointee by the Speaker of the House of Representatives must be a member of an ethnic or racial minority group.
- (b) Members shall serve without compensation but are entitled to reimbursement, pursuant to s. 112.061, for per diem and travel expenses incurred in the performance of their official duties.

(c) Each member of the task force shall be appointed to a 4-year term; however, for the purpose of providing staggered terms, of the initial appointments, four members shall be appointed to 2-year terms and four members shall be appointed to 4-year terms with the remaining seat being filled by the UFPDC executive director or his or her designee.

- (d) At the first meeting of the task force each year, the members shall elect a chair and a vice chair. A vacancy in the office of chair or vice chair shall be filled by vote of the remaining members. The task force shall meet biannually and at other times at the call of the UFPDC executive director or a majority of the task force members. Five of the members of the task force constitute a quorum, and an affirmative vote of a majority of the members present is required for final action.
  - (e) The UFPDC Prostate Cancer Task Force shall:
- 1. Present policy recommendations related to prostate cancer to the Department of Health and other appropriate governmental entities.
- 2. Verify the accuracy of prostate cancer information disseminated to the public.
- 3. Develop effective communication channels among all private and public entities across the state which are involved in prostate cancer education, research, treatment, and patient advocacy.
- 4. Plan, develop, and implement activities designed to heighten awareness and educate residents of this state, especially those residents in underserved areas, regarding the importance of early detection and effective treatment options for prostate cancer.

5. Develop effective communication channels to various stakeholders within and across the state.

- 6. Disseminate information on recent progress in prostate cancer research and the availability of clinical trials.
- 7. Minimize health disparities through outreach, education, and early detection initiatives.
- 8. Communicate best-practice principles to physicians involved in the care of patients suffering from prostate cancer.
- 9. Establish a communication platform for patients and their advocates.
- 10. Conduct an annual prostate cancer symposium that brings physicians, researchers, community leaders, prostate cancer survivors, and prostate cancer advocates together to highlight recent advances in prostate cancer research, clinical trials, and best practices in the prevention of the disease, and to promote strategies for successful rural and urban outreach, community education, and increased awareness.
- 11. Submit and present an annual report to the Governor, the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and the State Surgeon General by January 15, 2011, and by January 15 each following year, which contains recommendations for legislative changes necessary to decrease the incidence of prostate cancer, decrease the racial and ethnic disparities, and promote increased community education and awareness.
- (4) The program shall coordinate its efforts with those of the Florida Public Health Institute, Inc.
  - Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2010.
